Norris, math.

School Opens in R. S. on August 28

Roaring Springs school will open August 28 and busses will run in time to bring students to school for the 9 a.m. general assembly in the auditorium, it was announced by Supt. Glenn Sanders. Lunches will be served in the lunchroom and students should come prepared for a full day of classes.

Supt. Sanders said that his faculty is complete and also announced that the school will observe Labor Day, Sept. 4, as a holiday.

Rites Held For John K. Crews Former Banker

Memorial services for J. K. Crews, 84, retired banker and rancher were held at 11 a.m. Wednesday in the Grace Presbyterian Church, Plainview, with the Rev. Robert McGehee, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Childress Cemetery under the direction of Lemons Funeral Home, Plainview.

Mr. Crews, who served as president of the Hale County State Bank from 1934 to 1938, died Tuesday morning at his home at 503 Milwaukee in Plainview, after a two weeks illness.

He moved to Plainview from Matador to establish the Hale County State Bank, after making his home here for nine years, as executive Vice-President of the National Bank. He had earlier served as president of a bank at Dodson, where he had farming and ranching interests. At the time of his death he served on the Board of trustees at the Hale County State Bank, and had ranching interests in Hale County and oil interests in eastern New Mexico.

A native Texan, Mr. Crews lived the early part of his life in Childress, his parents having homesteaded there. He is the last of the Crews children and was a brother of the late J. M. Crews, Childress banker for many years.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Bertha Crews, Plainview, a daughter, Mrs. Brents Norman, 2106 Lipscomb, Amarillo, one granddaughter, living in Washington, D.C., and two great-grandchildren.

STARTING AN EMPIRE - Near this site Henry H. Campbell started the Matador Ranch empire in 1878, later to become the Scotch-owned operation of as much as a million acres. The marker is located on US Highway 70 about 11 miles west of Matador. The site will soon become an elaborate roadside park. Inscription on the marker is as follows: "Henry H. Campbell (1840-1911) came from North Carolina to Texas in 1854. In the Civil War he served with the Twentieth Texas Cavalry Regiment. In 1878 he moved to a buffalo hunter's dugout 10 miles southeast to start the Matador Ranch. He obtained Scottish capital to fence, stock, and improve the brand. As superintendent, he ran 100,000 cattle on the 450,000 acre range. He made Scotsmen feel at home with afternoon tea on his ranch. He later moved cowboys to Matador to meet the legal requirements for county organization. He was elected the first Motley County judge. His home ranch is located at this site."

Oklahoma Fugitive Taken After Chase

A WILD CHASE over a 25 to 30 mile area led to the arrest of an Oklahoma fugitive wanted in connection with the armed robbery of Duke, Oklahoma, post office Thursday afternoon and ended in Motley County.

Roy Gene Bond, 23, was captured about 11 miles southeast of Matador after the 1966 Chevrolet he was driving went into a slide and stalled in a borrow ditch at the Q.A.P. Railway right of way and a farm to market road. Bond escaped into tall Johnsongrass as peace officers closed in from all sides. Two neighboring farmers, Avery Payne and Loyd Stafford drove upon the scene before the arrest, and while officers were still approaching cautiously Stafford spotted the fugitive and pointed to Deputy Bobby Williams who called to the long-haired, mustached man, to surrender. He arrested and handcuffed Bond, who spent Thursday night in the Motley County jail.

Tribune Diamond Anniversary Is Set In October

In attempting to publish the 75-year-old history of Motley County in last year's Anniversary Edition, the Tribune neglected to publish an account of its own history.

The first newspaper in Matador was printed in December 1891. Until a few years ago the Tribune had records of the first paper being printed in 1894, and dated its beginning to that date, since it is successor to all other previous publications. The masthead in this issue indicates that the Tribune is in its 74th year. A newspaper was started in Matador two years prior to 1894 however, according to copies now on file.

The Motley County News, dated Thursday, May 19, 1892, and number 23, indicates the newspaper was started in the previous December, with Clarence Nugent as editor and proprietor. Subscription price was \$1 per year.

In the personal and local items of that issue of the Tribune's predecessor are items like the following: The new store on the north side got a lot of new dry goods this week. Go to the Dew Drop Saloon for anything in the way of good drinks. Mrs. S. D. Cartwright will return home again this week. Come to Matador if you want a touch of high life. Call S. D. Cartwright for anything in the livery and feed line.

