



**BALANCING GRAINS. PASTURE AND PROTEIN SUPPLEMENTS**

Professor, in charge of swine, animal husbandry department feeds can be grouped under several different classifications, but for the purpose of balancing live stock rations they may be divided into two big classes. Those feeds that are high in starch, sugar, oils, or a combination of these substances, are classified as carbonaceous feeds and usually have a high net energy content. This group is represented by the cereal grains and certain commercial by-products. Those roughages that are not of leguminous origin are also classified as carbonaceous feeds, but have a much lower net energy content than the cereal group and most of the by-products from the cereal grains.

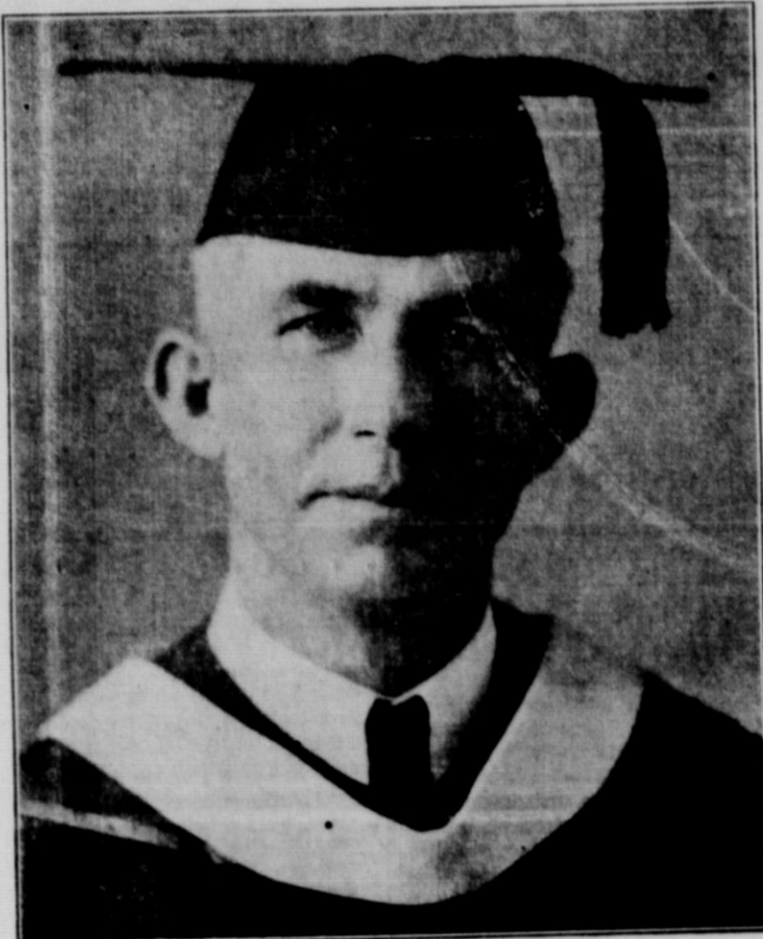
As a result of the crop reduction program combined with a very favorable crop season, Texas is going to produce an extremely large amount of the kinds of feeds listed above. Since the same thing is true of other farming areas it will be necessary that as much feed as possible be fed on farms where it is produced. The other group of feeds referred to above under the general classification are not produced in large quantities on the farms, with certain exception.

This other group is usually titled protein supplement feeds in that they are high in the nutrient protein and are used to supplement the carbonaceous feeds which are often referred to as the basic part of the live stock rations. These feeds are produced on the farms, but in most cases, are sold from the farm and come back to the feed lot as a by-product of commercial products. The by-products that are high in protein are such feeds as cotton seed meal, packinghouse tankage, linseed meal, wheat shorts and wheat bran.

Skim milk is a protein feed and is available on many farms for swine feeding. Since the grains are available and a major portion of the protein supplement has to be purchased it is too often a tendency for the live stock feeder to feed unbalanced rations. This is not a good practice and should be avoided. There is always a relationship between price of feeds and almost without exception protein supplements can be bought at prevailing prices and economically fed in combination with the home grown grains.

There are cases where the amount of the purchased protein supplements may be reduced materially by proper feed production

and feeding practices. Young pastures and a legume pasture are fairly high in protein content and should be used as much as possible as pasture in all cases is a very cheap feed and can be used to an advantage in feeding dairy cattle and all breeding herds.

For dairy cattle, fattening cattle, fattening sheep and fattening swine, the need for additional protein supplements will vary according to several factors such as age and class of animal.

We can in a general way state certain thumb rules that will be an aid in formulating rations. However, it will be necessary to get specific information in regard to specific problems. Swine ration should as a rule contain about 10

percent protein supplement provided skim milk is not available. If skim milk is available there is no better protein supplement for hogs. One gallon per head per day will balance hog rations for any kind of feeding in dry lot. When hogs are on pasture one-half gallon milk per head per day will be sufficient.

