## Don't Worry, Your Neighbor Has 'Em

### Control Announced for Small, Flealike Insects

YOU THINK these small, flylike insects that hop about on floors, sink bathroom and walls have all come to you? Well, ask your neighbor. He has 'em! They are everywhere and there is a way to get around them. They are called "springtails."

They are feeding on organic matter about the base of plants, especially grass. The population builds up and houses are invaded.

Here is the answer: Chlorinated hydrocarbons, such as chlordane, can be used for their control, by spraying baseboards and foundations. If infestation is heavy, spraying the lawn will also be beneficial. It will also aid in the control of chiggers.

Armyworms Marching  
 Pallmeyer says armyworms are also appearing damaging cotton and other plants. They also may be controlled with chlordane, lindane, toxophene or DDT.

Large worms (up to three inches long) now being seen are caterpillars and do not as a rule damage crops, although they do invade flower beds. The same poisons used in the control of armyworms will be effective in their control, according to Pallmeyer.

### FIELDS OF GOLDEN grain

in Motley County are about ready for the sickle. One of the best wheat crops in more than ten years is almost ripe for harvest. While some scattered fields may be harvested this week, the principal harvest will probably start within a week or ten days.

S. J. Braselton, manager of Kimbell Elevator at Roaring Springs, said his firm is ready to receive the new crop with approved government storage or in the purchase of grain.

He said that producers who would like to make a moisture check before starting to harvest, should bring samples to the elevator.

Motley County's acreage is small compared to some former years, yet the wheat is outstanding in production per acre. Some farmers believe they have wheat that will produce 40 bushels to the acre, while 30 bushel estimates are common. It is believed the wheat harvest will give the county's economy a substantial boost.

The Tribune has received some reports of wheat over shoulder high in the Flomot community. Marvin Patton has about 75 acres of wheat 3 miles south of town which reaches halfway between the belt and shoulders of an average man.

Fear at present is hail damage. A storm in the Dimmitt area on the Plains Monday damaged wheat an estimated \$250,000. Hail was so heavy it had to be removed from the highway with a maintainer.

### FIRST 1958 WHEAT

The first load of 1958 wheat was received Tuesday by Kimbell Elevator at Roaring Springs. It was raised by F. M. Casey at Whiteflat. The yield was 35 bushels per acre. Five and one half acres produced 10,000 pounds. The wheat was sold to Kimbell for \$1.70 per bushel. Loan set on wheat is \$1.69.

### Roundup Pageant to Depict Development of 4-H in Texas During Past Fifty Years

Station, (Spec.)—Fifty years of progress in Texas 4-H is presented as a pageant in the opening program of the State 4-H Club Roundup held for June 10-12 at Texas A & M College.

The first county agent was the boys corn club in 1908 and the greatly expanded demonstration and character 4-H programs of today.

The 4-H membership has grown from the 25 corn club members in 1908 to more than 100 in Texas and demonstration and activities now cover the phase of agriculture and making. Throughout the 50-year period, the demonstration remained the basis for continuing the youth phase of the Extension Service.

Today, 4-H members still do by doing and their homes are the farms, homes and homes of Texas.

In 1910 in Coleman county the beef calf club was organized and the first statewide rally for club boys was held at the fair in Dallas. A parade of boys, each carrying a stalk of corn, through the downtown of the city.

In 1912 girls for the first were enrolled in tomato. The first was in Milam county and Mrs. Edna Trigg was first home demonstration.

In 1911 the 4-H emblem adopted nationally and a who was later to serve as Extension Director in Texas, the O. B. Martin, played a major role in this development. He was the first 4-H Club leader of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

With the passage of the Smith Act by the U. S. Congress in 1914 the Agricultural Extension Service as known today came into being and 4-H development became more rapid and organized. A state 4-H camp, H. H. Williamson, was organized in 1912 and by 1914 had made considerable progress in getting 4-H going in the counties where agents had been assigned.

State 4-H club members made their first out-of-state tour in 1915 when 125 of the State's leading junior crop and livestock producers made a 5,000-mile train trip that carried them through the Middle West, to De Moines, Iowa, Chicago, Illinois, Washington, D. C., the South and back to Texas. With information about this same time of the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work in 1915 the National 4-H Club Congress was held in Chicago, Texas 4-H members were Congress participants, today, one of the most cherished of all 4-H awards is a trip to the National 4-H Club Congress.

### AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE KEEPING OF HORSES, CATTLE, SHEEP, GOATS, SWINE AND CHICKENS WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF MATADOR AND PROVIDING A PENALTY THEREFOR.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MATADOR

1. That it shall be unlawful for any person to keep horses, cattle, sheep, goats, swine or chickens within the corporate limits of the City of Matador. Provided, however, that it shall not be unlawful to keep chickens within the corporate limits of the City of Matador if same are kept confined in pens at all times.
2. Any person who violates the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00. Each day that horses, cattle, sheep, goats, swine or chickens are kept within the corporate limits of the City of Matador in violation of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.
3. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after 90 days from the publication thereof.