Since this newspaper under the present ownership for 33 years, has been in error in its own history, it has decided to observe its 75th anniversary this year. The observance will be held in October during National Newspaper Week. The Tribune will not give diamonds as door prizes, but it will hold open house and invite friends and patrons to visit the plant. The exact date will be announced in a later issue.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided that a majority of the qualified property taxing voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."
"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay warrants upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas; and are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:

"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority of the Parks and Wildlife Department, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called 'Texas Park Development Bonds,' shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4 1/2%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.

all bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, the moneys received from admission charges to State Parks shall be deposited to the State Parks Fund, or any successor fund which may be established by the Legislature as a depository for Park revenue earned by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks."
"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks."

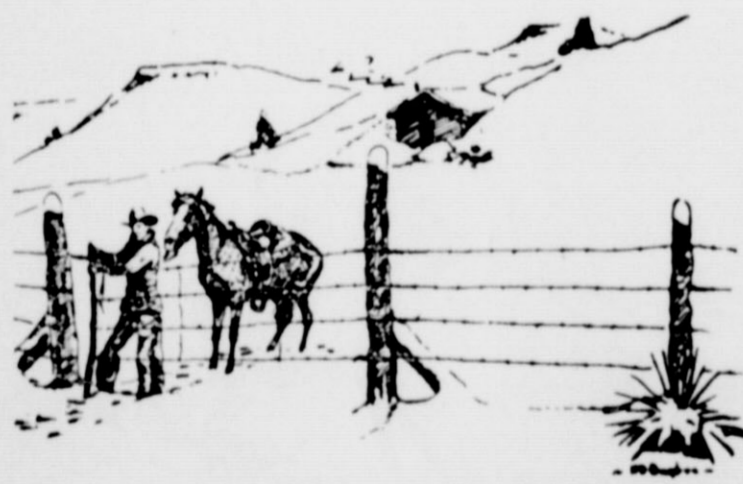

As many people still want to earn their pay, I thought you would be interested in this release from Purdue University. Even though the study was made in Indiana it also applies to other areas.

Nearly half of the 1157 students contacted said they earned over 50 per cent of their "total college expenses" and more than one third earned over 75 per cent of their college expenses. Almost 1/4 earned all of these costs.

Normally freshmen earned a smaller portion of their expenses, with the income rising as the student becomes adjusted to college life and sees more of the opportunities available to those with a college education.

The summer job is the most important way to earn college expense money. Part time work while attending, loans and scholarships are also utilized.

Results of the study showed that it is possible for anyone to obtain a college education that really

wants one, and as is the case in many instances, what a person earns, receives more consideration than what is given.

Many ornamental plants, particularly roses are heavily infested with aphids. If large numbers of aphids are feeding on a plant, its beauty is greatly marred - it becomes devitalized, and may die.

Aphids commonly known as plant lice, are small, soft-bodied, pear-shaped insects. Cornicles, a pair of small tubes projecting from the back of the body, provide positive identification. Aphids are usually one twenty-fifth to one eighth of an inch long and vary in color from light yellow to green or black.

The plant lice are destructive in that they insert their short, stout beak into the plant and suck up vital plant juices. When large numbers are present, the plants are greatly devitalized, and the leaves become curled, cupped, or distorted. When the flower buds of roses fail to develop properly, the aphids are feeding on the growing tips and flower buds of the plant.

Aphids can be controlled by treating the affected plants with Sevin, diazinon, Cygon, lindane, malathion, nicotine sulfate, or with a new granular systematic, disulfoton. Disulfoton is being marketed under various trade names. In using any insecticide be sure to read the label carefully and follow directions.