A combination of one-half cotton seed meal and one-half tankage comprising 10 percent of the total ration is suggested for hog feeding. The wheat products when the price justifies may almost always be used for protein supplements in swine rations. In the fattening of cattle two to three pounds of cotton seed meal per

1000 pound live weight per day is a suggested amount to balance up the grain ration. Less cotton seed meal may be fed if a good quality legume hay is being fed as the roughage part of the ration. Similar suggestions will apply to sheep for fattening purposes. In dairy cow feeding the amount of protein supplement feed used is determined by the amount of milk produced, per cent of butter fat of the milk, and the amount and kind of pasture available. One part of protein feed to four parts grain may be fed to milking cows when carbonaceous hays are fed and less when legume hays are fed.

Ration combinations should not only be balanced as to carbonaceous and protein content but the feed in the combination should be suitable to the animal being fed and also should produce a quality product. Other factors are just as important as protein feeding and should be taken care in planning the ration combination. These factors, vitamins and minerals other than common salt, may largely be taken care of through the use of green pasture or well cured legume hays.

### Seven Cities Of Gold To Be Shown Texas Centennial

DALLAS, Texas, Sept. 2.—The romance of sixteenth century Spain will be woven into the theme of the Texas Centennial Exposition, which opens here next June, by the division of the grounds into seven sections representing the Seven Cities of Cibola.

These seven legendary treasure cities, whose streets the conquistadors believed were paved with gold and whose walls were studded with jewels, were the "will-o'-the-wisps" which ever flickered ahead of Spanish exploration.

Cabeza de Vaca, shipwrecked on Galveston Island in 1528, first heard of these mystic cities from his Indian captors. He carried the news of the treasure trove to Spanish settlements south of the Rio Grande and several expeditions explored Texas in the hope of finding them.

Francisco de Coronado in 1540 crossed the prairies of West Texas marking his trail with stakes and buffalo bones so he could find his way back, thus naming the Staked Plains in this section. He went north into Kansas and circled into Western New Mexico. He found no treasure. The cities of the legend were at the rainbow's end. In New Mexico he captured half a dozen squalid Zuni pueblos, the lintels of their doorways being decorated with blue turquoise matrix. They were probably the jeweled cities of Cibola. However, he did open the Southwest for future Spanish settlement.

The uncounted wealth of Texas, which has developed from Coronado's exploration, will be displayed in the seven sections of the Centennial Exposition. Each section will be named for one of the legendary cities. In great exhibition palaces will be shown the heritage of the conquistadores, cotton, corn, oil, and cattle and all the tremendous industrial and natural resources of the Southwest.

Because they did not wish either to interrupt his work at this particular juncture or to postpone the conferring of this degree, the Regents still further departed from general custom by voting unanimously to confer the degree in absentia at this commencement."

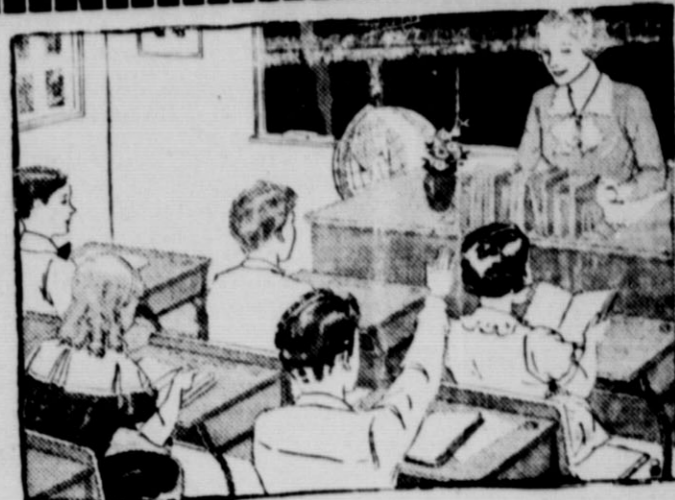

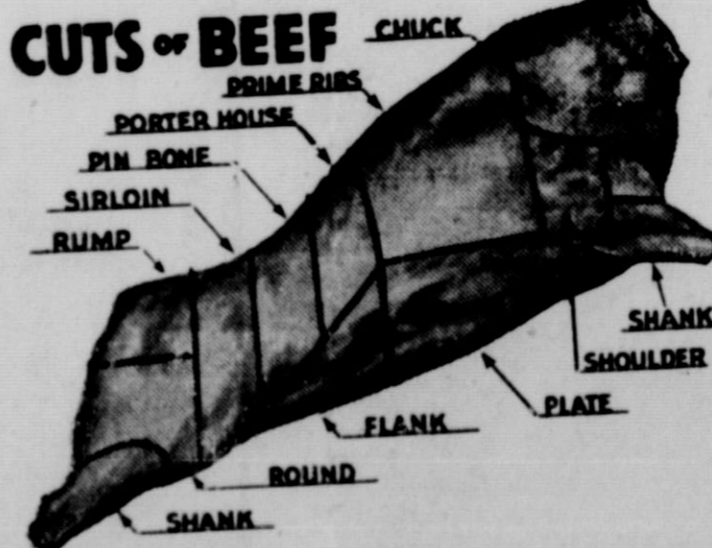

### Fine Training Is Offered Recruits In Army Openings

Ten musicians are wanted by the U. S. Army Band at Fort Bliss, El Paso, Texas. Recruits must be from eighteen to Thirty-five years old and without dependents. Preference will be given men who play two or more instruments.

