

County Drive For Polio Funds Exceeds Goal

AGAIN the generous citizens of Motley county have over-subscribed a given quota in voluntary contribution supporting a campaign to alleviate the sufferings of humanity. The 1953 Polio Fund drive has exceeded its \$2,500 goal.

Jack Norman, county chairman of the drive, said yesterday that total contributions were

now more than \$300 in excess of the quota. "We are extremely grateful," Mr. Norman declared, "to have reached the goal, I sincerely believed it would be impossible this year to continue our past record in attaining our aim. We had experienced a very short crop because of drought conditions while farmers and ranchers had been faced

with a declining market in farm products and livestock. "I am now convinced that charity in this county, when designated for a worthy cause, is not affected by existing conditions. I want to thank everyone personally who contributed to the success of the drive in any manner."

Large Donation Received

Following the Mothers' Porch-light Campaign in Matador and Roaring Springs Thursday evening, a total of collections indicated that approximately \$300 would be needed to meet the quota. Friday morning J. C. "Doc" Burleson made a personal donation of \$50, the largest amount received in the campaign. Later reports from Roar-

ing Springs were larger than had been expected and Sunday a collection at the Methodist church brought the drive "over the top." Other reports brought in the additional \$300.

Poll Tax Sales Show Decrease

Poll tax sales in Motley county showed a marked decrease over last year according to records in the office of Sheriff, Tax Assessor & Collector John Stotts. When the office closed Saturday (deadline for paying poll taxes) only 740 receipts had been issued as compared with 1,238 on the same date last year.

Exemptions this year were nine as compared with 48 last year. Interest in politics during election years accounts for the wide variation in the number of poll taxes issued.

Lions Hear Discussion On Finance

Mysteries of the stock and bond market were simplified Tuesday in an address by M. M. Crawford, representative of the famous firm of Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Beane (Wichita Falls branch).

Mr. Crawford was the principal speaker at the regular meeting of the Matador Lions club held in the Methodist church basement. He was introduced by club secretary Lion C. W. Giesecke.

"There is nothing mysterious about the stock market," Mr. Crawford declared. When you own stocks you own an interest in some firm or enterprise. If the firm makes money you receive a dividend. If you own common stock you receive dividends in ratio to the amount of profit the firm earns. If you own preferred stock the rate of dividend is fixed. The average dividend paid last year was 6 per cent.

"Bonds usually have a fixed rate and are usually issued in amount of \$1,000. They are really a promissory note to be paid on a certain date."

Speculation An Art

"Speculation is an art," Mr. Crawford declared, "and we advise our clients (when they ask for advice) to make investments rather than engage in speculation. You can't tell an artist how to do business and it is equally impossible to tell a speculator how to do business. The speculator is, however, necessary to our economy, especially in the commodity markets of cotton and grains."

The firm of Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Beane has 100 offices in the nation and 17 are located in Texas.

January Blows Hot And Cold, Leaving Scanty Moisture

You may write in your journal for the speculation of posterity that January 1953 was a month of extremes, with the mercury on January 12 reaching a summer point of 80 degrees, while three days later, January 16, it had skidded to a chilly 17 degrees above zero.

These readings are official by the United States weather gauge maintained by City Water Superintendent Lee Burns at the city wells. The reading is taken each morning at 8 a.m. and shows the highest and lowest degrees reached in the past 24 hours.

Burns recorded the precipitation during January at slightly over one-fourth inch (.28-inch) and it arrived in the form of snow on January 22.

Readers will perhaps declare that more than .28-inch moisture was received from the snow and rain which accompanied it—and they will be correct. Rain gauges in several registered sections of this area registered over one-half inch of moisture, but snow in the official gauge is measured by weight which is translated into an equal amount of rainfall. The amount by weight was .28-inch. It is also probable that several rain and snow squalls during the storm did not strike the area where the gauge is located.

A call came from Austin. Governor Allan Shivers had granted Miers a three-day stay of execution because a defense attorney said he could produce a new witness in the slaying case.

Miers jumped up and kissed the chaplain on the cheek. He said he was "expecting something like this."

Later Governor Shivers commuted the sentence to life imprisonment on the condition that Miers shall never become eligible for clemency.

The case received considerable attention the past week when Linda Clark, his professed sweetheart, who is serving a five-year sentence at Goree Prison Farm, said that she hoped to marry Miers "if everything turns out all right"—which it did.

