Mr. Masten, who left for Wellngton late Tuesday, said he finds t profitable to raise cotton which gives a staple of seven-eighths length, which he considers best adapted to the region. The longer staples, he said, mature too late on the Plains and because of the structure of some of the bolls of the longer staples, are subject to damage by the dust which occasionally blows. The Mastens divide their crops about evenly between cotton and feed and have no difficulty selling all their hegari and milo to grain dealers. They have not made it a practice to feed animals.



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


