Frank Buckley On Program At Agent's Meet

Soil Expert From Puerto Rico Lauds Work Done Here

Syrup pan terracing in Motley county is the subject of a talk to be given by Frank A. Buckley, local county agent, on the program of the Annual County Agent's Conference at College Station, July 9, 11, and 12. The program committee of the state-wide meeting has called on Mr. Buckley for the unique report in recognition of the fact that this type of water conservation has been developed to a greater degree in Motley County than any other place.

Dr. George L. Crawford, in charge of soil conservation for the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture on the island of Puerto Rico, spent yesterday afternoon with Mr. Buckley studying the conservation work being done here. Dr. Crawford, who was accompanied by R. E. Dickson of the Spur Experiment Station, was highly complimentary of the syrup-pan system of water conservation as being used in this county. He remarked that he had seen nothing quite as efficient elsewhere in the United States or other countries where he had traveled.

After attending the agents conference and the Farmer's Short course July 13, 14, and 15, county agent Buckley will pursue the study of soils and soil conservation in a special three-week course to be conducted at the A. and M. College for Agricultural Leaders. He hopes by this means to render even more efficient service to Motley County farmers in their soil and water conservation problems upon his return.

Announcement is made of special services to be held Sunday at both morning and evening hours at the Methodist church here. Mr. S. H. Condrum will speak at the 11:00 o'clock services and has an important message to deliver. Mr. Condrum was formerly of Clarendon where he was connected with Clarendon College during its existence.

Rev. W. A. Gaugh, Baptist minister with headquarters at Dallas, will conduct Union Dry services Sunday evening at the usual hour, 8:30. Due to the nature of the subject to be discussed, the Baptist and Methodist congregations will sponsor the service jointly, and extend a cordial invitation to other ministers of the city, to attend with their congregations.

County Home Agent Possibility Looms

New Well Is Spudded In Near Afton

Location Believed Most Favorable In This Territory

The Bond Jones test located near Afton, about 20 miles south of Matador, was spudded in last week and has reached a depth of about 80 feet where drillers are encountering water and cave-in difficulties. The test will be drilled to a 5,000 contracted depth in what is believed one of the most favorable locations in this part of the country. A number of local investors are buying leases and royalty and in event the test looks favorable, it is probable that the usual number of oil and gas sharks will be induced to come to this part of the country to attempt to fleece the land owners of their heritage. Texas has a new securities act, which was written by Gerald C. Mann, now candidate for Attorney General, which replaced the old blue sky laws, and is designed to eliminate from Texas, the racketeers and sharks who have in the past invaded its oil-fields.

Must Have State Permit

Under the new act, according to District Attorney, John A. Hamilton, any person who deals in oil and gas leases, royalties or other forms of securities, is required to obtain from the Secretary of State, a permit to carry on such business after having satisfied that office of being responsible and bona fide.

Pending now in the District Court of Dickens county two indictments against Thad A. Bryant Jr., for violations of the act will put the new law to test. Mr. Hamilton says the case is being looked upon with much interest throughout the state and that the State Securities Division is taking part in the prosecution. It is among the first cases arising under the new act. The indictments grew out of investigations made by the Secretary of State's office.

DR. TRAWEEK TO NEW YORK

Dr. A. C. Traweck is preparing to leave for New York City within the next few days where he will take up post-graduate medical work in the New York University of which he is a graduate.

Dr. Traweck had made plans to make the trip by rail but late yesterday he communicated with TWA Air depot in Amarillo with regards to plane schedules and declared that he may make the trip by plane. He said the factor of six days required to make the two way journey by rail had caused him to consider the plane trip which will greatly shorten the traveling time.

Group Expected To Meet Commissioners Here Monday

The possibility of a local Home Demonstration Agent loomed this week with the announcement that a group of farm women from different sections of the county will accompany Miss Lida Cooper, district Home Demonstration Agent in a plea before the county commissioners on Monday afternoon, July 11th.

County Judge, W. R. Cammack declared yesterday that the court would give consideration to the plan of securing a Home Demonstration Agent for Motley County. However, he declared that it would be impossible to secure the services before the first of the year in event the court reached a decision favoring the movement, since no funds are provided in the budget for the expense.

County Pays On Salary

In event a Home Demonstration agent is secured, Motley county would be required to pay only a part of the salary expense, the remainder being borne by the State of Texas and the Federal Government.

Groups of women in many communities of the county are interested in securing a Home Demonstration Agent and those interested are requesting others who may favor the movement, to meet with the Commissioners Court Monday afternoon. It is hoped that a plan can be worked out whereby provisions can be made in the 1939 budget for the necessary expense and arrangements made to secure a capable demonstrator to begin work next year.

It is pointed out that the amount saved in counties where home agents are available many times repays the cost which counties are required to pay for salaries or other expense.

PLAN WAR ON FLEA HOPPER

Several cooperative cotton flea hopper control demonstrations are being planned for Motley County, according to Frank A. Buckley, county agent, who is to supervise the tests. Buckley received five hundred pounds of specially ground dusting sulphur this week for use in the experiment. The sulphur is donated by a Chemical Company of Freeport, Texas, on condition that careful comparison will be made of the yields on dusted and undusted plots in the same field.

M. S. Thacker of Roaring Springs is arranging with a manufacturer for use of a dusting machine in the demonstrations. It is expected that all the tests will be located in the Roaring Springs precinct. The most severe flea damage has been observed in that community, and it is necessary that all farms to be treated should be grouped close together so that the same duster can be used for all.

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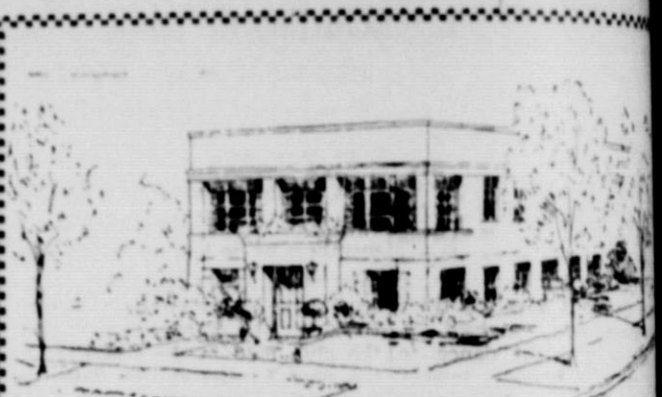
