CATTLE ARE IN GOOD SHAPE FOR WINTER

Austin, Texas, " - Most areas in Texas report cattle in good condition to go into the winter, and with average weather conditions from now on, no heavy feeding is expected to be necessary, according to a joint report issued Tuesday by the United States Department of Agriculture. Division of crop and live stock estimates, and the Texas Department of Agriculture, division of agricultural statistics.

Practically all areas report a surplus of feed available. The movement of live stock to feed lots increased during November, but there still are a large number of calves and young steers available to move during the next thirty to sixty days () | | | |

Plenty of range feed is available in the sheep and goat area. fowever, moisture is needed for winter weeds and wild rye. Little moisture has fallen in the sheep country for from thirty to ninety days, only a few favored localities receiving moisture during November. Most areas report plenty of water for present needs, but all sections would be benefited by rains. A surplus of feeds is reported, and no shortage is expected this year unless weather conditions become unusually severe.

The condition of sheep and lambs at 84 per cent of normal compares with 89 per cent a month ago, 82 per cent a year ago and 88.9 per cent as the ten-year average. The shortage of green feed caused some shrinkage in sheep and lambs during November, however, most of the animals are in good flesh. Reports indicate that a large number of both ewe and wether lambs stillare unsold, and that the carryover this year of both ewe and mutton lambs will be fairly large.

If conditions are favorable for early grazing, the market movement from Texas may be expected to be large again next spring.

#### ENGLAND-RUSSIA ARE NOW NEGOTIATING

LANGE Do. :1 - Great Britain and Russia opened negotiations Thursday for a new commercial treaty to replace the one which Great Britain denounced Oct. 17.

Negotiations had been threatened by demand for an apology from Moscow for an article in the newspaper Izvestia, but the apology was made through the Soviet Ambassador here, Ivan Mai-

Britain canceled the old treaty because of her commitments made at the Ottawa Imperial Conference. Canada was particularly eager to check Soviet timber exports to Britain, which under the old favored-nation agreement, were competing with increasing success against Canadian timber.

Britain now aims at concluding a new treaty without favored-nation privileges for Russia. The Russians are equally anxious to assume smooth commercial intercourse with Britain but are unwilling to concur in any discrimination against Russia, even in favor of the Dominions.

When the conference began, Maiski, referring to the fact that Britain had denounced the treaty, insisted that Britain take the initiative in making new propos-

The chief delegates at the conference were Walter Runciman, president of the Board of Trade; Lieut, Col. David Colville, head of the overseas trade department; Sir Horace Wilson, chief economic adviser to the Board of Trade; Ambassador Maiski and Alexander Ozzerski, head of the Soviet Trade Mission.
