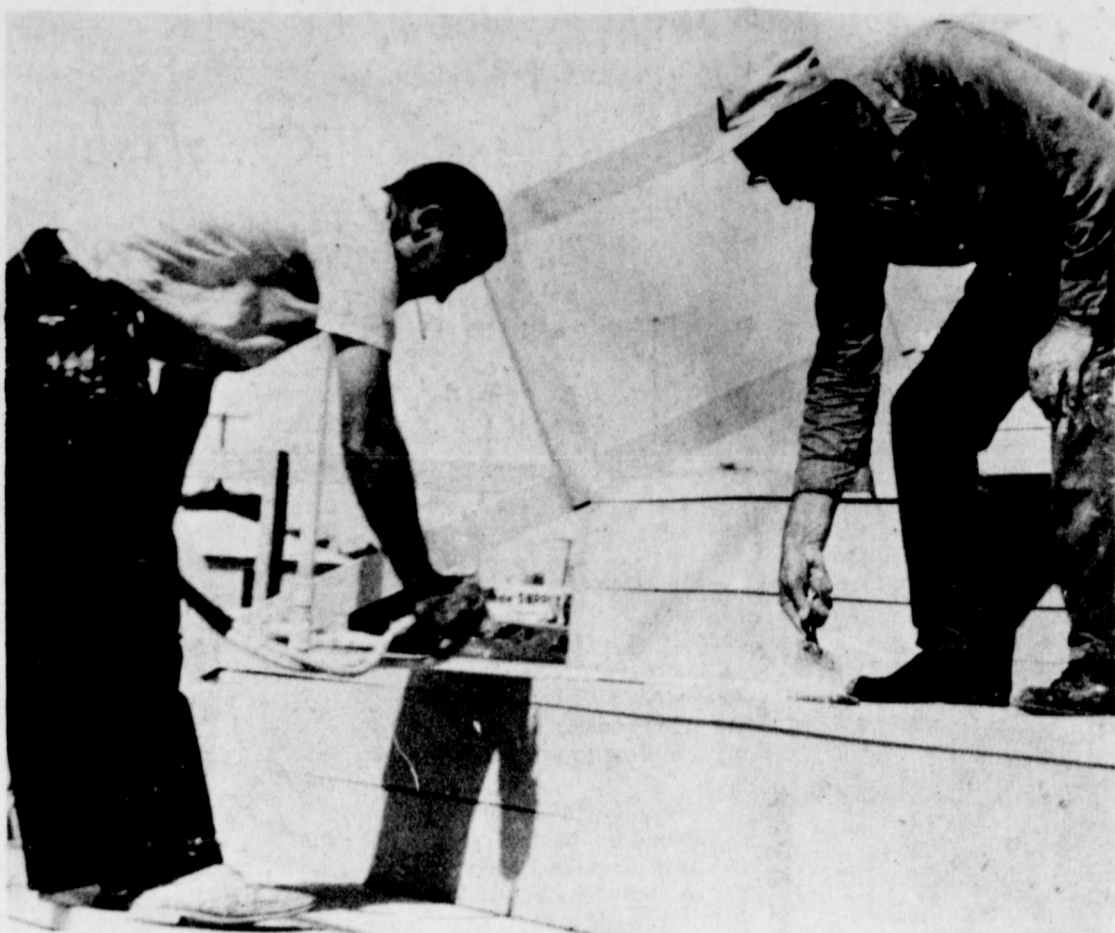

every 15 days up to five to six inches during the 15 days just prior to and during pollination. Special attention should be given soil moisture quantities and plant appearance during these high moisture requirement periods.

Where water is limiting, alternate row irrigations can be used to obtain greater mileage from irrigation water, Adams points out. Thus, fields will

be covered more quickly, giving a yield response on more acres.

All plant processes must be operating at full speed and efficiency to produce maximum corn yields. The heavy moisture requirements that are occurring now and that will continue during the next four to five weeks should not be underestimated. The good rains over the weekend in Bailey county will allow cotton to get in the heavy bloom stage before any irrigation is needed. This will allow farmers to concentrate on irrigation of corn and grain sorghum during this critical stage. Results should be a bumper crop.