Jubilee Pageant was History Classic

Drama of County Portrayed Pioneers To Present Time



THE LADY AND THE COYBOY became Motley County's first bride and bridegroom when Miss Ella Cribbs and Daniel C. Kieth were united in marriage Dec. 23, 1891. COMMUNITY LEADERS when Motley County was organized in 1891 were Henry H. Campbell, who was elected first judge of the county, and Mrs. Campbell, who was postmistress, first at the Matador Ranch headquarters from 1883 until 1891, then in Matador when the town was organized serving until 1911. Judge Campbell founded the Matador Ranch empire in 1879 and was joined here by his wife in 1880. The cattleman's wife, who had been Miss Lizzie Bundy of Navarro county before her marriage to Campbell in 1871 found the Panhandle a rather lonely place at first. In "The Early History of Motley County," their son, Harry H. Campbell, who was born at the ranch, and still makes his home in Matador, wrote, "By that time the other settlers had gone and only the A. B. Coopers (at Tee Pee City) and the Campbells were left in the county. They lived about 20 miles apart . . . The next nearest settler to the Campbells was Mrs. Hank Smith, about 25 to 30 miles away, in Blanco Canyon . . . The Pruitts on the Wichita some 40 or 50 miles away . . . Mr. and Mrs. Docum, on Red Mud Creek in Dickens County . . . a distance of about 40 miles . . ." Another "neighbor" was Mrs. Charles Goodnight of the JA ranch 70 miles away. 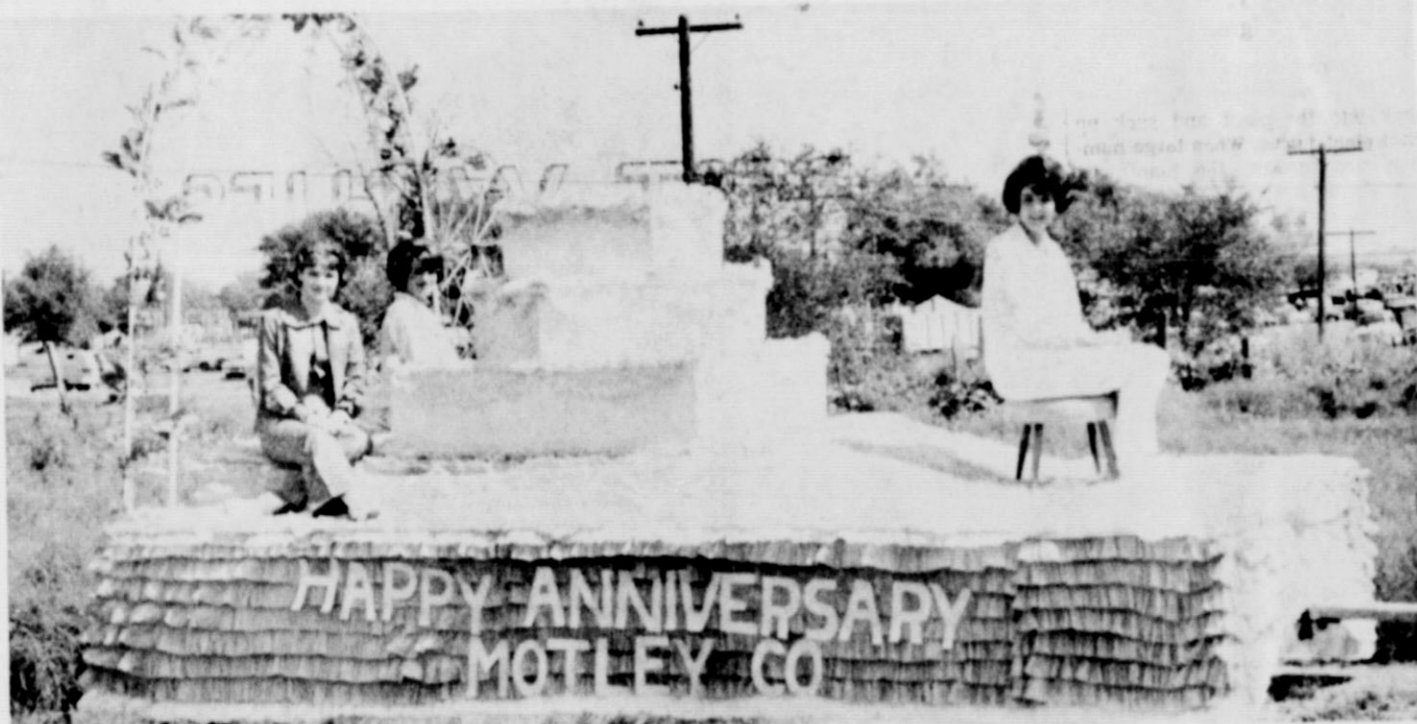

