Swept into Last War, We May Repeat Folly, Warns Stuart Chase

AMERICA had better plan now how to keep us out of war, or we may be swept into the next European conflagration against our will, just as we were dragged into the last war, warns Stuart Chase, noted economist, in the March Cosmopolitan.

In his challenging article, "Keep Your Powder Dry!" Mr. Chase reviews how in 1917 we drifted into a position where we had to fight, even though no one wanted to fight, except the few who saw an opportunity to acquire wealth and power out of war, and those who were bored to death by peace.

A recent survey by the George Gallup Institute revealed that 69% of the people want the country to remain neutral in the event of war; and that 73% believe war is inevitable. These figures puzzle Mr. Chase. Why, he asks, is the government doing so little to prevent our becoming enmeshed again, when the majority of us want no part of war.

As for our defense, Mr. Chase believes we should be thoroughly equipped to make an invasion by a foreign country unthinkable. In his estimation Germany, Italy and Japan are the only countries likely to cause trouble; therefore, we should be strong enough to defend ourselves against one or all of them.

Further, he advises shying away from any military alliances with European powers, and to shut our ears when we hear of any proposal to make the world safe for something.

Flomot To Be Sport Fans Mecca For Two Days And Nights

GOLDEN GLOVE TOURNAMENT IN SPORT LIGHT

Thirty-six Texas Panhandle schools are expected to be represented at the Longhorn Gymnasium tomorrow when the second annual Flomot Golden Glove Boxing Tournament begins. The squared-circle contests will continue throughout Friday, Friday evening, Saturday and Saturday evening. Over 100 boxers are expected to enter the ring during the two-day meet.

W. E. Sherman, principal of the Silvertown High School, prominent sports referee of this section will be the ring official for the tournament. The appointment of judges had not been announced late Tuesday.

The tournament award will consist of an attractive seventeen inch trophy which will be presented to the school whose team wins the largest number of divisions during the meet. Golden gloves will be presented each division champion.

Visitor Accommodations

With true western hospitality, Flomot has made complete plans to house visitors and their coaches during the tournament. Accommodations have been made for visitors for Friday night and those arriving to be weighed in tonight will be provided with accommodations for both nights, it was announced.

Co-champions with Amarillo last year, the Longhorns will be on their toes during the tournament, altho coach Leo Jackson modestly makes no predictions about the prospects of his boys, but boxing fans declare that Flomot has a number of entrants whose strength and skill will probably provide strong competition for the best of visiting contenders. Amarillo will have 20 contestants at the tournament, 2 each in five divisions. Matador will be represented by only one entrant, Merritt Faulkner, Matador High School student.

Large Crowds Expected

Favored with the momentum gathered by last year's tournament, much larger crowds are expected to attend the matches this year and arrangements have been made to provide for them. The ring is regulation 20-foot enclosed with ropes one foot inside the corner posts. The ring platform is 30 inches above the gymnasium floor, assuring good visibility for the entire audience.

ELECTRIC CO. TO RESCUE BOYS KITES

The approach of Kite-flying days has prompted the West Texas Utilities Company to invite youngsters hereabouts to notify the local office in order to prevent possible accidents resulting from entangling kite strings in electrical wires.

"We remember when we used to fly kites," said C. A. Pitts, local manager for the company, "and we're willing to do the work when it comes to rescuing a kite from light and power poles or lines." He urged that boys notify the local office in event their kites became entangled so that an experienced pole-climber can help get it down.

"The safest thing," he said, "is not fly kites near the lines due to the danger of contact with current. We are anxious to prevent possible tragedy from interfering with the fun of flying a kite."

He urged parents to cooperate by insisting that dry, clean string always be used for kites and kite-tails instead of damp string or wire which, he said, "is a dangerous practice."

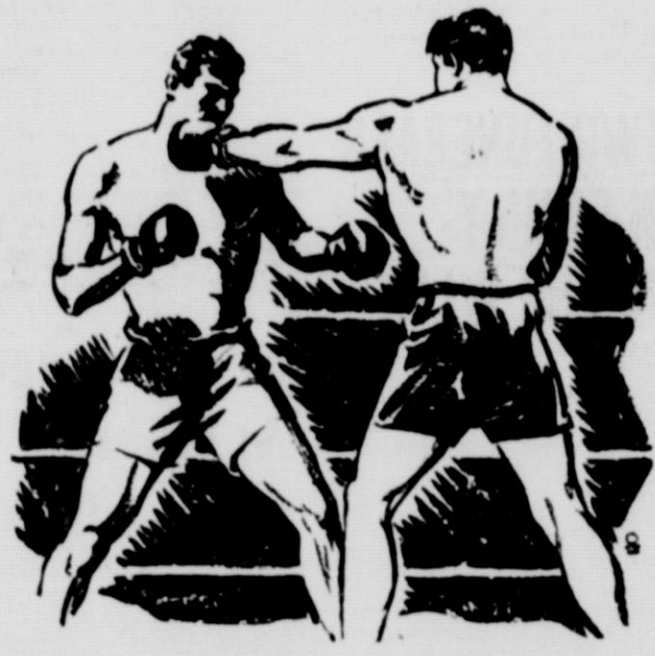
