## Floor Of Pioneer **Pavilion Damaged** In Dance Protest

A reward of well over \$150 was posted late yesterday for the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who damaged the floor · of the Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settler's pavilion at Roaring Springs, Saturday night, by cutting into the hardwood with a · sharp instrument in over 50 different places. Entrance to the pavilion was gained by cutting the protective wire fence at the

northeast corner. Word of the vandalism spread rapidly Monday and brought dismay to residents of both Matador and Roaring Springs communities. It is believed the action may have been in protest to the dances held at the pavilion by the Old Settler's group and recently by the Fleming Post American Legion, in their drive for funds to construct a Legion hut.
