ing filed incorrectly, during the past year. The city will not receive any sales tax money, until all of the \$3600 is recovered.


The water lines in the City Park are in need of repair. Council approved installing a new 2-inch tap and two new faucets. With this improvement all of the park can be watered at one time.

Advance registration is required. Maximum enrollment is 15 persons.



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
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

When I received my degree, Mother told me I should be ready to be fired for my convictions as a teacher and what was best for my students. I've stood by that philosophy all my life. When a parent leaves their child at the doors of a school, it should be with no doubts that the professionals inside know they have the most precious gifts on loan and do all they can to enhance the lives of those beings.

Your reason for running for this position: The first year we lived back here I heard nothing but sad stories about problems with our school from low attendance to dissention within the community. I knew that if I were to leave my daughter in school here, I'd have to do my research to find out what I perceived the real problem to be. I started attending the board meetings and listening to lots of different ideas. I watched the two new board members elected last year struggle with acceptance. I watched a lot of things take place I wish I hadn't seen. I made trips to the Region 17 Service Center to meet with their financial officer in an attempt to find out what was really going with our school. I'm still not sure I have answers that would justify my recommendations for change. However, I am committed to finding a way. There is always a way to make positive change. I'm running for this position so I can attempt to make that positive change.

What do you want to "do" or "change" if you are elected? There are so many things I'd love to change and do. Reality says there are only so many that will set us on the road to recovery. I struggle daily with what would effect the greatest good. I want to see humanity return

to our school. I want to see open doors with welcoming arms extended to this community. I'd like the opportunity to leave some positive mark on a place I will forever call home. I won't accept the idea that the love and compassion I grew up with in this community has gone. myself to doing all I can to make

"positive" change for all of us. As a last thought, no matter who you mark on your ballot, remember you're placing some-one in a position to do what you believe should be done. That requires attendance and study and research and not voting with the group because it's the easiest way to go. It requires looking like the bad guy at times. 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2003 LOAN PREMIUM AND DISCOUNT TABLE RELEASED SHOULD

PROVIDE BOOST FOR 2003 Following USDA's April 17 release of the 2003 Upland Cotton Loan Premium and Discount tables, High Plains' cotton growers should find a lot to be happy about as they prepare for the 2003 growing season.

The 2003 P&D table provides a second year of positive changes in the form of lower discounts and higher premiums.

Another boon for producers

is the fact that the trend toward smaller discounts carries over to the Micronaire discount table, which has lower discounts throughout.

The discount table for Uniformity remained the same as 2002 while the table for Bark has lower discounts than were in place for 2002. Strength discounts, however, did increase slightly for readings 25.4 g/tex and lower. Premiums for Strength readings above 25.4 g/

tex remained unchanged.

The Premium and Discount tables provide the applicable premium and discount figures used to determine marketing loan values for cotton produced in the United States and supplied as collateral to the Com-

modity Credit Corporation. USDA indicated that the 2003 table was developed using an evenly weighted mix of the 2002 crop Premium and Discount table and reported 2002 crop spot market quotations.

Producers wanting to see the 2003 Loan Premiums and Discounts first-hand can download them from the USDA Farm Service Agency website by going to the Plains Cotton Growers website at http://www.plainscotton.org and following the links provided there.



WITH THE WAR IN IRAQ, MORE GARDENS ARE BEING PLANTED

A recent survey found more Americans are planting their own fruits and vegetables than in previous years. It determined that 40 percent of Americans are planning on spending more money on vegetable and fruit plants. The current trend contradicts the decline in home gardens over the past 20 years. One explanation may be nostalgia for the "Victory Gardens" of World War II. During that time an estimated 20 million Americans planted gardens helping grow 40 percent of all produce consumed during the war.

ORGANIC FIRE ANT BAITS AVAILABLE,

AND EFFECTIVE There is now an organic alternative in combating fire ants.

New organic fire ant baits are available this spring, and they are reportedly as effective as conventional baits. Spinosad (Spin-O-sad) is the only active

it is considered organic because it's produced from a bacterial fermentation process. The organic baits are said to be fastacting, and effects the nervous system of an ant. They cost about the same as conventional baits and can be purchased at local lawn and garden outlets.

ALGICIDE OFFERS NEW **WAY TO FIGHT OFF-FLAVOR IN CATFISH**

USDA researchers have found a new way to combat bad flavors in farm-raised catfish. The solution is a new earthfriendly algicide Blue-green algae is known to give catfish a "muddy" flavor. Each year, catfish farmers spend almost 50 million dollars treating for algae. The new algicide is made from a compound found in ryegrass. Tests proved it is ef-fective and less harmful to beneficial green algae. The algicide should be available to consumers in 2 to 3 years. CONTACT:
