# Legacy Exploration is a reality in Motley County

There's a lot going on near Whiteflat! Everyone in Motley County is talking about it. There have been a lot of stories around. What's all the buzz about? Legacy Exploration, that's what.

Legacy Exploration, which is owned by Mr. John Swanson of Branson, Missouri, is a natural gas operation now in full swing in Motley and Floyd counties.

"Work began on this project about seven years ago," Mr. Swanson said in an interview last week. "No one has really known anything about it until the last two years.'

"W.L. Gore and Co. has been

facilities," Mr. Swanson ex-plained. "Currently a 20 mile 12 inch line is being laid to the main transmission line located in Floyd County."

"Natural gas wells are ap-proximately 10,000 feet deep," he continued. "One well has been completed and has been tested." Mr. Swanson says he believes there will be a lot of natural gas in this area.

"Each well takes approximately 30 days to drill. After the first three wells, the process will step-up and there will probably be five drilling rigs running at one time," he explained.

Mr. Swanson explained that

Houston, and now Quitaque and Matador. "The Quitague office is more administrative and the Matador office will be a headquarters for the engineers," Mr. Swanson explained.

Carrie Buckner of Matador is the office manager for the Matador location, which is housed in the second floor above City Hall. "She keeps everything in order, answers the phone and goes back and forth between this office and the Quitaque office," said Swanson. Jerry Kohl, who recently

moved here with his family, is employed as a dozer operator.

Mr. Swanson said he appreciates the cooperation he has received from the people here. He especially wanted to thank Market Matador and the people of Matador.



According to Mr. Swanson, the main development for this project is in Motley County and will extend to Floyd County. "We think the natural gas availabil-ity will be about half and half in Floyd and Motley Counties," he said.


Mr. Swanson explained that research has shown that the gas here is very high BTU and pro-duces a lot of condensate. The condensate will be removed from the gas first. It will then be filtered through a larger facility to take out the propane and butane.

The propane/butane terminal will be located north of Whiteflat, where a large tank has already been set. The pro-pane will be trucked to a pipe-line terminal in Abilene. The condensate will be put in a BP Amoco pipeline which crosses property near Whiteflat. The dry natural gas will also go out by pipeline and an agreement with a major utility company has been made to purchase the gas. Another company will buy the propane.

"We must have thousands of acres of land for a gas line, for the reserves required, to justify the expense of the pipeline and

the project will employ contractors who will in turn employ several people to work who will most likely move here. "With this area basically being noman's land, with everything so far away, it will be necessary to bring people in," he said.

The main office for Legacy Exploration is in Arlington, Texas, with another office in "We have a lot invested in this project. All the preliminary work and front-end work has ba-sically been done," Mr. Swanson said. "Now it's time to get down to business."


The board members of Market Matador are working continually to put together land and buildings that might attract new industry to this rural community. Growth and expansion are the only means of survival for

dor, Texas.



Before guests arrived, the meeting was called to order in the living room, by president Lana Copp. The usual business was carried out. A reminder to


the members that Guest Night will be held March 13 at the Motley County School Cafeteria, and then move to the TV Room where the program will take place.





In accordance with Article IV, Section 4.06 of the Bylaws of Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, Inc., the Board of Directors has appointed a Committee on Nominations to prepare a list of nominations for Directors to be elected at the annual membership meeting of the Cooperative on April 24, 2003. Three (3) Directors, one each from District 2, District 5, and District 8, will be elected in 2003. Although Directors are nominated from the District which they represent, all members in attendance at the annual meeting vote on all candidates who may be properly nominated.

