

STAMFORD, June 17-Although there will be many worthwhile attractions on the program of the seventh annual Texas Cowboy Reunion to be held in Stamford July 2, 3 and 4 the chief entertainment feature of the Reunion will be the rodeo, featuring the cowhands from the ranches.

Word has been received from numerous contestants and visitors of fomer years that they will be on hand this year when the gates swing open on July 2. In addition many Centennial visitors to Texas are expected to visit Stamford during the Reunion to witness a rodeo that has been classified as "an authentic survival of a typically Western institution." Former years have seen crowds of 50,000 and 55,000 visitors here during the three days. This year conservative estimates place the attendance at an even greater figure.

Seven rodeo events are on the card for this year's show. Three rodeo performances will be held each day during the Reunionmorning, afternoon and night. Cash rizes in the rodeo events total \$1600. Prize saddles, boots, spurs, hats and other premiums will swell the total prize list to approximately \$2500.

Cash prizes will be given in brone-busting, calf-roping, steer riding and wild-cow-milking each day. A special junior steer-riding contest will be staged at night performances on July 3 and 4, and the winners will receive cash prizes. Cowboys over 55 years of age will compete for honors on July 2 and 3 in a special calfroping contest, the winner to receive a hand-made saddle.



Salmon Mold Soak 2 tablespoons gelatin in 1/2 cup cold water. Then dissolve in 11/2 cups boiling water. Cool. Add 2 tablespoons lemon juice, the contents of one 1-pound can salmon, skinned, boned and flaked. Chill until beginning to set, then fold in 1 cup mayonnaise and heap in a damp fish mold. Chill until set, unmold on chickory and garnish with quartered tomatoes.

SALMON CLUB SANDWICHES

Slice 12 pieces bread, ¼ inch
thick, to make 4 sandwiches, three
tiers high. Toast bread as needed,

half of the mixture into a buttered baking dish. Pour in 1 cup canned corn, sauted slightly, then the rest of the mixture. Cover with but-tered bread crumbs and bake in a hot oven for 15 minutes. Serve with a pickle relish. STUFFED SALMON

Place 3 slices salt pork on bottom of flat baking pan, arrange one-half pound canned salmon on it, shaped like a steak. Cover with dressing, and then another layer of the salmon. Put three more slices of pork on top and bake % of an hour. How to make dressing: 1 cup bread-crumbs, % cup cracker crumbs, 1 small onion, sliced, % teaspoon salt, % teaspoon pepper, 1 cup hot water, % cup melted butter, 1 beaten egg, pinch of sage. Lightly brown the onion in the butter, add hot water and pour this over the bread and cracker crumbs. Season, and stir in the egg. This will serve 6 persons.
