Broad-based, level terraces with cland ends retain practically all the water on the land where it falls, giving an equal distribution of moisture which results in a uniform crop stand. Farmers of the wind erosion area are finding that yields on terraced fields are higher and that erosion is checked. Terraces are recommended wherever contour farming is not sufficient to prevent loss of water. This farmer is constructing a terrace on a field in one of the Soil Conservation Service demonstration areas.


