A clear glass of sparkling wine to the jaded spirit of a forger in paradise, trying to sweep the shattered crystal of his life with the stubby broom of his hands and walking, was the night of music on Hollywood boulevard past a thick and broad midnight. The long black and silver appointments on the neck of wealth and luxury, her red or chestnut hair, a smiling elf of a girl, and the big car through the traffic. In the rear seat were headed youths who had looked over the fence at her side of life, swayed two saxophones joyously as the notes of "The Ringer's Song" echoed against street and back to the hills.

Driving west the other night on a road which I have traveled more than twenty years, and watching the young moon hanging in a suspended tear on the face of darkness, I was suddenly reminded of nothing but myself and neighbors heaves, and one smaller low star were all the stars. The red, high, hill that I saw marked in my mind as I went to town, had the same contours, the same majestic yellow holes in the sable sky-line burned by the lights of fire-sides.

But the little point, stockinged saddle pony that used to wear me along the same road has gone to another range. So have the fragile dreams and the low-headed country boys who judged his flanks with the mad brush of hopes in a field and dried.

About the only thing he has changed from years spent in the middle after misfortune raked long fingers through the tidy savings of a lifetime, is health, and those legs of courage awaiting their right rises before the waters of a stream and his spirit tempered by the feel of mesquite brushing his head, toes, but the stiff catch-against the same road that stakes him to smelly city streets beyond the reach of damp sage.

Only in his eyes does the old pressure, like a wild steer under the pressure and pain of a brand, burn in awaiting the slightest weakness from the hand of fate as a signal to spring for freedom.

## STATE HIGHWAY PROGRAM ENDANGERED IN PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF TAX LAW

HOUSTON, October 16.—Unless the people of Texas "see the joker" in the constitutional amendment which places a limit upon state expenditures of \$22.50 per inhabitant for each two-year period, and defeat it at the polls on November 6, "the State's splendid highway program will be destroyed," the Texas Good Roads Association said today in a statement through its president, Judge W. O. Huggins.

"There seems no doubt that under the amendment," the statement continued, "state expenditures would have to be cut at least \$16,500,000 below present levels. Although every cent spent on highways is paid by the motorist, the fact remains that schools and highways together spend 73 cents of the state's dollar, and these two agencies would have to bear the brunt of the cut."

"The proposed amendment is not in fact a tax-relief measure, but merely a tax-shifting proposal from the state to the local communities, and the man who will suffer most is the smaller taxpayer, whose \$3,000 homestead already is exempt from state tax, but not from the local county and school taxes which ultimately will be raised."

"The deception lies in the phrase, 'state expenditures.' The highway revenues illustrate this plainly. Leaving aside the entire cost of state highway construction and maintenance, there is an additional \$25,000,000 per year in state revenues produced by motor traffic and listed as 'expenditure' which is not spent by the state at all. It is redistributed among all the counties to

lighten the burden of several types of local taxation.

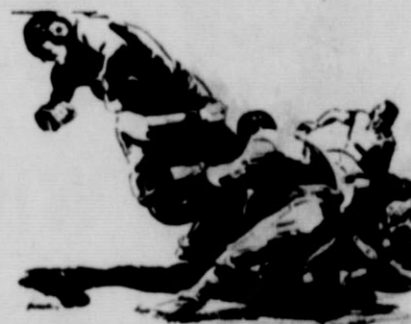
