

Matador City Council makes changes to water policies

some changes to the city water policies when they met for their regular meeting, Thursday, June 8.

Mayor Williams said he believes the \$100 deposit now required is too high and suggested lowering the deposit to \$50. He also stated he would recommend that instead of the deposit, if a person could bring a letter of credit from their former water company, the deposit would be waived. Water Superintendent Steve Barton stated that he believes the \$10 reconnect fee is not high enough. After some discussion, it was decided to raise the fee to \$40, beginning with the July billing cycle. James Meador made a motion to accept both the

The third resolution authorized the Mayor to act as executive officer for the Grant Project. Doyle Rose made a motion to hire both firms. This was seconded by James Meador and passed with a 4-

CLINTON AND GORE ACT TO ELIMINATE MAJOR USE OF THE PESTICIDE DURSBAN

To protect the health and environment of all Americans, especially children, the Clinton-Gore Administration today announced that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the manufacturer of Dursban have agreed to eliminate the widely used pesticide for nearly all household purposes. Dursban, also known as chlorphyrifos, is the most widely used household pesticide product in the United States. Today's action will also significantly reduce residues of chlorphrifos on several foods regularly eaten by children.

"Today's action is a major step in the Clinton-Gore Administration's on-going efforts to better protect public health, especially the health of children," said EPA Administrator Carol M. Browner. "Chlorphyrifos is part of a class of older, riskier pesticides, some going back 50 years. Exposure to these kinds of pesticides that we have completed the most extensive scientific evaluation ever conducted on the potential of the poten conducted on the potential health hazards from a pesticide, it is clear the time has come to take action to to this chemical."

Chlorphyrifos is an ingredient used for a broad range of lawn and Chlorphyrifos is an ingredient used for a broad range of lawn and home insecticide products, for agricultural purposes and for termite the Quitaque Community Center. EPA is taking this action under the Food Quality Protection Act (FQPA), which was passed unanimously by Congress under the lead-ership of the Clinton Administration and signed by the President in 1996.
The FQPA requires a systematic review of all pesticides to ensure they meet the tough new safety standards that, for the first time, must be pro-

tective of children, who are among the most vulnerable to adverse health effects from pesticide resi-

Last August, the Clinton-Gore Administration announced action against methyl parathion and azinphos methyl to protect children from pesticide residues in food.

GRASSHOPPER POPULATIONS CONTINUE TO INCREASE

Grasshopper populations have increased dramatically in the last few weeks, and they are beginning to move into home gardens and landscapes. Previously, populations had around 12 to 15 grasshoppers per square foot, but now there are 15-25 per square foot in some areas. The biggest pest of the grasshopper population is the differential grasshopper. It has been hatching recently. This species produces the largest number of individuals and covers the widest area. Between 15 and 20 species of common grasshoppers are seen over the course of a year and many stages will give better results, since winged adults can migrate and
