Spirited 2nd Primary Rolls Up Total Of 963 Votes In Ten County Boxes

AGAIN the electorate of Texas has nominated its flour salesman political-justice champion, W. Lee O'Daniel for Junior United States Senator. One of the most spirited ballot battles of the Lone Star State has ended with Senator O'Daniel winner by less than 1% majority and far from "the decisive victory" he predicted.

Motley county gave the Senator 539 votes against his opponent James V. Allred 424. The Senator polled 653 votes in the 1st Primary and Allred 309. Senator O'Daniel lost votes in every Motley county box and Allred gained in each of the ten polling places with the exception of Dumont, where he retained his 1st Primary 4 votes.