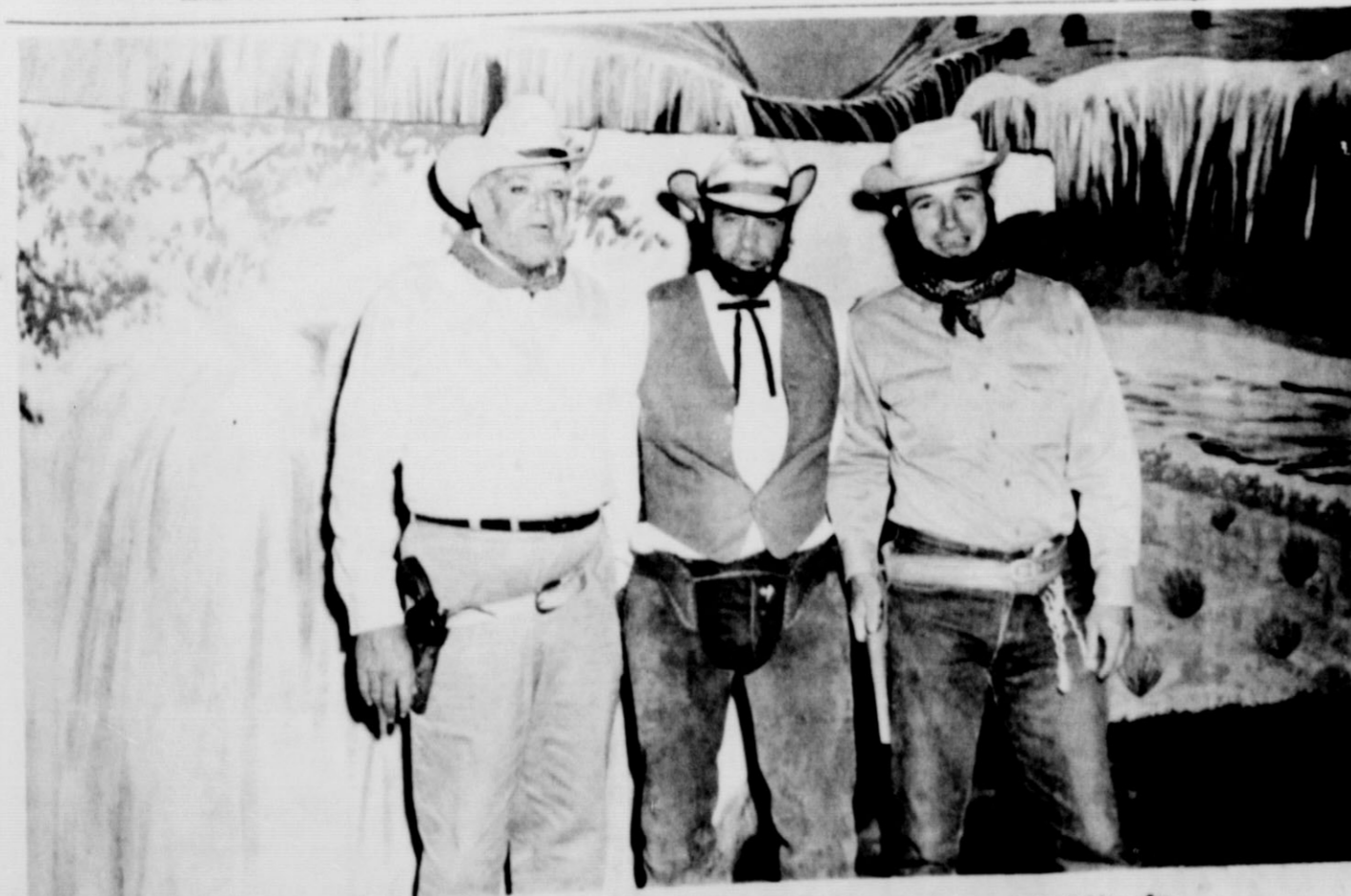
The Finale included the entire cast singing, "This is My Country," and the Queen's Court, highlighting nine candidates for Anniversary Queen.

