COTTON INDUSTRY WEIGHS IN ON CHINESE WTO SITUATION

National Cotton Council representatives are once again requesting additional action by the U.S. govern-

NCC representatives have voiced a steady stream of concern and had numerous meetings with USDA, USTR and Chinese government officials in an effort to bring the Chinese tariff rate quota system in line with WTO trading rules.

Under the terms of the bi-lateral agreement reached between the U.S. and the People's Republic of China cotton fiber markets in China would be opened through the adoption of Chinese import rules that conformed with international trading rules, specifically those rules that provide for the equal treatment of imported and domestic commodities.

Unfortunately, the TRQ rules China developed in 2001 and imple-mented in 2002 have failed to meet the requirements of the trade agreement they signed. While the Chinese marketplace has remained essentially out of reach in 2002, Chinese exports of cotton textile products to the U.S. are more than twice as large at they were in 2001.

The recent announcement by the Chinese that they would not charge repeated refusal of the Chinese to modify their TRQ system to be in

Western High Plains growers affirm commitment

High Plains eradication zone voted overwhelming to continue boll weevil eradication efforts in the zone, passing a retention election by a 6-1

Don Parrish reelected to be the zone's representative, said the vote shows that area's growers know they have benefited from the eradication

"If we didn't have the program, growers wouldn't have seen the

Cotton producers in the Western yields they have. They wouldn't have made that crop or had the yields with the weevil pressure we had two or three years ago."

Parrish expressed his appreciation to state legislators, especially local legislators such as Sen. Robert Duncan and representatives Gary Walker, Delwin Jones and Carl Isett, for providing cost-share funding for eradication.

The program is mostly funded by farmers," he said, "but sate costshare funds have been tremendously

important in getting us to this point." The zone has seen reduction of 99.9 percent in the number of weevils trapped in the zone since it begin, said Charles Allen, program director for the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation.

"This is a proven program," Allen said. "We've had two zones that have reached functional eradication, as we're seeing the same kind of results in other zones as we've seen in the Western High Plains."

State law requires each active eradication zone to vote on continuing its efforts every four years. Voters in the Western High Plains originally approved beginning eradication in 1998, and activities began in the zone in the fall of 1999.

Three other zones in the state previously passed retention elections, all by similar margins. The Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation is a nonprofit, grower-initiated and funded organization dedicated to eliminating the cotton boll weevil from the state in the most cost effective and environmentally responsible manner possible.

As told by Matthew




This is how the birth of Jesus Christ came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Because Joseph her husband was a righteous man and did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly.

But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins."

All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: "The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel"—which means, "God with us."

When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife. But he had no union with her until she gave birth to a son. And he gave him the name Jesus.



After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea, during the time of King Herod, Magi from the east came to Jerusalem and asked, "Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star in the east and have come to worship him."

So he got up, took the child and his mother during the night and left for Egypt, where he stayed until the death of Herod. And so was fulfilled what the Lord had said through the prophet: "Out of Egypt I called my son."

When Herod realized that he had been outwitted by the Magi, he was furious, and he gave orders to kill all the boys in Bethlehem and its vicinity who were two years old and under, in accordance with the time he had learned from the Magi. Then what was said through the prophet Jeremiah was fulfilled: "A voice is heard in Ramah, weeping and great mourning, Rachel weeping for her children and refusing to be comforted, because they are no more."



After Herod died, an angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt and said, "Get up, take the child and his mother and go to the land of Israel, for those who were trying to take the child's life are dead."

So he got up, took the child and his mother and went to the land of Israel. But when he heard that Archelaus was reigning in Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there. Having been warned in a dream, he withdrew to the district of Galilee, and he went and lived in a town called Nazareth. 





EQUAL HOUSING

It was Christmas Eve in Rheims, France nearly five hundred years ago. The Story of Silent Night (Stille Nacht)

The young priest was worried. Within 24 hours he was supposed to lead a Christmas Eve service, but he had no music. The Salzach River that Oberndorf, Austria, caused chronic moisture which had rusted the pipe organ. Without the organ there would Eve without music?

