Mr. Kelly succumbed Friday afternoon and funeral services were held at the First Baptist . Church here Saturday afternoon by Rev. A. L. Jordan.

James Kelly was born in Hunt county, Texas, near Commerce, December 12, 1866, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Will Kelly. He later moved to Erath county. He was converted and joined the Methodist Church in 1884.

Mr. Kelly moved to Matador in 1901 where he made his home until the time of his death.

WOMEN DRIVERS

For years women have been subjected to gibes because of supposed inferiority as automodrivers. But a recent survey by national board of casualty unde writers reveals that women driver figure in far less accidents than mer, members considered.

Estimates from various sources including government statistics, indicate that women constitute approximately one-fourth of the total number of drivers in the country. Yet, while women represe t 25 per cent of the number of divers, last year they were involved in only 7.63 per cent of the accidents recorded.

In the observance of traffic regulations, women made an even impressive record. While full statistics are not available, in dozen large cities only 2.53 per cent of those charged with violations of traffic officers are more an inquiry addressed to a large number of these officers brought responses decidedly favorable to the ladies.

Of the replies received, 78 per cent of the officers considered women more careful divers than men; 11 per cent thought women equally carefully, and only I1 per cent believed women less careful.

So, in the face of the record, it appears that women are much safer drivers than men, after all, when they are actually at the wheel. How safe they may be as back seat drivers is an entirely different matter.-Citizen, Key

UNDERCONSUMPTION

Since the war every business lull, every increase in unemployment, has been attributed to overproduction. It has become popular to diagnose every economic maladjustment as overproduction Manufacturers, farmers and workers are being told that they are producing too much. In recent years world production of raw materials and foodstuffs has increased more than twice as fast

as the population. There seems to be a surplus of most worldly goods, but in the final analysis it is an inaccuracy to say that the world is producing more than it needs. The fact is that it isn't consuming as much as it should. Consumption should be increased, rather than production diminished.

Today the real economic problem of the United States is to increase the purchasing power of the consumer. Factories and farms are producing more than the people can buy, not more than they can consume. The commonest phrase is. "I would buy if I had the money." - Star-Republican, Blanchester, Ohio.


