

Matador First Baptist Church will present special services Sunday



will be awarded in the home division, with one cash prize for the top business entry in each city. The home division first place winner in each city will be eligible for a grand prize.



NASS TO CONDUCT 2002 CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE

Perhaps the best way to ensure the accuracy of the information available is to actively participate in the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service's 2002 Census of Agricul-

Census information and reports should be completed and returned to USDA by February 3, 2002.