It was nearly midnight before he reached his room. And so in the wee hours of December 24, 1818, he sat down to pen a new song, one which could be played on a guitar—at least that wasn't broken.

"Stille Nacht! Heilige Nacht!" he wrote. "Silent night, holy night." The nighttime peacefulness of Oberndorf was fresh in his mind; beyond it he could imagine Bethlehem, bathed in moonglow:

All is calm, all is bright. Round yon Virgin Mother and child! Holy Infant so tender and mild, Sleep in heavenly peace.

The words were flowing now. He could visualize shepherds quaking, shaken from the quietness of their vigil by the glories streaming from heaven. He could see the child's countenance:

Son of God, love's pure light, Radiant beams from Thy holy face, With the dawn of redeeming grace, Jesus, Lord, at Thy birth. It wasn't long 'til the simple poem was

finished. Now, perhaps he could sleep.


> came to Oberndorf to repair the rusted organ, and there learned of the carol. He copied the song and doubtless sang it as he worked on organs in the neighboring villages. From him, two families of traveling folk singers, similar to the Trapp Family Singers of

"Sound of Music" fame, learned of the song and sang it in concerts all over Europe. In 1834 the Strasser family performed it for the king of Prussia, who ordered it sung every Christmas Eve by his cathedral choir. The Rainer family singers brought it to America in 1839. By mid-century it had become popular around the world, but no one could recall its composer. The story of its fame was long to reach the tiny villages of Austria. But in 1854, Franz Grüber sent a letter to the leading musical authorities with his claim to have written the tune. In 1848 Father Mohr had died of pneumonia, but Grüber still had the original manuscript to show, and gradually he was recognized as composer. Sometimes the smallest churches make the biggest contributions. In this case, God presented a most wonderful carol to the world from a tiny congregation, one that just happened to be called St Nicholas' Church of Oberndorf.

Llow to make a Gingerbread Llouse

We've all been intimidated by the photos. Page after colorful page of the most amazing gingerbread houses you've ever seen. Gables and verandahs ... Santa's workshop or Buckingham Palace. And you say "Forget it." Too bad, because it's not that hard and it's a lot of fun. This recipe proves it, as long as you remember the following points: (1) it will take all weekend; (2) don't panic; (3) have everything ready before you start.


You will need:

- * a pattern
- * one batch of gingerbread dough
- * four to five batches icing glue cookie sheets
- aluminum foil
- * room temperature butter
- * flour
- * rolling pin
- * knives
- * spatula
- cooling racks
- * a plywood base on which to put the house * six unopened pop cans (to hold up the roof while


The Pattern:

Cut from paper the following:

Roof: 2 rectangles, 7 inches by 11 inches Side walls: 2 rectangles, 5"x8" Front and Back: base 5", total height 9". Cut door from front.



Chimney: (optional) 1" wide.



Dough:

Day 1

- 1 cup butter at room temperature
- 1 3/4 cups brown sugar 1 1/4 cups white sugar
- 2 tablespoons molasses 6 eggs
- 6 cups all-purpose flour 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 tablespoon ground ginger 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon
- 1 tablespoon allspice

Line several cookie sheets with aluminum foil. Butter and flour the foil. In a large bowl, cream the butter and sugars. Beat in the molasses and eggs. In another large bowl, sift dry ingredients. Combine mixtures and knead into a smooth ball. Cover and refrigerate at least 30 minutes. On a well-floured surface, roll out a small amount of the dough until it's 1/4 inch thick. Place one of the paper pattern pieces on the dough and cut around the edges. Gently, using the spatula, lift the dough and place it on the prepared cookie sheet. Put all scraps into a bowl and cover. Save these for the kids to play with, or to make gingerbread men.

To make windows and the door: Cut out a rectangle from the appropriate side. Cut the window in half to make shutters. Fill empty window holes with crushed life-savers to form stained glass windows.

