





BALANCING GRAINS. PASTURE AND PRO-TEIN SUPPLEMENTS

Professor, in charge of swine, animal husbandry department feeds can be grouped under several different classifications, but for the purpose of balancing live stock rations they may be divided into two big classes. Those feeds that are high in starch. sugar, oils, or a combination of these substances, are classified as carbonaceous feeds and usually have a high net energy content. This group is represented by the cereal grains and certain commercial by-products. Those roughages that are not of legumninous orgin are also classified as carbonacious feeds, but have a much lower net energy content than the cereal group and most of the by-products from the cereal grains.

As a result of the crop reduction ; program combined with a very favorable crop season, Texas is going to produce an extremely large amount of the kinds of feeds listed above. Since the same thing is true of other farming areas it will be necessary that as much feed as possible be fed on farms where it is produced. The other group of feeds referred to above under the general classification are not produced in large quantities on the farms, with certain exception.


This other group is usually titled protein supplement feeds in that they are high in the nutrient

protein and are used to supplement the carbonacious feeds which are often referred to as the basic part of the live stock rations. farms, but in most cases, are sold South







### **Economist Describes Conflict Between Opposing Social Views on Central Bank**

Agitation for government banking

is a phase of the conflict between our present "personal competitive enterprise system" in America and the "compulsory state collective security system" of several European States, Virgil Jordan, President National Industrial Conference Board, says in "Banking" published by the American Bankers Association.

"They involve irreconcilable principles of buman conduct and philosophy of life and the conflict between them is the key to the economic, social and political struggles of today." Mr. Jordan says.

The enterprise system of which the development of the United States has been the unparalleled example, depends for its motive power of progress upon the inexhaustible reservoir of energy in individual desire for personal advancement in prosperity, but it guarantees nothing to the individual save freedom of opportunity," the article says.

The collectivist security system, he says, "places all emphasis upon the maintenance of a minimum standard of living for the mass without regard to the creative power of the individual. Quite simply the se curity system involves the modern form of the philosophy of the slave society." He continues:

### A Sign Of the Times

"The many-sided movement toward governmental banking, deposit insurance and currency management is the most direct and decisive expression of the universal instinctive search for security which is the sign of the times. in America our so-called social security legislation is an important indication of the drift away from the enterprise system toward a collectivist security system with concentration of authority in a Federal government. "The nationalization of credit is crucial and indispensible for com-

plete state control of the complex industrial and business structure of relation of the state to credit goes which might incur its resentment.

# **GOVERNMENT BANK** UNSUITED TO U.S.

Would Serve Politics Rather Than Business Needs. Says R. S. Hecht. Citing Previous Experiences.

QUOTES PRESIDENT JACKSON

Extent and Diversity of This Country Presents Different Situation From Europe and Makes

Regional Banking Necessary.

WASHINGTON, D. C.-A refutation of arguments in favor of a government-owned central bank system for the United States is presented in a statement by R. S. Hecht, President of the American Bankers Association, on the basis of exhaustive studies of European central banks. He also points out the disastrous consequences of previous central bank experiments in America.

"Our present regional Federal Reserve System under private ownership is infinitely better for this country than would be a governmentowned and controlled central bank." Mr. Hecht says. "If history teaches us anything, it is that it is almost certain that a central bank so owned would be run to meet the varying exigencies of the government in power rather than to serve the commercial needs of the country."

Central banking has been tried twice in the United States, but was finally abolished because the credit control which the central banks exercised became objectionable and unpopular, he goes on to say.



Subservient to Popular Demands

"Moreover, history has proven that any banking system entirely owned and dominated by the gov ernment usually demonstrates much greater ability in aiding expansion of credit than in putting on the brakes at the right time to preveat undue inflation by restraining and contracting credit. This is easy to understand because in times of depression everyone is urging the gov ernment to make money and credit easy and to encourage expansion.

"On the other hand, it always ha been and always will be a difficult task for any government to call a halt in time of apparent prosperity because in the very nature of things the government would be very sensitive to public criticism and would hesitate to take any action which would tend to curtail business ac tivity. It is such undue susceptibil ty to popular demands which makes government hanking inherently wenk.

"Our studies show that of all the central banks at present existing there are only four whose owned by the governmen

The American Boulers tion. Mr. Hecht says, is convinced that a central bank would not be in the interest of the public or the banks. Its position, he concludes, is well understood by the President and the leaders in his Administration, for we have been absolutely trank with them in all of our discussions and have missed no opport tunity for emphasizing that in our opinion no banking system will, in the long run, he sound if it is dominated entirely by the ever-changing political administrations. We should do all we can to keep our banking mechanism as far removed from paritsan politics as possible,"

You have two Thompson cases. both involving murder, and a Texas judge has cited three editors and three reporters of a Houston newspaper for contempt for printing testimony in the Clyde Thompson

While this contempt case is being aired, we have a spectacle of two thousand persons in the Gerald Thompson murder case in Peoria tearing a door from its hinges in the attempt to get into a court room.

This places the editor between the devil and the deep sea, threatened that he cannot report a case. or if he does, he will be in contempt. If you were to carry out the contentions of the Texas judge you would be barred from carry ing publicity of the incident which marred the trial in Illinois, Judge Munson of Texas ruled that no evidence should be printed as it might hinder efforts to obtain a jury

jury. The newspapermen have ethics as well as judges have and in the vast majority of cases they follow them. In other words, no news-paper would want to inject pre-judice by printing other than the facts as they are brought out at a facts as they are brought out at a preliminary hearing or in the complaint field. A newspaper is a medium for presenting to the peo ple the facts and even then there are many who believe that they can get more by attending a court session than they can by reading their newspapers.

In Peoria women and girls made up nearly two thousand who tore the hinges off a door in order to get into the court room and then giggled and laughed at certain testimony that was presented. Does the judge form Texas have in mind that failure to publish news of a murder trial will react favorably upon interested spectators or destroy their desire for hearing the sordid testimony? We think that the Texas judge was unreasonable in his request. If he had called the newspaper writers into chambers and asked them to | exercise their best judgment in the news printed he would have accomplished far more than he could hope to by threats of contempt. For instance, let us take the Peoria case. Suppose the judge tried to apply the same remedy the Texas judge. Not only would there have been an increased storming of that court house but more than an encouragement of greater mob rule.

The general public pays for the maintenance of the courts and the salaries of judges and when there is crime committed you cannot hope to cover up or conceal the evidence. The people are entitled to it as long as there is no violatof rules of court procedure and the newspaper that fails in this respect would immediately be placed in a class of failing to
