

MODERN ROADS ARE PREDICTED

AUSTIN, Tex.—"The highways of 1938 will be as different from the highways of 1938 as are the supposedly modern roads we now travel from the routes of 1918 when highway construction was in its swaddling clothes," writes Chas. E. Simons, editor, in the July issue of Texas Parade.

"Highway engineers are not prone to indulge in the ancient art of crystal gazing, but, figuratively speaking, they have been looking down the road and projecting in the mind's eye the type of roads that the traffic of tomorrow will demand for adequate service. The prospects are that their ultimate idea of a completed highway system never will be reached owing to the inadequacy of funds available for construction. Given a free hand and sufficient funds, the highway engineers could do a job on the Nation's highway system that would be a remarkable transformation.

"Traffic arteries could be so constructed that vehicles could move at near their present rate of speed with comparative safety and with minimum of wear and tear on the nerves of the driver. Highways could be made safe for

Utopia. "It does, nevertheless, have some practical values. It gives the average citizen an insight into the inadequacy of the present system of national, state and local highways, it provides the public with a long range perspective of the highway program; it offers something for the engineer and the public to "shoot at."

The 'auto' part results from the fact that it is capable of moving itself; the 'mobile' portion of the word connotes swift movement. Both fit snugly into the American conception of life and America is the world's leading nation in the perfection of automatic devices and mobility.

Safe Mobility Desired
"Thus, the chief aim of the highway engineer in designing the roads of tomorrow is to safely provide mobility, to remove as many hazards and obstacles and mental hurdles as possible from the path of the motorist, to eliminate physical conditions that contribute to collisions. Any condition that tends to reduce mobility and that increases the urge of

the individual driver to take chances to preserve his speed of movement, measured in the terms of miles traveled and time consumed, is a potential breeder of traffic mishaps.

"The ideal highway system would permit the free and swift movement of traffic (within reasonable bounds, of course) from one point to another with a minimum of acceleration and deceleration and with a minimum of intersections, either with railroad or other highways. It would include divided lanes or major highways so there would be no friction between opposing lines of traffic. It would provide travel surfaces of a width sufficient to permit the easy passage of vehicles traveling in the same or opposite direction. The right-of- (See "Highway Safety" page 4)

H. J. R. No. 20. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas; changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas; providing for an election upon such Constitutional Amendment, and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Article XVI, Section 1. Official Oath. Members of the Legislature, and all officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:

"I, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, or promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public of-

Fixed objects, such as culverts and small bridgeheads would be eliminated or so placed or constructed that they would not give the driver the feeling that his travel area was being restricted.