To make the chimney: Cut out a rectangle big enough to hold pieces of the chimney. When the baked dough is still warm and soft, lay the pattern on top and cut out the pieces.

Preheat the oven to 325 degrees F. Bake 15-20 minutes or until slightly firm. Let cool on racks until firm enough to handle. Peel the foil off the sections and set the pieces aside to dry thoroughly overnight.



Icing Glue:

This recipe is for a single batch. You will probably need several, but if you make them all at once, keep them in separate bowls; it dries very quickly and is like cement. Keep it well covered; one piece of saran wrap touching the icing itself and another on the bowl.

3 Egg Whites

1 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar

3 - 3 1/3 cups icing sugar

In a large bowl, beat the egg whites until they begin to foam. Add the cream of tartar and beat until the whites are stiff but not dry. Gradually beat in the icing sugar, beating for about 5 minutes until it reaches spreading consistency. Keep it covered and refrigerated until needed.

To Assemble:

Cover the plywood base with aluminum foil. Pipe (or spread with a knife) two straight lines of glue at a 90 degree angel from each other; one for a side wall and another for an end wall. Pipe glue on the side wall where it will meet the end wall. Place walls on base, touching each other. Hold them in place until they are dry enough to stand on their own (about 15 minutes, and you can use those pop cans as support).

Repeat with the remaining two walls, running a line of icing blue along the corners so that all the walls are glued together. Again hold walls in place until the glue is dry. Let the roof-less house dry at least 30 minutes until the icing is firmly set.

Banish small children from the kitchen; find an extra pair of hands. Pipe a lot of icing along the tops of all the walls. Run a thick line along one long side of a roof. Stick the two roof sections together at an angle and sit the two pieces on top of the house. Make sure that the roof overhang is the same at both ends of the house. Hold the roof gently in place until it dries (the pop cans should be the right height to support them). Let dry half an hour. While the roof is drying, attach the door to the doorway by running a line of icing glue down one side and along the base. Make sure the door is open wide enough to slide a small flashlight inside later (so you can appreciate the stained glass windows). To attach the chimney: on one sidelof the roof near the peak, glue one angled piece to the roof. Glue the largest rectangle to the angled piece, then glue the second angled piece in place. Lastly, if there's room, glue the smallest rectangle to the other sections. Hide any mistakes under a "snow" of icing.

Let the house dry until completely solid, preferably overnight.



I was so inspired over getting lumber to strip the cracks of our room box house in November 1880 that I at once set about to celebrate Christmas. I ordered from Fort Worth the makings of a Christmas tree, but owing to the slowness of an ox team, our only mode of transportation, the supplies failed to arrive until the first of March. We, therefore, had to content ourselves with the eats which were mostly native products.

I prepared for the Christmas dinner two wild turkeys which, as usual at that time of the year, are very lean and dark, but larded liberally with strips of bacon (the bacon coming from wild hogs killed on the range) with excellent dressing, they were voted a great success. Antelope stew with sinkers (cowboy name for dumplings) anison steak, boiled hams of the aforesaid wild hogs, rice and can corn (the only cereal and vegetable on the ranch. Apple pies, made of dried apples, a wash tub full of doughnuts. I had put up liberal amount of wild plumb jelly in the summer, and this was served for cranberries. I had brought with me from the east some popcorn, which I popped and made into balls. I think the cowboys really enjoyed these more than anything. This dinner was partaken by all of the cowboys on the ranch and a lunch fixed for each to carry back to his line

The first Christmas tree in the town of Matador was in the year of 1893 and those were very unique in arrangements. As one party said he had seen more than a million Christmas trees, and had never seen one managed that way before.

These Christmas trees of the early nineties would be a novelty now. As I remember them the bulk of the presents were California pants and

Stetson hats. The louder the plaid of the pants the more prominent position they were given on the tree.