This information was provided by Leon New, area irrigation specialist, on the general corn irrigation situation on the High Plains. You may want to make changes as required to best describe your local county situation.

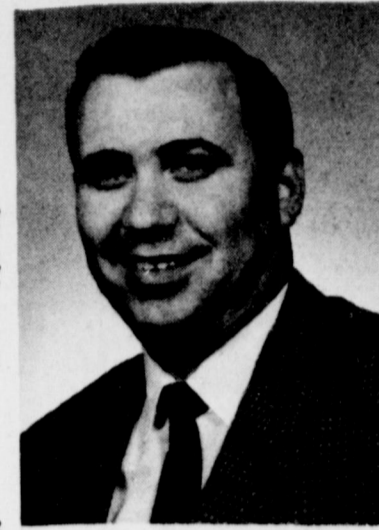

## Sees English Countryside

"The rose gardens are manicured -- not a blade of grass out of place and not a weed anywhere," said Mrs. M.C. Street, Jr. of her homeland, Manchester, England and Cheshire. Of all the things planned for the pleasure by her family after an absence of 24 years, Mrs. Street enjoyed "seeing the beautiful countryside" most of all, "especially the roses sparkling with dew". During her early life she lived in Manchester, a city of 7,000,000 people, worked in town and lived in suburbs, with very little traveling done during World War II. A brother in Australia was unable to make the trip while she was there. "England is just a day away," not counting the six hours lost going over. Of course, you make it up coming back," said Mrs. Street, who has spent four of five weeks visiting relatives in England. Lillian and M.C. Street were married in 1945 but it was 1946 before they came to the States to live. Street was a crew chief on a C47 which picked up war wounded in Germany and flew them to Army hospitals in England. "Skirts are short on the young only now" in England and "long hair is gone out." "They are not church going people", she lamented, telling of radical new morality speakers on TV who were definitely not expressing her own feelings. "There are more pubs than churches in England", she said. People go there to visit at the end of the day, both men and women. They go there and visit and have a beer until closing time at 10:30 each night. "I'm glad to be back home with my family, even if we did get hailed out while I was gone."