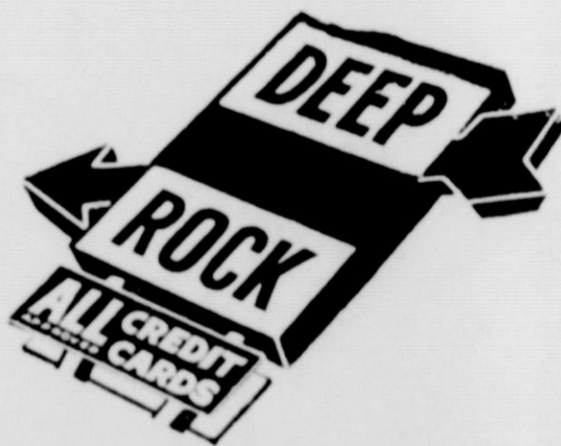

Motley County Directory Printed 50 Years Ago Listed 983 Homes

Four Towns had 81 Businesses

ONLY TWO places of business in Motley County in April 1917, conducted operation under the same name. They are the First State Bank and Matador Auto Co. (Ford Agency), both of Matador. The Motley County News then advertised as "the largest and best country weekly in the panhandle." The contrast of the changing scene of exactly half a century ago was made possible by a copy of a county directory, published here in Matador, found in the effects of late Doug Meador, by his daughter, Mrs. Elvin Markham.

The 48-page directory was laboriously set into type by hand and printed on a small press. It lists the names of all property owners in the county (with the exception of the Matador Land & Cattle Co.) and is replete with interesting advertising. Places of business (81) in Roaring Springs, Flomot, Whiteflat and Matador are listed including the professional services.

The county had five doctors at the time, with four being in Matador and one in Roaring Springs. A dentist office was also located here. It is interesting to note that five makes of automobiles were advertised in the directory and only one (Ford) manufacturer is still in business. The directory lists all the automobile owners in the county with an asterisk beside each name. Paul A. Turner was manager of the Directory Publishing Co. Stressing the need for trading in the home county, the directory publisher said he had refused mail order advertising.

In a statement in the beginning of the directory, the publisher says, "... as you well know, retail stores are the logical channels for distributing goods and that to 'trade at home' promotes the best interests of ALL. You can do your part toward helping upbuild this, your home county, by giving your preference to the merchants who show an interest in the county, rather than those who are attempting to undermine - all that they are trying to build for you."

Automobiles Pass From Scene

Four automobiles advertised in the directory included the Hypomobile, priced at \$1,285 f.o.b. factory for a fully equipped 5-passenger car. It was offered for sale by the Connell Motor Co. of Plainview. The 4-cylinder, 45 h.p. car weighed 2700 pounds. It had genuine leather upholstery, top, and rain vein windshield. The buyer also received 40 hours of free service anywhere in the United States.

Another automobile advertised in the directory was the Crow-Elkhart offered by T. E. Leckie of Matador. The car was only \$795 f.o.b. factory. It was the new power sensation of 1917, according to the advertisement which declared it could attain 40 mph in 20 seconds from a standing start.

W. T. Patton of Matador was distributor for the Carroll Motor Co. of Paducah for the Velie Six. The car came in a choice of eight body styles, and many refinements. They included greater flexibility, more power and a closer approach to absolute silence. The car had new type ignition and lighting control switch with individual key for locking; concealed metal fuse pocket in instrument board; indi-

cating dial oil gage on motor; new carburetor, complete range of adjustments making it efficient for all grades of fuel; greater road clearance due to improved axle design, etc.

D. E. Jordan of Paducah was distributor for the Saxon Six. The price was \$935 f.o.b. factory. An excerpt from the advertisement is as follows: "Repeatedly the Saxon Six has proved itself a superior car. Not alone in private use but in public competition. A case in point is the motor demonstration at the San Diego Fair when the Saxon Six won over both eights and twelves, as well as other sixes in speed hill-climbing and in quick get away."

The above four cars have long ago been lost on the bitter battlefield of competition. The automobile advertised in the directory and which may still be purchased in Matador, is the Ford offered by the Matador Auto Co. Owners were C. M. Glenn and C. B. Whitten (both deceased). Advertised as the "Best On Earth For The Money. You need one—we want your business. Let us show you."

