



Five Bus Passengers Besides bus-driver Lowery, who had been driving busses for the passengers, Bill Plemons, of Matador, Raymond Davis, and a sixyear old girl traveling with Mr. and Mrs. Davis, received bruises and minor scratches. The driver of the oil truck also escaped ser-

ious injury. Slippery Pavement

While details of the cause of the accident are lacking, it is believed that the driver of the bus, upon meeting the oil truck at a curve, attempted to apply his brakes, causing the big vehicle to skid on the wet pavement made slippery by rains which fell in this section Tuesday night. Apparently, visitors to the scene of the wreck declared the bus skidded directly into the empty oil truck, bursting a fifty gallon gas tank behind the driver's cab, which immediately spread over the wreck and burst