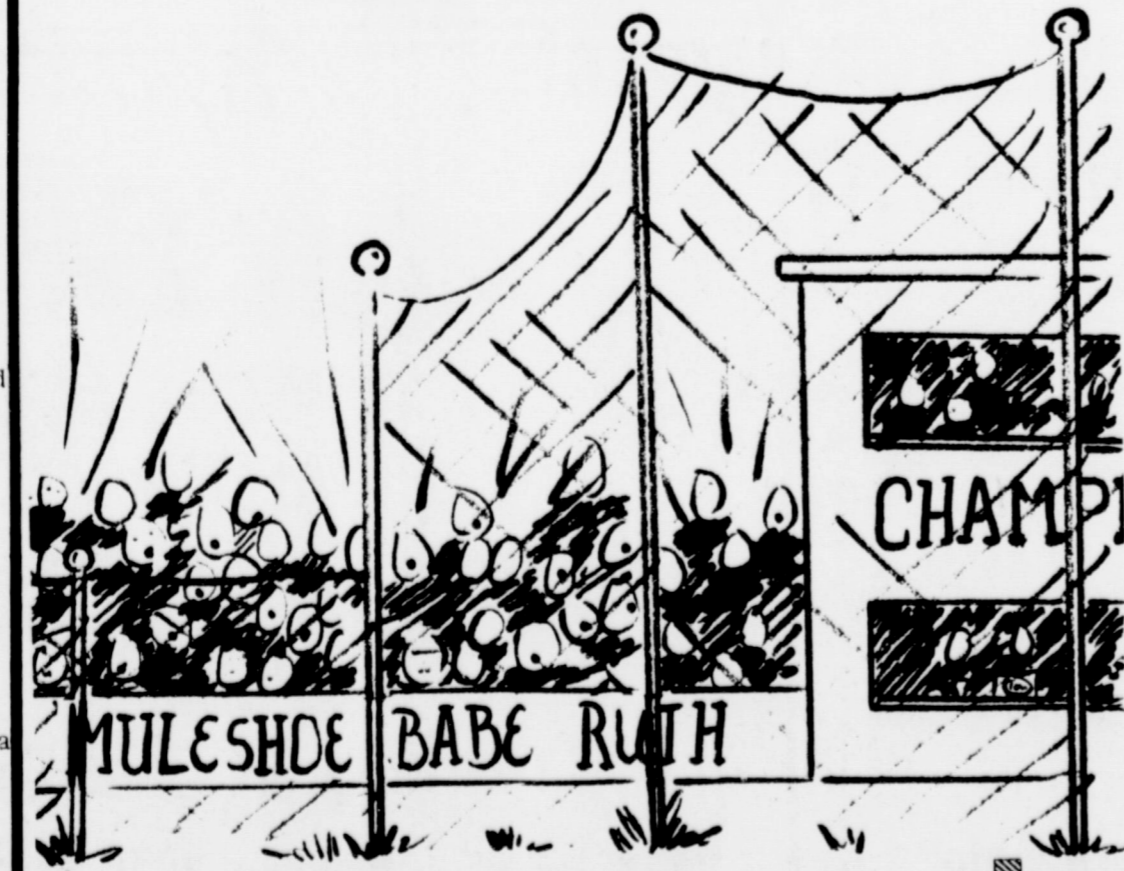

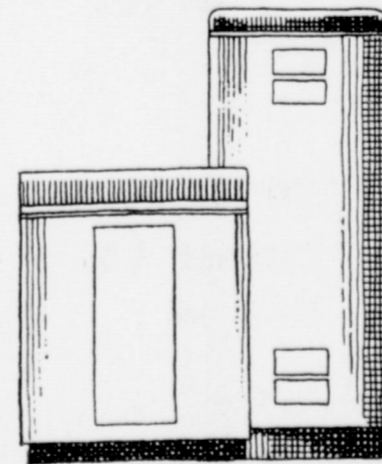

## John Tower United States Senate COMMITTEE ON ARMED SERVICES

We have had a law for many years which provides for regulation and control of this nation's exports to Communist countries. We vitally need this legislation to guard against possible exportation of goods which might provide our enemies with a strategic mili-

tary advantage. The law which provides this much-needed regulation is the Export Control Act. But, my fellow Texans, that law is due to expire soon. I believe it must be extended and so does the Nixon administration. Without extension of the law,

we could find ourselves providing goods of a strategically-important nature, to Soviet bloc countries, or even to the Soviet Union or to Red China. This is not to say that American business is seeking to aid Communist nations. But American business is seeking new markets, and there is a wide area for interpretation in the definition of goods of strategic importance.

The sale of machine tools to Rumania, for example, might not appear on the surface to be aiding the Communists in their effort to support the North Vietnamese Army. But that certainly would be the case if the tools were used to manufacture war materials.

In short, without the Export Control Act, we might find ourselves contributing to the enemy's ability to wage war in Vietnam. We might find American technical know-how being utilized to kill American boys in the battle zones.

For this reason, I believe it imperative that the Export Control act be extended.