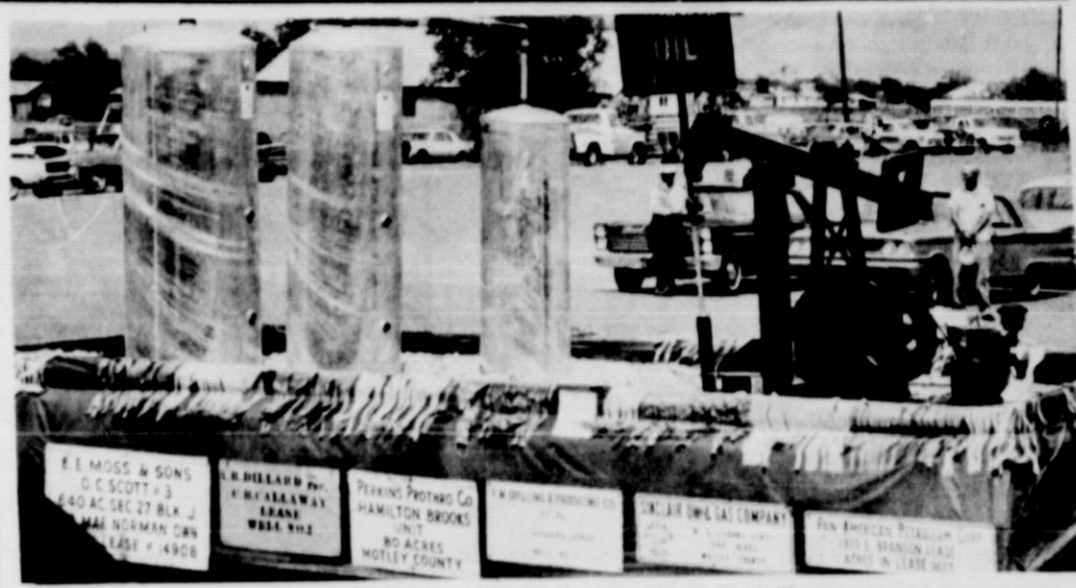

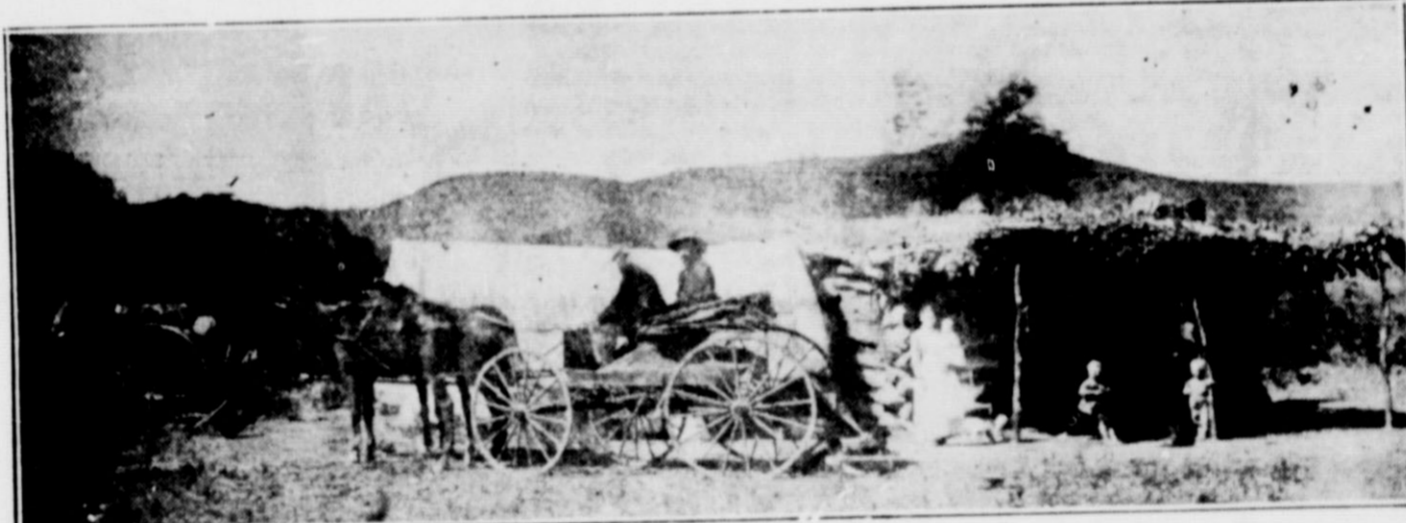

EARLY VARIETY STORE

Lem Guthrie was proprietor of the Variety Store on the south side of the square, as advertised in the 1917 directory of Motley County. He advertised his store as "The High Price Killer and Credit Buster." He

offered racket goods, the kind you are always needing at remarkably low price, and "Star Juvenile flour, the best for baking."