Bourbon and Chocolate Pecan Pie

I cup sugar V4 cup butter - melted 3 eggs - slightly beaten 3/4 cup light corn syrup 1/4 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons bourbon I teaspoon vanilla 1/2 cup chopped pecans 1/2 cup chocolate chips 1 (9-inch) pie shell

Cream sugar and butter. Add eggs, syrup, salt, bourbon, and vanilla. Mix until blended. Spread pecans and chocolate chips in bottom of pie shell. Pour filling into shell. Bake in a 375 degree oven for 40 to 50 minutes. Yield: 6 - 8 servings.




4 cups granulated sugar I cup light (not dark) corn syrup I cup water V4 tsp. salt 3 egg white (room temperatures) I cup walnuts, chopped I tsp. vanilla food coloring

Combine sugar, corn syrup, water, and salt in heavy saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture starts to boil. Continue cooking until mixture forms soft ball when tested in cold water (or use a thermometer). In the mean time, beat egg whites until stiff. Then pour 1/2 cup of syrup over whites, beating fast all the time. Continue to cook remaining syrup, leaving egg whites to continue beating all the time, until syrup reaches the light crack stage when dropped in cold water (this will happen quickly). Pour remaining syrup over egg white mixture, beating all the while. Continue beating until candy begins to hold its shape. Stir in vanilla and nuts and food coloring. Drop by teaspoonsful onto waxed paper.

Note: Recipe will not work if it is damp/humid weather. Test the hardness of the syrup in a small bowl filled with water that has been chilled with ice cube. When you drizzle some of the syrup into the bowl it is ready when it stays "floating" in the air and does not sink to the bottom. Work real fast. Test a spoonful on waxed paper, if it keeps its shape after just a second you can start to spoon. If you wait until it is too firm, the last 1/2 of the batch will be too difficult to spoon out. You can poor this into a foil lined pan that has been Pam sprayed, then cut into squares if you are not com-

fortable spooning it out.



Ingredients: 1/2 cup butter or margarine V3 cup granulated sugar V4 teaspoon baking powder I cup all-purpose flour I ounce semisweet chocolate, melted and cooled V4 teaspoon peppermint extract Several drops food coloring (optional)

In a medium mixing bowl beat the butter or margarine with an electric mixer on medium to high speed for 30 seconds. Add the sugar and baking powder, beat till combined. Beat in as much of the flour as you can with the mixer. Stir i any remaining flour with a wooden spoon. Divide dough in half. Place half of the dough in a small bowl. Stir in melted chocolate, then knead dough till chocolate is evenly distributed. Knead peppermint extract and, if desired, food coloring into remaining dough. Shape each half of dough into a ball. Wrap in waxed paper or plastic wrap. Chill for 2 hours, or till firm. On a lightly floured surface, shape each half of dough into a log about 4 inches long. Roll and/or pat each log to a 6x3 inch rectangle. Cut each rectangle in half lengthwise, forming two 6x1 1/2 inch rectangles. Stack all 4 rectangles on top of each other, alternating chocolate and peppermint dough. Cut the stacked layers into V4-inch thick slices. Place about I inch apart on ungreased cookie sheets. Bake in a preheated 375 degree F oven for 8-10 minutes, or until bottoms are a light golden brown. Remove cookies and cool on a rack.

Christmas Tree Spice Cookies

Ingredients: 1 cup (2 sticks) unsalted butter I cup granulated sugar I large egg 1/2 cup honey 4 1/2 cups all-purpose flour 3/4 teaspoon double-acting baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 2 teaspoons ground ginger I teaspoon cinnamon Multicolored sugar for garnishing (optional)



In a bowl, cream the butter and granulated sugar together until very light in color. Add the egg and honey and continue beating until the mixture is light and fluffy. Sift the flour, baking powder, salt, ginger, and cinnamon together and stir into the butter-sugar mixture. Wrap the cookie dough in wax paper and chill in the refrigerator for one hour. Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F. Roll out the chilled dough until it is about 1/4-inch thick and cut it with a 3 to 3 1/2 inch cookie cutter. Place the cookies on a lightly greased baking sheet and sprinkle them with multicolored sugar. Bake for about 12 minutes, or until the cookies are golden. Makes about 2 dozen cookies.