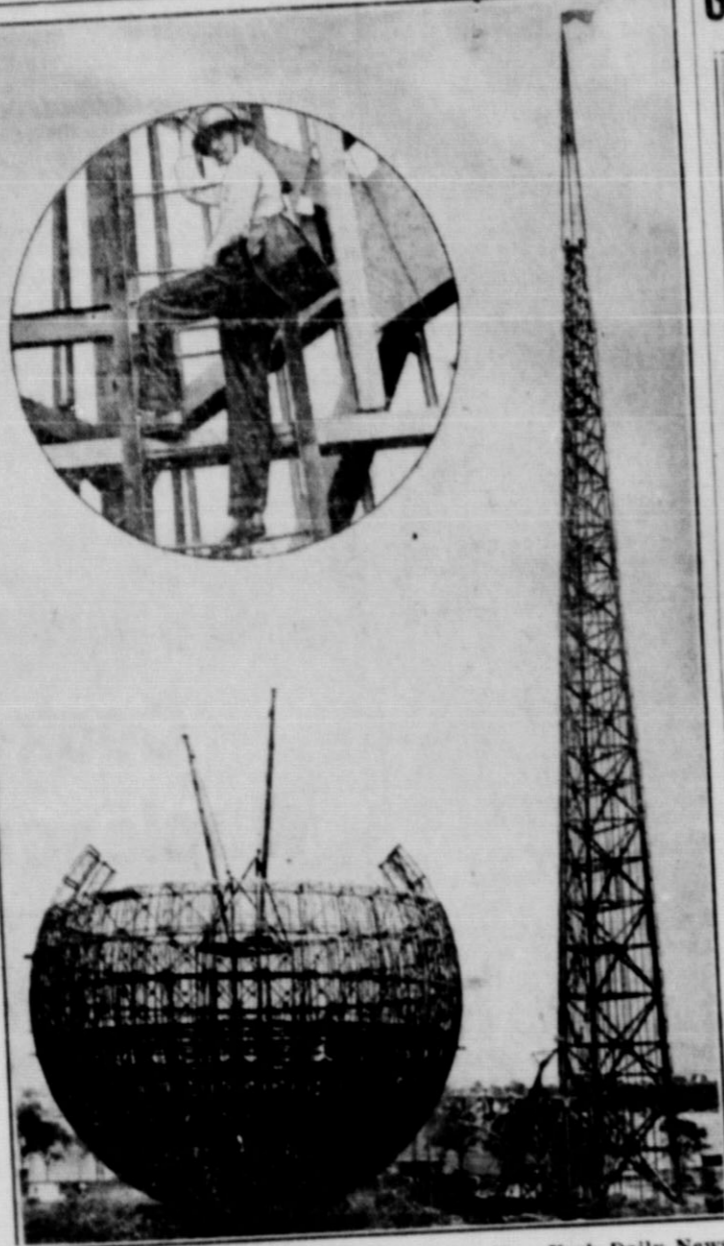

While grasshoppers and other insects have caused some loss of fruit and vegetables in some portions of the county, better moisture in large areas has served to check the inroads of the pests. Everything possible is being done to combat them and build up producing gardens.

"Practically all FSA borrowers have baby chicks and most of them are getting some returns from their gardens," Mrs. Butler said. "Cash living costs are decreasing but due to the fact that some prices are still very low, the farm family is having to stick close by its budget in order to manage on its income."

Improvements Made Pointing to the lack of dust storms and increasing moisture Mrs. Butler said many families are showing more interest in improvement of yards and are planting flowers, shrubbery and fruits as well as making repairs to their homes. Many families are setting out a few trees in spots near the home to provide shade and plots to serve as windbreaks to protect fields and check erosion.

During the next month or six weeks canning group meetings will be held, Mrs. Butler said, and information on combatting garden pests and insects will be distributed.

more the dollar and cent value of food produced on the farm and stored or preserved for winter use.

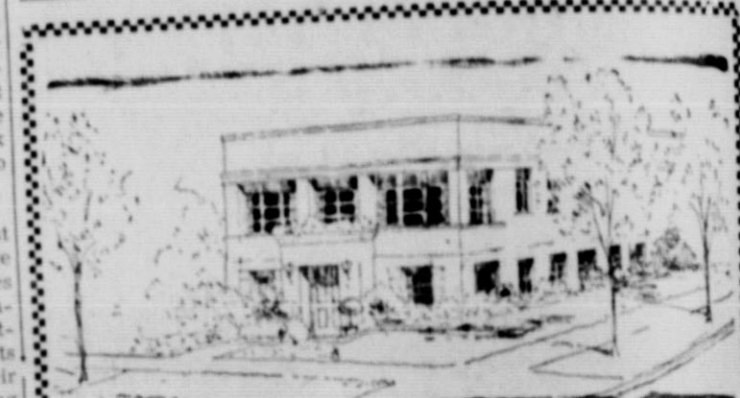

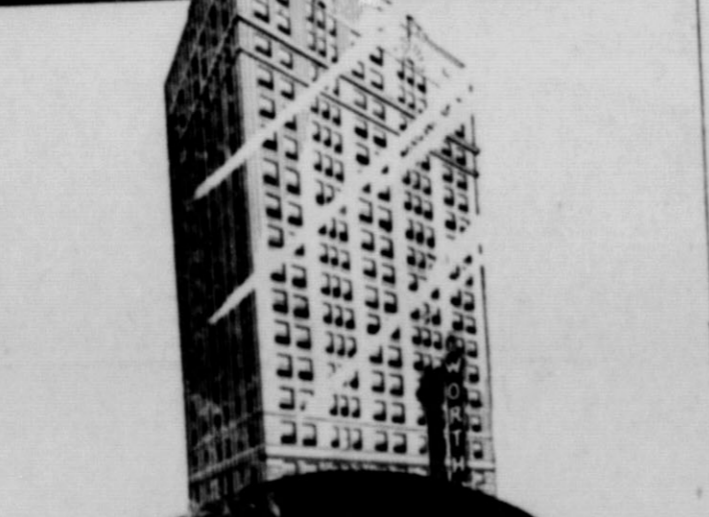