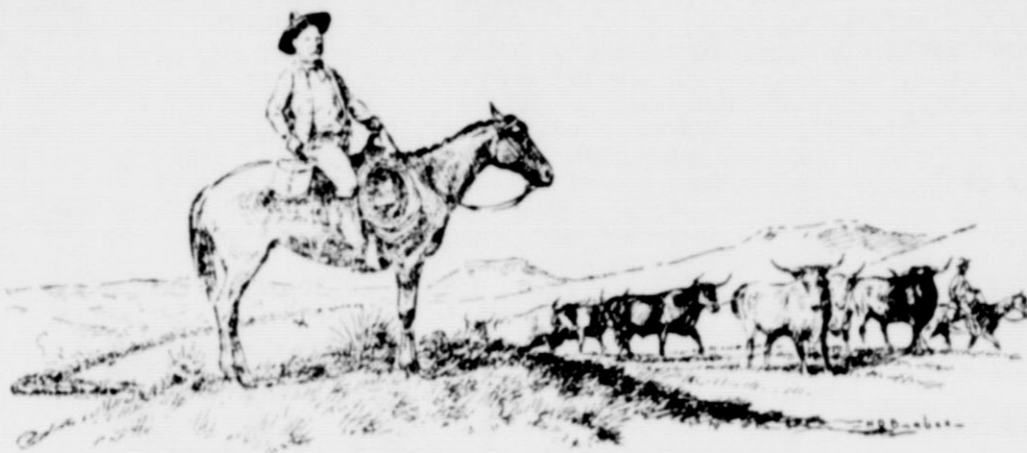
Burial was in Roaring Springs Cemetery, directed by Seigler Funeral Home.

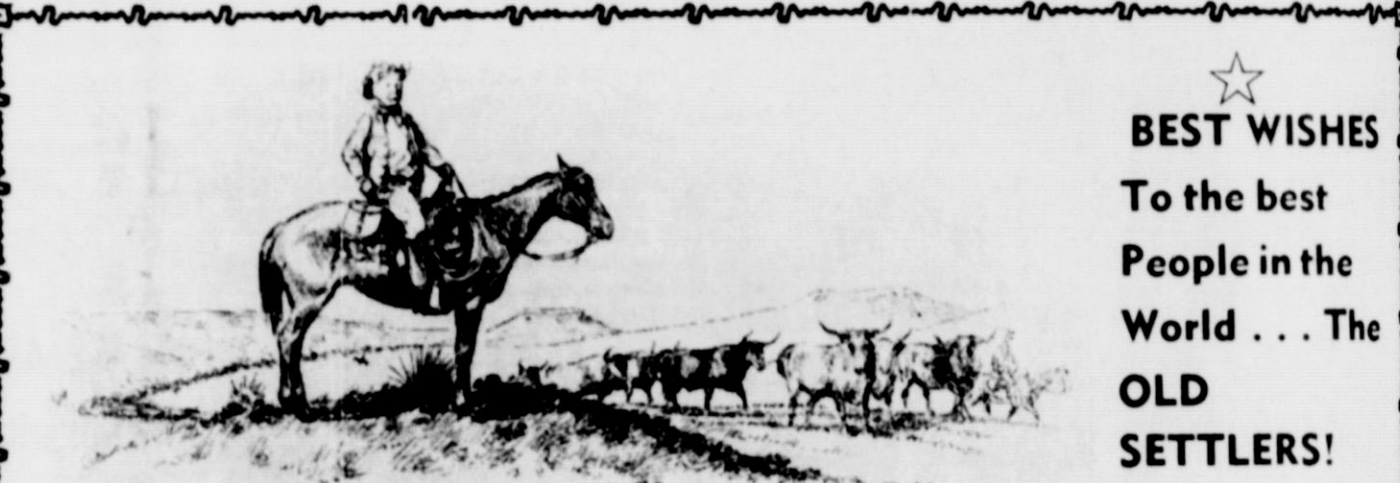
