## County Agents To Be Relieved Of AAA Work First Of Year Set As Date For Texas Change

County farm agents of Texas will be relieved of the burden of handling the Federal Agricultural Adjustment Administration program about the first of the year, according to H. H. Williamson, director of the Texas Extension Service.

Just when Frank Buckley, Motley county agent, is to transfer the administration of local AAA affairs, was not known this week, but the general news release stated that all agents would be relieved soon after January 1, 1939.

County agents have been the chief administrators of the program since 1933, when they were started, with the assistance of county committees and office workers. Under the new dispensation, county and community committees will be responsible for carrying out Triple A plans, aided by office workers.

The change for Texas is to be made gradually, to permit adjustment of routines, Williamson stated, and allowing the county agents to resume their original function, that of encouraging sound agricultural methods and working directly with the farmers.

## Work Orders For No. 18 Are Received Work To Begin Monday On New Highway Project

Work orders were received Monday by W. C. Hagen, local highway engineer, for beginning of work on Highway 18 made possible by a WPA allotment of \$88,653 for the \$135,000 job. Orders came from the State Highway Department, sponsor of the State Works Administration, by telephone.

Mr. Hagen stated Tuesday that preliminary work would begin Wednesday, and that actual man-labor would start Monday morning. Arrangements for gravel and caliche to pave the 10.2 miles of unpaved highway north from Whiteflat to the Hall county line, are already virtually completed.

Paving of the stretch of road will close up the last unpaved gap in Motley county's system of highways. The allotment was obtained by Motley County Commissioners and County Judge W. R. Cammack, who met with the State Highway Commission in San Antonio last August to petition for assistance. The Highway department takes care of the difference between the allotment and the actual cost.

Highway 18 is regarded hereabouts as the "road with a future" in view of possible tie-ins with national and international highways.

## TEXAS SET UP AS TAX HAVEN FOR WEALTHY

Loss of millions of dollars of federal revenue as well as the savings to thousands of Texas citizens in income taxes and the immigration to Texas of people of wealth to benefit through reduced estate taxes were seen by United States District Attorney Clyde Eastus Wednesday as the result of a California court decision upholding the community property law as applied to federal taxation.

Texas has the same community property law as California, Mr. Eastus said. This law allows husband and wife to file separate income tax returns and thus bring down the tax considerably.

"The Texas law says that one half of a husband's earnings belongs to the wife," Mr. Eastus said. "For instance, if a man makes \$50,000, he can file a return on \$25,000. This will make the tax lower than if he had filed on a \$50,000 income by himself."

Mr. Eastus said Texas was one of the few states to have the community property law. At the last session of Congress there was a bitter but unsuccessful fight to have uniform income tax laws.

A decision in San Francisco affirmed a Los Angeles federal court judgment refunding \$7,671 to Ida P. Goodyear as executrix of the estate of her husband, W. E. Goodyear, who died in 1935.

**X-I-T REUNION PERFECTS NEW ORGANIZATION**

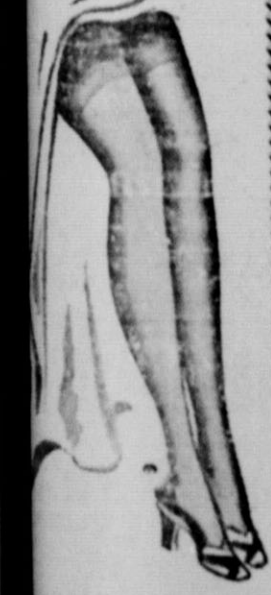

AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED AN ORDINANCE LEVYING TAXES UPON ALL PROPERTY, EXCEPT SUCH AS EXEMPT WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF MATADOR, TEXAS, FOR THE CURRENT YEAR, 1938 AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Matador, Texas, that there is hereby levied for the year 1938 on all real estate situated in and all personal property owned within the City Limits of the City of Matador, Texas, on the first day of January, of the current year (1938), except so much thereof as may be exempt by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas or the United States, the following taxes, to-wit:

1. An ad valorem tax of and at the rate of 15 cents on the one hundred dollars cash valuation thereof, estimated in lawful currency of the United States, for the general fund of said City of Matador.
2. An ad valorem tax of and at the rate of 20 cents on the one hundred dollars cash valuation thereof, estimated in lawful currency of the United States, for the purpose of providing funds for the maintenance of the streets and alleys of said City of Matador.
3. An ad valorem tax of and at the rate of 45 cents on the one hundred dollars cash valuation thereof, estimated in lawful currency of the United States, for the purpose of paying the current interest and to provide one year's sinking fund for the Waterworks Bonds of said City of Matador.
4. An ad valorem tax of and at the rate of 20 cents on the one hundred dollars cash valuation thereof, estimated in lawful cur-

rency of the United States, for the purpose of paying the currency interest and to provide one year's sinking fund for the Funding Warrants of said City of Matador.  
The fact that it is now time for the taxes for the current year of 1938 to be paid creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity requiring the reading of this ordinance at three separate meetings be dispensed with, and it is so done, and the same is passed by the City Council of the City of Matador, Texas, this the 4th day of October, 1938, and shall become effective from and after its passage and publication.
