Conservation Is Given Support In Congress By National Federation

Demand That Sportsmen's Tax Money Be Used for Wildlife and Backing of Izaac Walton Pollution Bill Are Major Legislative Aims

all of the money collected from sportsmen on the sale of arms and ammunition be devoted to wildlife restoration in the states heads the legislative program of the National Wildlife Federation, Carl D. Shoe maker, executive secretary of the Federation announced today.

Other legislative proposals to be submitted to State Federations and affiliates include the Izaak Walton League's bill for the federal control of stream pollution and a restoration program for improvement of fishing

The Pittman Robertson act ear marked excise tax funds from the sale of arms and ammunition for use the states for wildlife restoration. States Benefiting

About twenty states already have set up Pittman-Robertson projects, approved by the Bureau of Biological Survey.

Through Federation activity, an advance appropriation of \$1,000,000 was made to enable these projects to be launched without waiting until June 30, this year, for the tax funds to be available.

Meanwhile the current budget allots \$1,000,000 for Pittman-Robertson operations, although it is estimated that there will be on hand \$3,250,000 from sportsmen's tax payments. Taking out the advance of \$1,000,000, there would be left about \$2,250,000 for the nation-wide restoration projects in the states. By the end of 1939, more than 40 states probably will be in line for Pittman-Robertson benefits, consisting basically of research and of land management for the increase of valuable

Wildlife Refuge Earnings

There are nearly 300 wildlife refuges administered by the Bureau of Biological Survey. Many of them yield incomes, from hay crops, fur and various leases. This income now goes into the Federal treasury, and will amount within the next year or two to between \$1,900,000 and \$1,500,000. The Federation urges that this sum be ear-marked for administration of the refuge system.

The Izaak Walton League has again brought to Congress a bill for the control of stream pollution on a national scale. This is in line with one of the declarations of policy made at the time the National Wildlife Federation was formed. In the last congress an anti-pollution bill. sponsored by the Izaak Walton League, was amended until it lost all effectiveness, and was vetoed by the President.

The Federation gives its full support to this new measure.



But most important of all in the wildlife scheme, says the National Wildlife Federation, is the woodchuck's habit of digging weatherproof dens that are used by cottontails, skunks, raccoons and other animals.

The second National Wildlife Res toration Week, March 19 to 25, will be observed throughout the United States by a large number of local and national organizations concerned with the future of natural resources. The first annual Wildlife Week was proclaimed in 1938 by President Roosevelt. Among the groups participating were 4-H Clubs, Future Farmers, Garden Clubs, Audubon Societies, Junior Chambers of Commerce, sportsmen's clubs, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Camp Fire Girls. Schools, churches, radio stations and newspapers gave general recognition to the cause of conser-

vation during the week. Sheets of 80 wildlife poster stamps, including trees, wildflowers, birds, mammals and fish, will be distributed by the National Wildlife Federation in conjunction with Wildlife Week. the mighty hosts that once bred Migratory Bird Treaty act of 1918, and a number of thousands are seen from northern Missouri far up toward the arctic circle in the Canadian northwest.

Before the days of settlement, trumpeters nested as far east as Wisconsin and Indiana. They nested in Iowa as late as 1871, in Idaho in 1877, in Minnesota in 1886, in North Dakota a few years later.

Biggest of Birds

By far the largest and most spec tacular of migratory waterfowl, a full grown trumpeter weighs 35 pounds. Its voice is like a French horn. Cleaving the air at a great height, a battalion of trumpeters, sent down a resonant chorus of deepthroated bugling, drowning the voices of lesser fowl.

Now the United States Bureau of Biological Survey is able to keep an accurate count year after year of all the young and old birds, surviving in the United States. The Red Rock Lakes, in Montana, have been especially set aside as a trumpeter refuge. There are a few in Yellowstone Park. In British Columbia

there are about 500. Mated pairs will be released in other areas as rapidly as the increase justifies. The 46 adults in

Whistling Swan Saved

The only bird that rivals th trumpeter is the whistling swan, truly magnificent creature, almo like its cousin, except that it is bare There are, in the United States, ly more than half its size! The 148 trumpeter swans, remnants of whistling swan was saved by the annually on the Great Lakes and, in winter, on the Atlantic Coast from the Delaware river southward.

The trumpeter has abandoned its original migratory habits, and stays close to its breeding grounds all the year around. There is open water in the Red Rock Lakes at all times. and the British Columbia flocks travel between coastal flats and wilderness lakes of the interior.

The swan perished over most of its range, dwindling to a remnant so small that complete extinction may still be its fate, chiefly because it is big and beautiful. "Swansdown" was in great demand for ladies' wear in the early Victorian era, and the fur traders purchased great numbers of skins, most of them from adult birds in breeding season. The last swan skins on the market were a single pair, in 1890.

Hunting is permitted in the Red Rock Lakes area, and the trumpeters are so conspicuous and well known that any gunner that molested one would be in danger of being mobbed by sportsmen. The swans congregate in grounds set aside for them while other waterfowl are being shot, and do not seem to be disturbed.

"Parents have a tendency to over-stimulate the child," they say in the February Pictorial Review. led by Mrs. W. B. Vaughn, was followed by scripture verses on "Right Paths", also given by Mrs. They give him more toys than he needs and urge him on to activities beyond his capabilities. The truth is they are entertaining themselves rather than consider ing the pleasures and desires of the baby.

The article also points out that toys should keep pace with the child's mental age. During the first year few toys are necessary dolls made of washable material or rubber, wooden beads, or rubber animals are sufficient. In the second year a greater assortment is advisable.


