Irrigate corn so that it will continue optimum plant growth -- that's the key in producing top yields.

Corn plants should never experience high moisture stress. says County Agricultural Agent J.K. Adams. Adequate soil moisture is especially important during tasseling, pollinating and grain filling. Lack of moisture during these plant growth periods will cut yields.

This means that adequate soil moisture is vital now and will be for the next four to five weeks. Most of the corn in the area is now in the early stages of these high moisture requirement periods. Irrigations applied 10 to 15 days prior to tasseling, during silking and pollination and during the milk to early dough stages of grain filling normally give good

creased moisture stress. The three to four weeks following pollination is also a high moisture requirement period. This is when the blister, milk and soft dough stages of grain development occur. Grain weight increases rapidly so adequate moisture must be available for high grain produc-

During tasseling, silking and pollinating, and early grain filling, only about one-half of the available soil mositure should be depleted before an irrigation is applied. As the grain hardens, moisture effects rapidly decrease. Near maturity, 70 to 80 per cent of the available soil moisture can be safely depleted.







we could find ourselves providing goods of a strategically-important nature, to Soviet bloc countries, or even to the Soviet Union or to Red China. This is not to say that American business is seeking to aid Communist nations. But American business is seeking new markets, and there is a wide area for interpretation in the definition of goods of strategic im-

portance. The sale of machine tools to Rumania, for example, might not appear on the surface to be aiding the Communists in their effort to support the North Vietnamese Army. But that certainly would be the case if the tools were used to manufacture war materials.

In short, without the Export Control Act, we might find ourselves contributing to the enemy's ability to wage war in Vietnam, We might find American technical know-how being utilized to kill American boys in the battle zones.

For this reason, I believe it imperative that the Export Control act be extended,

The Senate Banking and Currency Committee, of which I am a member, has been giving exhaustive study to this issue. The administration has asked that the current law be extended for another five years. I support that request.

Some members of the Senate favor a new export control law which would liberalize the current existing regulations on exports to Communist countries. I am opposed to this plan.

The current law recognizes that certain goods are of no strategic importance and it places no restrictions on these goods. It recognizes that other goods are of obvious and significant importance and it prohibits exportation of these goods. In addition, there is a wide range of goods for which the strategic value is questionable. The law provides that export to Communist countires of these goods requries federal license. The federal government then has an opportunity to decide the strategic impact of each particular item for which export is proposed.