#### SECTION 4.02 QUALIFICATIONS:

No person shall be eligible to become or remain a director of the Cooperative who is a close relative of an incumbent director or an employee of the Cooperative, or is not a member in good standing of the Cooperative and receiving service within the District he represents; PROVIDED, that the operating or chief executive or any member which is not a natural person, such as a corporation, church, etc., or his designee, shall be eligible to become a director, from the Directorate District in which such member is located, if he or such designee (1) is in substantial permanent occupancy, direction or use of the premises served by the Cooperative, and (2) is a permanent and year-round resident within or in close proximity to an area served by the Cooperative; BUT PROVIDED FURTHER, that no more than one (1) such person may serve on the Board of Directors at the same time. No person shall be eligible to become or remain a director of, or to hold any other position of trust in, the Cooperative who does not have the legal capacity to enter into a binding contract or is in any way employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise, or a business selling electric energy or supplies to the Cooperative, or a business primarily engaged in selling electrical or plumbing appliances, fixtures or supplies to, among others, the members of the Cooperative. No person shall take or hold office as a Director who is the incumbent of or candidate for an elective public office in connection with which a salary is paid.

#### SECTION 4.05 DIRECTORATE DISTRICTS

The territory served by the Cooperative shall be divided into nine (9) Directorate Districts. Each District shall be represented one director and the Districts are described upon the map on the territory served by the District attached to the Bylaws and made a part hereof.

#### **SECTION 4.06 NOMINATIONS**

It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to appoint, not less than thirty (30) days nor more than one hundred eighty (180) days prior to the date of the meeting of the members at which directors are to be elected, a Committee on Nominations, consisting of not less than five (5) nor more than eleven (11) members. The Committee shall prepare and post at the principal office of the Cooperative at least twenty (20) days prior to the meeting a list of nominations for directors to be elected, listing separately the nominee(s) for each Directorate District form or with respect to which director must, pursuant to this Article, be elected at the meeting. The Committee may include as many nominees for any director to be elected from or with respect to a Directorate District as it deems desirable. Any fifteen (15) or more members of the Cooperative, acting together, may make additional nominations in writing over their signatures, listing their nominee(s) in like manner, not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting, and the Secretary shall post such nominations at the same place where the list of nominations made by the committee is posted. The Secretary shall mail to the members with the notice of the meeting, or separately, but at least ten (1) days prior to the date of the meeting, a statement of the names and addresses of all nominee(s) for each Directorate District from or with respect to which a director must be elected, showing clearly those nominated by the Committee and those nominated by petition, if any. The chairman at such meeting, after all nominations so made have been duly announced, shall call for additional nominations from the floor and shall ascertain and announce, after any nominations made from

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the floor, the particular Directorate District from or with respect to which any additional candidates have been nominated.

Agriculture Secretary Ann M. Veneman today announced that the USDA is establishing a disaster assistance working group to ensure timely and efficient implementation of program benefits contained in the \$3.1 billion disaster assistance package passed by Congress.


"We want to make sure that the disaster aid implementation is a farmer friendly process and our team at USDA is going to work to ensure that the program benefits reach producers as quickly as possible," said Veneman. "This working group will examine ways to expedite the process and cut red tape if possible to get program benefits in the hands of farmers and ranchers."

While it is still too early for USDA to determine when signup for the various disaster assistance programs will be available, this working group will begin examining program requirements and appropriate time-table. The disaster assistance programs contained in the measure will require producers to sign-up to receive program benefits through local Farm Service agency offices. This will take USDA additional time to establish regulatory guidelines and write computer software programs so county offices are able to perform sign-up when those timeframes are announced.


The working group, much like USDA's Farm Bill working group, will consist of the Secretary's Sub-cabinet offi-cials, USDA's Chief Economist, Budget Director and other ensuring appropriate planning, coordination and implementation of the disaster programs.

As part of the disaster aid implementation process, USDA will launch a new website next week for producers to utilize that will contain information about the disaster assistance programs, questions and an-swers, as well as other pertinent data. The website will also contain a comments and suggestions section to encourage producers and interested parties to provide input to USDA on how best to move the implementation process forward.


"This working group will establish the framework to analyze the new programs, put in place the timeframe for implementation and sign-up, and issue guidance to producers who are eligible to receive these benefits," said Veneman. 
