Something always seems to be trying to shake me when I attempt to thank a friend for an act of thoughtfulness as this. I am swept with a sudden lashing of gratitude, knowing that life has no finer friends in its golden cornucopia than friendship. It is the sturdy hub on which the wheel of human relationship carries the mighty burdens of a world.

A little girl with ragged shoes stood looking with hungry eyes, her face pressed against the plate glass store window, at a large smiling doll that leaned against a small table all set with small dishes. Whatever the thoughts may have been that shaped themselves against the canvas of her heart they must have been sharp for her lips trembled just a mite as she turned and walked away. GOVERNMENT BUYS 6,000 MORE OF MOTLEY COUNTY CATTLE; TO END PROGRAM

Purchases to be Completed by December 31; Matador Land & Cattle Company to Furnish Most of Allotment

Permission to purchase six thousand additional cattle for the federal government was received Saturday by County Director, F. A. Buckley, in a letter from Geo. W. Barnes, State Drouth Director. Purchases must be completed by December 31, and all producers who wish to sell should sign the necessary papers at the County Agent's office as soon as possible. It was made clear that the present purchases are the last that will be made, definitely closing the cattle purchase program. All classes of cattle will be taken until the quota is filled. Prices and conditions are the same as in previous purchases.

Dr. J. O. Shannon, B. A. I. Inspector, and Alonzo Mayfield, appraiser, arrived in Matador Monday evening. Purchases were being made Tuesday and Wednesday at the Matador pens, where they will be continued Thursday and Friday. Purchases will be made at the shipping pens at Roaring Springs Monday and at some central point in the Northfield district Tuesday. It is contemplated that the greater part of the allotment will be taken by the Matador Land & Cattle Co., who will deliver several hundred head this week, and a like number next week.

The federal allotment received this month, which is a part of the final 225,000 allotted to Texas by the A. A. A. is partly in response to numerous appeals made to authorities by the County Agricultural Drouth Committee and the County Agent in which the deplorable drouth conditions of the county were pictured. The drouth committee is at present engaged in securing feed in carload lots at the drouth rate and at minimum cost to producers.

Homer Sheats, County Chairman of the Texas Relief Commission, announced yesterday that the local relief office would be moved from the Motley county court house to the former location of the Matador postoffice, in the State Bank building.

Stores Decorate For Christmas

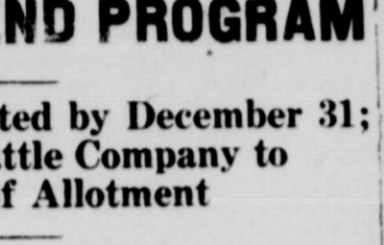
