Legion Hut Fund Up To \$1,000

Local Churches To Observe Armistice

Matador churches will unite in cooperation with the Fleming Post American Legion in the observance of Armistice, Sunday night, November 12 at the Baptist church, according to plans perfected yesterday.

Complete details of the program will be arranged at the regular meeting of the Legion, Monday night, November 6 and announced in next week's issue of the Tribune. Charles H. Dean, former District Attorney of the Plainview district, will be the principal speaker on the program.

The arrangements committee of the Ladies' Auxilliary secured the churches' cooperation this week. It is believed the attendance may possibly require the largest auditorium available, since the program will combine religious groups as well as the Legion and the Auxilliary.

To Honor Those "Over There"
"We feel," one member of the ex-service men's organization declared yesterday, "that the present generation needs to become more familiar with those days that are held sacred by the traditions of our nation. It is our duty to keep before the people, the principals of good government and to perpetuate the memory of those who have made it possible to enjoy the institutions of a democratic nation, by sacrificing their lives for its cause."

The Auxilliary will sponsor the Poppy Day sale here Saturday, November 11, the proceeds to go to the newly organized group's general fund.

COLD WEATHER IN PANHANDLE

Old man winter poked an inquisitive finger into the Panhandle of Texas over the weekend, causing the mercury to drop out of its summertime hammock and hover around the freezing point here. Conflicting reports make it impossible for the Tribune to state the position of the local temperature at dawn Monday.

One Matador minister declares that a thin crust of ice was visible on a tin container in his yard, while another unquestionable source says the mercury did not drop below 40 degrees.

Freezing was reported in many northern Panhandle cities.

Church To Be Dedicated Sun.

The Church of Christ at Roaring Springs, with Ministers M. E. Tisdal and Oran Martin officiating, will dedicate their new building Sunday, November 5, it has been announced.

The dedication service will climax a series of meetings which will begin Friday night, November 3, and close Sunday night. A barbecue dinner will be held on the evening of Sunday, and a ground at noon Sunday, and a preachers' meeting will be held in the afternoon for the purpose of discussing means of building up church attendance.

Everyone is extended a cordial invitation to attend the services. The new church is located on the highway entering Roaring Springs from the north.

Car Agency Paints Front Of Building
A new coat of paint is being applied to the front of the Matador Auto Company, local Ford agency, building this week, which greatly enhances the appearance.

A second coat of paint will be applied immediately, according to C. M. Mitchell, Glenn, manager of the automobile agency.

Jury Finds Chiropractor Not Guilty

After eight minutes deliberation Tuesday evening, a jury found Dr. L. B. Millsap, local chiropractor "not guilty" on charges of practicing medicine without a license.

The case, which was tried before County Judge W. R. Cammack, attracted wide attention and the court room was crowded during most of the two days trial.

It is estimated that approximately 70 chiropractors from various Texas towns attended the trial, some of them being used as witnesses in the case.

CITY RECEIVES APPROVAL OF STREET BONDS

Further assurance of Matador's street paving project was received yesterday in a letter from the office of Attorney General Gerald C. Mann, by county attorney, Howard Traweck. The message was as follows:

City officials believe that all financial arrangements for the project will be completed within a short time and that paving the four blocks in the business district may be ready to start within 40 to 60 days.

CONGRESS SEAT STIRS COMMENT

Reports from Washington that Representative Marvin Jones of Amarillo, chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture, may be appointed to a district of Columbia court at the end of the special session of Congress have caused wide speculation as to possible congressional candidates.

Should the veteran representative retire for a court bench a special election would be called to fill the vacancy.

Two newspaper publishers, Gene Howe of the Amarillo Globe-News and Deskins Wells of the Wellington Leader, have been mentioned as prospective candidates. So have John Deaver, disbarred attorney at Memphis; W. A. McConnell, district attorney at Panhandle.

State Representative Eugene Worley of Shamrock, candidate for Speaker of the Texas House, also has been mentioned as a prospect.

Jones is serving his twelfth term in Congress. As chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture he played a major part in the framing of the Administration's farm measures.

There have been rumors of a federal appointment for Jones for the last two years.

GREY LEAVES ALL TO WIFE

LOS ANGELES.—Novelist Zane Grey, who died Oct. 23, left his entire estate, estimated unofficially at more than \$300,000, to his wife, Mrs. Lina Elsie Grey.

The will, filed for probate Monday, placed the estate's yearly income at more than \$12,000.

A paragraph of the will expresses confidence Mrs. Grey will make equitable provision later for their three children.

CATTLE SALES Aid Ranchers By \$150,000

Seventy Five Cars Shipped Off Range In Motley County

Independent ranchers of Motley county sold about 75 cars of fine Herefords during the past two weeks for over \$150,000 in cash according to estimates made yesterday. Approximately 4,000 head of calves were purchased from ranchers in this territory, excluding the great Matador Land and Cattle Company sales, figures for which are not available.

Roy Hagler, Washington Court House, Ohio and Charlie Lewis of Floydada purchased the bulk of the 1939 calf crop, it was declared.

Despite the damage of drouth to range conditions in this section, Motley county Herefords are in demand by feeders who know the quality beef stock produced here. Mr. Hagler from Ohio has purchased Motley county cattle for many years and finds them profitable above those produced in other ranching areas.

Cattle prices have continued on a profitable basis for more than a year, resulting in substantial benefits to local ranchers, which in many instances, offsets the losses sustained in agriculture.

Late rains followed by warm weather have aided range conditions here after the long summer drouth, but many ranchmen expect to find it necessary to do some feeding during the coming winter. Some are considering shipping cattle to locations where better grass may be obtained, but in most instances the ranges are not heavily stocked so as to warrant this action.