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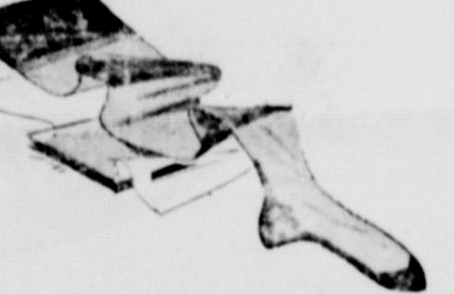

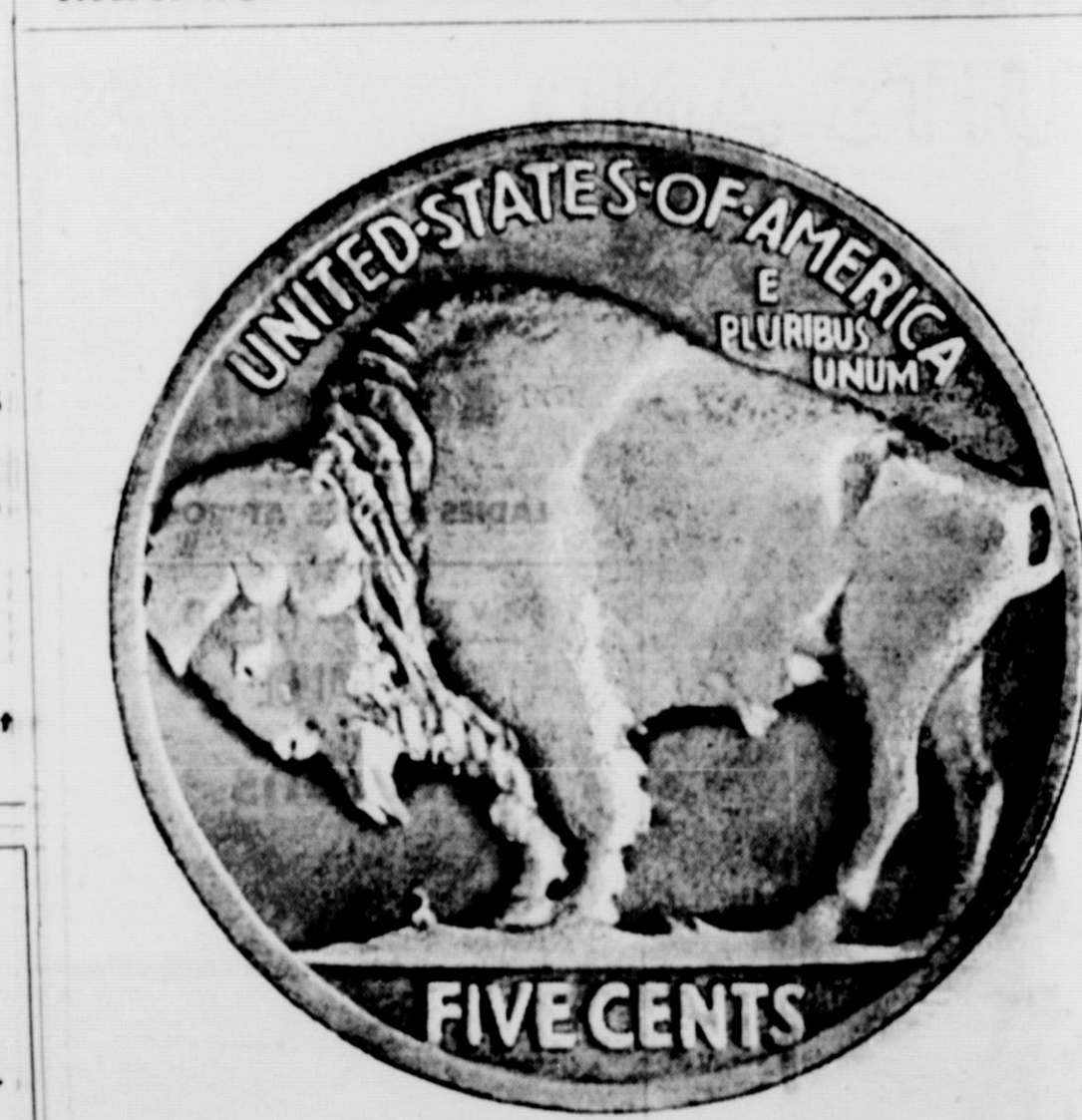

Fort Worth-Denver Freight Train Piles Up Near Quitaque

QUITAQUE, Jan. 31—An all-night session by Fort Worth and Denver Railroad wrecking crews cleared off and repaired a 1,000-foot section of track ten miles south of here where 21 freight cars, loaded with South Plains Cotton, piled up Friday afternoon.

No one was injured seriously in the wreck. No estimate of damage had yet been made by railroad officials, but it is believed that it will run into the thousands of dollars.

Track Is Torn Up

Cause of the wreck was still undetermined, but may have resulted from an old brake shoe found lying near the wreckage.

The wreck occurred about 2 p.m. Friday, according to E. V. Shackelford, Quitaque railroad agent. The last 21 cars of the two-engine train were derailed, tearing up large expanses of track.

Work crews from Childress and four other towns were called in to clean up the mess with the aid of a work train and wrecker. The cleaning up process started late Friday afternoon, and will probably continue for three more days.

Shackelford stated, "Little or no damage" was done to the cotton being shipped from Plains and Floydada areas into Childress, the station agent stated, adding that it would be sent on through as soon as possible.

The track, despite the surrounding maze of broken rail and box cars, was open for regular traffic, Shackelford said.
