It might have been, for all we know, no temple of warriors at all, but a vast audience hall, or even the palace of the Great Maya King who ruled here supreme. The appellation given these buildings in ruins cling to them tenaciously no matter how inappropriately they might have been ap-

plied. This so-called "Temple of the Warriors" stands on the summit of a four-terraced truncated pyramid. A stairway leads to the summit with a serpent-carved balustrade at either side. The first thing I noticed when I reached the top, was a recumbent statue of Choc-Mool with knees raised and with his head turned at right angles to his body. Or, his abdomen he held a stone disc which formerly received offerings of some kind or perhaps incense was burned on it. This stood close before the entrance to the Temple

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