The calves from about 20 ranches are included in the 4,000 head sold recently.

Death Truck Driver Tried

George H. Lillard of Breckenridge, driver of the transport truck which over-ran a small coupe on Highway 28, in the foothills of the Caprock, October 6, resulting in the death of Mrs. J. C. Miller and her son, Joe Miller, was tried here yesterday.

Lillard, who was charged on two counts of negligent homicide, was found guilty by a jury at 10 o'clock last night, and fined \$150. The case was tried before County Judge W. R. Cammack in county court.

Death which took the life of Mrs. J. L. Barr at her home Sunday morning at 9:30, severed a marriage which had reached the golden anniversary on that date. She succumbed following a lingering illness.

Due to Mr. Barr's ill health and feeble condition, funeral services were conducted at the home by Rev. V. J. Lowrance, Missionary Baptist preacher, Monday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock.

Mrs. Barr was born May 2, 1861 and succumbed October 29, 1939, at the age of 78 years, 5 months and 27 days. In addition to her husband, she is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Zelma Basham and Mrs. Annie Judd, both of California.

Every Texan Is Urged To Devote Time

Governor Appeals To Citizens In Red Cross Drive

Calling attention to the necessity of Red Cross Roll Call volunteer work, Governor W. Lee O'Daniel has issued the following statement to the citizens of Texas:

"The American National Red Cross will have its annual Roll Call November 11-30, 1939. Calls upon the Red Cross for service both locally and nationally have been steadily increasing in recent years. It is a great humanitarian organization and must be kept ready to meet whatever demands may be made upon it at home or abroad, in keeping with its traditional policy of meeting needs without prejudice or favor."

"The Red Cross needs the assistance of 75,000 additional volunteers in Texas who will service the organization by offering those among whom they live and among whom they work an opportunity to join the Red Cross and share in its work."

"I urge every Texas citizen who can devote several hours on a voluntary basis on November 11th or on one or more days immediately thereafter, to offer his services to his local chapter of the Red Cross whose Roll Call Chairman is endeavoring to develop an organization that will make possible the extension of the membership invitation to every man and woman in Texas."

GOVERNOR OF SOONERS CITED FOR SAGACITY

There was a piece in the paper the other day about the governor of Oklahoma and how he would like to annex part of Northwest Texas, including Wichita Falls to his state...

Meanwhile, let us take a temperate view of it, and consider it from all angles. That is to say, let us study it from the standpoint of Texas, from that of Oklahoma, and from that of Northwest Texas itself...

Looking at the matter from the state of Texas' standpoint, it has both merits and demerits. One thing that might be said for it is that Texas has always been a big-hearted state, giving away things to anybody that asked for them...

The real question, of course, is the attitude of Northwest Texas itself and how it should feel about it. There are several points to be considered.

One of these is the matter of climate. The winters are much colder in Oklahoma than they are in Texas. If Oklahoma would agree to reduce our gas rates...

A question that would have to be answered is that of the Indians of whom there are a number in Oklahoma. The suspicion prevails in some quarters that the real purpose of the Oklahoma governor is to annex Northwest Texas...

The solution which this column offers is one that has much to recommend it. It is a sort of compromise. Let Northwest Texas separate itself from the rest of Texas and then shop around to find out where it wants to be put.

brief outline history of the origin of the Red Cross:

Seventy-five years ago on the 21st of August, representatives of European powers taking part in a conference called by Henri Dunant, a young Swiss idealist, signed an agreement or treaty for the neutralization of the sick and wounded in war. This document popularly known as the "Treaty of Geneva," not only protected the disabled but gave neutral status to authorized relief workers.

In founding this movement to mitigate some of the suffering of war, a symbol was adopted. In compliment to Switzerland, the delegates chose as their insignia the design of the Swiss emblem in reverse colors, a red cross on a field of white.

The program devised originally, by this treaty, was to give to those people who wanted to go on the battlefield to help the wounded some chance of protection so they wouldn't be shot by either side.

Treaty Was Not Favored
Attending the conference at Geneva in 1864 were two representatives of the United States, but they lacked authority to commit their government, which did not sign the agreement until eighteen years later, altho their relation of the U. S. Sanitary Commission work in the Civil War exerted a powerful influence on the delegates at the conference. They submitted the treaty to the United States Government, but the treaty was not favored by Secretary of State Seward, and it was not until 1882 that President Arthur made the United States a signatory.

However, the American Red Cross as we know it today with its present activities dates from its reorganization by Miss Mabel T. Boardman under a congressional Charter, January 5, 1905.

To Alleviate Suffering
While the Red Cross organization conceived to alleviate suffering of those wounded in battle, and while its most strenuous activities are devoted to that end, both in the wars that have been fought in the past and in the present war that is raging in Europe, yet its obligation, fundamentally, is to relieve human suffering — impartially, and in America, its problems are not confined to war relief operations. In the United States suffering is a stern, everyday reality. The Red Cross, thru the millions of American members, is fighting suffering and death 24 hours a day, in every state in the Union.

Serve Vast Field
When hurricane strike, when floods descend, when fire breaks out and demolishes homes and property, when highway accidents occur and those involved are crippled or injured, when an earthquake shakes down the homes of people and leave them without shelter and without means of securing safety, the Red Cross strives to be among the first to come to the rescue of the suffering. It trains life guards in the technique of rescuing bathers in distress, where communicable disease begins to spread the Red Cross rushes to the fight with adequate nursing care, prevention through inoculation, information for the recognition of disease in its early stages and skilled care at home.
