As one enters this famous old restuarant-established in 1840you are impressed with its utter lack of ostentation. Tables are covered with their immaculate, snowy napery, gleaming sliverware and shining crystal goblets is all one sees. No paper hats, no Jazz bands, so entertainers, no floor show. The walls are covered with mirrors which extend the vista on both sides into a glittering compartment of huge dimensions. There is only one superlative attraction here and that is there imcomparably fine cuisine, a gastronomic treat for gourmets.

Among other things I had to eat that night I visited this plase was "Pampano en pappillotte" translated into English, it means fish (pampano-a Gulf fish) served in a paper bag in which it has been prepared with white wine and mushrooms. The waiter brought as well. me a brownish-black paper bag on the plate, then he proceeded to take his knife and make a slit in it, turned back the flaps and I ate it from its original container. After dinner, I met the present proprietor, Mr. Alcitore, the grandson of the original founder. This gentleman then took me in tow and we proceeded to inspect his famous place. There were five dining rooms in all. The largest of Chez Madame Beque's . . . these was the Banqueting Hall reserved for large gatherings, then "The Dungeon" and "The Mystery Room" for private parties of smal-

On the walls I saw hundreds of autographed photographs of notables who at one time or another had dined here. Some witty remarks I noticed, for example, Cecil B. De Mille, the well-known Hollywood director, must have eaten the same thing that I didfor under his photo I read: "Many a chef can prepare a dish, but only God could cook that fish". And then Joe E. Brown-he of the big mouth-, "I have had dinner at Antoine's and did I enjoy it-you said a mouthful". O. O. McIntyre, the famous New York columinst wrote: "Whenever I speak of New Orleans someone invariably mentions a meal at Antoine's". Heywood Broun the well-known newspaper man has this under his picture, "I did not go to Mass on Christmas, but a dinner at Antoine's inspires in me almost a religious ecstacy". And so on and on . . . ambassadors, writers, actors, foreign potentates, singers all add their quota of appreciation for the superlative food served at Antoine's.

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