There are a number of other vacancies in various branches of the army service stationed at Fort Bliss, including Cavalry, Field Artillery, Quartermaster Corps, Medical Department, Veterinary Service, Ordnance department and Signal Corps. Men who have the equivalent of an eighth grade education and are in excellent physical condition, who have no dependents, are eligible to fill these vacancies. They will receive a mental and physical examination at the Lubbock recruiting office and if found qualified they will be furnished meals, lunches, and transportation to El Paso.

Service in the Army assures a healthful outdoor life. It is the big effort of the Army to train men mentally, morally and physically, so that they will make better and stronger citizens when returned to civil life. With this in view the Army maintains various schools where a man can learn a variety of trade which will help him in later life. These schools are not compulsory, but men are encouraged to attend them. In addition to the military and vocational training, all kinds of sports and athletics take up a good part of the soldier's time. Evenings are usually spent by the soldier in his organization's recreation room where there are pool tables, all kinds of reading matter, a radio and other amusements. Many of the soldiers use the recreation room for pinochle and bridge games. There are large roomy chairs in which he can comfortably relax. In addition to the various assortment of books to be found here, a post library is maintained, where the soldier may borrow the kind of reading matter he desires. Two large theatres are maintained at Fort Bliss for the entire Army personnel including families of those who are married. Up-to-date moving pictures are shown and the show changes every night. Dances are usually held in the Army Y. M. C. A. in El Paso, and Army buses make regular trips to and from El Paso, usually at night without cost to the soldier. Other forms of shows are also shown at Fort Bliss. A number of clubs have been in existence there for some years and they present shows at the theatres or at the club rooms, sometimes composed of native talent, sometimes featuring a traveling stock company or a musical comedy review. 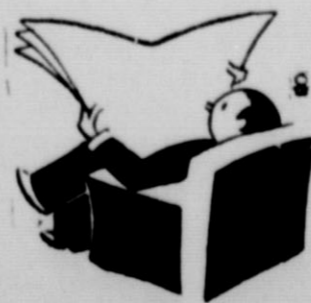

crosswise of the pans under the cover, so that evaporation can proceed easily.

The quantity of high life should be figured at the rate of 10 pounds per 1,000 cubic feet of space. Include the entire cubic space of the bin and the grain.

"Fumigation should continue for at least 24 hours," the entomologist stated. "In case the grain is going to be used for feed, a longer period is desirable. Continued fumigation of more than 24 hours will injure the germination of grain intended for planting. Windows should be opened after fumigation and quick, thorough ventilation is recommended."

Reppert concluded by saying, "that if a tight bin is not available, a pile of grain may be covered or a small bin inclosed with canvas and fumigation carried out under the canvas. Edges of the canvas should be covered lightly with dirt to prevent the loss of the gas."

RELIEF ROLLS REDUCED WITH COTTON FIELDS

AUSTIN, Aug. 26 (Sp1)—As the cotton picking season gradually spreads over Texas, Relief Commission officials are re-emphasizing their demands that every available cotton picker be taken off relief rolls and told to get a cotton sack.

District administrators have been told to see that no able-bodied relief client be allowed to stay on the relief rolls so long as there is a job for him in the cotton fields. Despite pest infestation, the cotton crop in Texas apparently will be appreciably large, it is indicated, and relief officials insist that there be a commensurate drop in the relief load in cotton picking areas.

What effect getting off Federal Emergency Relief Administration rolls now to pick cotton will have on a client's chances of being certified to the Works Progress Administration rolls late in the fall when the cotton picking season is over, has been explained thus: It will not jeopardize his chances at all. Fumigation Will Cut Grain Losses

College Station—Fumigation is the most practical way of cutting down loss of grain from weevils, R. R. Reppert, Extension entomologist, said recently.

"Carbon bisulphide, commonly known as 'high life,' Reppert said 'is recommended for fumigation. High life is sold as a liquid and turns into a heavy gas. In working with this chemical, it is to be remembered that the liquid is inflammable and the gas explosive. Keep fires and lights away while fumigating. Air temperature should be 70 degrees or above before starting."

He outlined the following method of procedure for controlling weevils. Spread high life in wide shallow pans with broad evaporating surface so that a square foot of evaporating surface is provided per pound of high life. Set the pans on top of the grain in the bins. Where the bin is open above, then the grain—pans and all should be covered with canvas or wet blankets, sticks being laid
