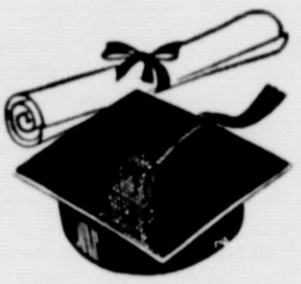

**Motley County Well Represented in Wichita Falls District 4-H Contests**

Motley County was well represented in the District 4-H Eliminations contests held at Midwestern University in Wichita Falls on May 3rd. Twenty nine county 4-H club members entered 10 District contests and 25 were named district winners with the right to compete in state contests to be held in connection with the 4-H Roundup at College Station on June 10-12. The four not named as district winners were selected as alternates, on the basis of placing 3rd in their contest, giving Motley County the best record of any of the 22 counties in District 3.

Transportation to Wichita Falls for the contests was provided by Mrs. C. M. Barton Jr., Mrs. France Barton, Matador, Mrs. Sam Ross, Mrs. Ike Reed, and E. L. Willard, Flomot, and County Agent Palmeyer, supervisor of 4-H club work in Motley County.

Following is a resume of the county competition held last month in preparation for the district meet.

In the Tractor Operators contest, held at Roaring Springs, four boys were competing for the right to represent the county in the district contest. Winner was George Reed, Flomot, who has been a contestant for the past three years. In second place was Tom Smauley of Matador, followed by Allen Smith and James Williams, Roaring Springs.

The contest consisted of questions on tractor operation and safety, daily maintenance, and operation of the tractor with a two-wheeled vehicle attached. Tractors were furnished by the Swim Tractor Co., and Thacker Implement Co., of Roaring Springs.

**Grass and Range Judging**  
Twenty club members competed for places on the Grass and Range Judging teams. Assisting County Agent Palmeyer with this work was Reginald Johnson, SCS Range Specialist, Matador.

Members selected for the team were Ervin Willard, Flomot; Bert Green and A. J. Dye, Roaring Springs, and Ed D. Smith Jr., Matador. Willard and Green were members of the 1957 Grass Judging team that placed 6th in the state. The contest consisted of identifying and giving grazing characteristics of the grasses of Texas.

Boys winning places on the Range Judging team were Sammie Swim and George Smith, Roaring Springs; Tom Smauley and Ros Bearden, Matador. Swim was a member of the 1956 Range Judging team that placed 4th in the State Contest. This contest consisted of identification of native grasses, naming pasture sites and conditions, and placing of range sites. Other active members who were competing for places on the teams were Harry Hamilton, Jimmy Fields, and Mike Barton, Matador; Gary Grizzle and Kenneth Robbins, Roaring Springs.

Eight 4-H members from Flomot competed for places on the Shrub Identification team under the supervision of Mrs. Ross, of Flomot. Winning members were Faye Smith, Sandra Starkey, Jan Elliott, and Carolyn Tanner, all of Flomot.

The contest consisted of naming the different shrubs of Texas, and giving their uses around the home. Records on Home Improvement were also submitted, as the aim of the contest is to beautify rural homes. Sandra Starkey was a member of the County team that placed 9th in the 1957 state contest. Other members competing for a place on the county team were Sheldon Jacobs, Danny Green, Billy Sperry and Lonnie Cagle, all of Flomot.

**Entomology and Safety**  
Eight 4-H members from Flomot competed for places on the County Entomology Judging

team and were trained by Mrs. M. J. Schofield of Flomot. Winning a place on the team were June Ross, Jimmy Willard, Ray Beryl Calvert and Sheila Degani, all of Flomot. Other members competing for a place on the team were, Patsy Gilbert, Mary Helen Kimball, Gail Johnson and Judy Gilbert, all of Flomot.

The contest consisted of identifying insects, and telling of the stage of growth that they do their damage; naming different type of insecticides, and giving their uses towards the control of insects.

Twelve 4-H members competed for a place on the County Rifle team, under the supervision of Game Warden Fromm, and County Agent Palmeyer. Team members selected were Thomas Edwards, Harry Hamilton, Bob Mize and Gary Jenkins, Matador. Edwards and Hamilton were unable to represent the county due to conflicting trips, and Pete Chambliss of Matador and Morris Degani of Flomot were substituted to form the county team.

**Deadline Set On School Transfers**

Deadline for transfer of school students from one district to another is June 1, according to an announcement and reminder from the office of County Judge Ex-Officio County Superintendent Vance H. Gilbreath.

The present policy of transfer of pupils was adopted by the State Board of Education three years ago, with the following provisions: The transfer of a pupil made on the basis of parental request filed before June 1st, qualifies the child for all Foundation Program benefits. This action also provides for transfer of per capita funds.

Transfers may be made at any time before October 1 for a pupil residing in the district, and

any resident pupil of a district whose grade is not taught within the district may be transferred at any time during the current school year by the county board, subject to approval by the Commissioner of Education.

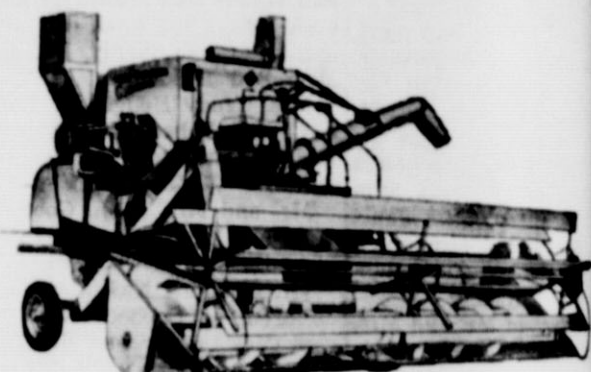

### Karl Lovelady Speaks To The Farmers

I believe in a broader "Farm-to-Market" road program, by trying to get an additional \$50,000,000 per year to the amount now spent, for more farm roads.

I believe in a much broader rural electrification and rural telephone program so that every farmer will benefit.

I would like to see a state supported experimental farm to be located in the heart of the vegetable growing district, for experimentation in the growing of vegetables.

I would support a program to conserve our surface water supply by the state expending this we would also have places for recreation right draws where needed. (In doing we would also have places for recreation right here in West Texas.)

I would amend the present employment law so that the TEXAS EMPLOYMENT COMMISSION would bring into any given area suitable labor to be used on the farm where said labor is not locally available at the time when this labor is most needed by the farmer.

I would vote for and support a stronger seed regulation law in order to put this state on a par with other states in seed regulation. I will always oppose any legislation to unionize farm labor.

In my entire life both as a private citizen and a public official I have worked one hundred per cent with the farmer, and when elected your State Senator I will continue to be one hundred per cent behind the wishes of the farm people.
