# Taxpayers

Your 1936 TAXES are now due and must be paid before the first day of February, 1937, to avoid penalty.

Both men and women are required to pay their poll tax. Unpaid poll taxes are a lien upon any real or personal property you may own, or come into possession of.

Those who are 60 years of age or more are not required to have an exemption to vote; those who have moved into the State since January 1, 1936, are required to have an exemption; those who have become 21 years of age since January 1, 1936, or will become of age during 1937 are required to secure an exemption certificate during January, 1937, before they may vote in any of the elections during the year; no charge is made for these exemptions.

### Car License

1937 automobile license fees cannot be paid before February 1st, 1937, but must be paid between Feb. 1st, and April 1st, 1937.