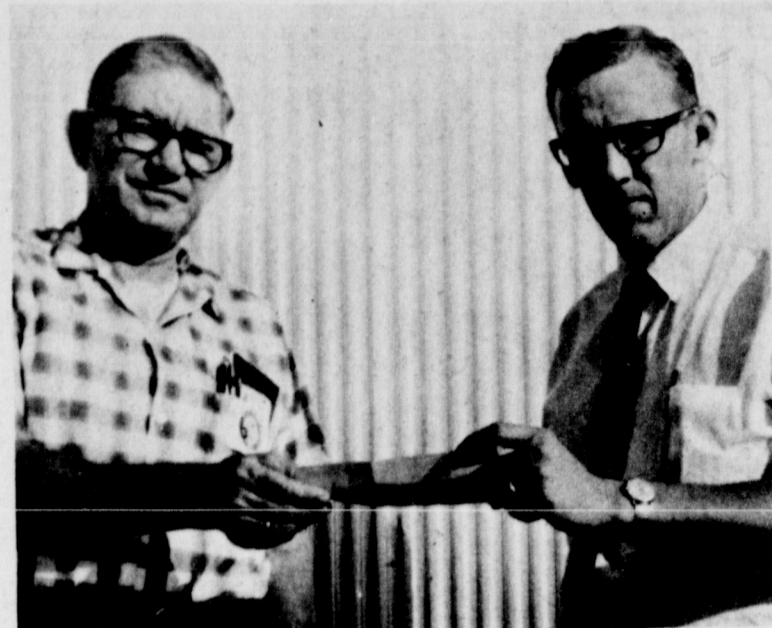
The Senate Banking and Currency Committee, of which I am a member, has been giving exhaustive study to this issue. The administration has asked that the current law be extended for another five years. I support that request.

Some members of the Senate favor a new export control law which would liberalize the current existing regulations on exports to Communist countries. I am opposed to this plan.

The current law recognizes that certain goods are of no strategic importance and it places no restrictions on these goods. It recognizes that other goods are of obvious and significant importance and it prohibits exportation of these goods. In addition, there is a wide range of goods for which the strategic value is questionable. The law provides that export to Communist countries of these goods requires federal license. The federal government then has an opportunity to decide the strategic impact of each particular item for which export is proposed.

If a company desiring to export a product is denied a license, there is legal recourse, but the company has the burden to prove that the proposed export is not of strategic value within the law.

My colleagues who wish to liberalize the Export Control Act, would reverse this pro-

cedure. They would allow exportation to Communist countries unless the federal government acted to prevent it. Their proposal would place the burden of proof on the government to show that the goods proposed for export were of strategic importance.

I fear that such legislation would enable the exportation of strategic goods before the government had a chance to exercise prevention.

The current law, which I believe should be extended, already provides sufficient latitude for the administration to use its export control authority as a tool in our foreign policy. Therefore, I see no reason to liberalize the law on these grounds.

When the Soviet Union demonstrates belligerence we can, under the current law, tighten our exports to Communist countries by granting fewer licenses. When we see indications of cooperation, or when we want to entice the Communist to arms control talks for example, we can relax our export controls within the law.

Also there is really no pressing need to encourage exportation to Communist countries through a liberalized Export Control Act. Exportation involves trade and trade means receiving goods or services or money in exchange for the things we export.

I believe that the answer to the question, "What do the Communists have that we want?" is "very little indeed."

There are those who say that

since Joseph Stalin is dead, his tactics and his ambitions for the Soviet Union are gone along with him. I fear that is not the case. Journalists who have recently returned from Moscow are now reporting a rise of "Stalinism" in the Soviet Union. In my opinion, this is certainly not the time to liberalize our export control regulations. I believe such a move would aid the Communist countries significantly and aid ourselves not at all.

I do not want to be able to blame the deaths of any American boys on a Communist military machine which is nourished by our own technical know-how, and our own eagerness to expand business markets.

That is why I am working for extension of the current Export Control Act without its liberalization.

## Farm Bureau Asks Congress To Make Cuts

WACO --(Sp1)-- The Texas Farm Bureau is asking Congress to make substantial cuts in federal spending as a means of balancing the budget, slowing inflation, and permitting early termination of the income surtax. The state farm organization is also advocating retention of the seven percent investment credit as a permanent feature of the national tax system.

Sidney Dean, president of the 110,689-member organization, sent a telegram to all members of the Texas delegation in the House of Representatives calling for their vote against HR 12290, the bill to extend the income tax surcharge and excise taxes and terminate the investment credit.

"Recognizing the excessive deficit spending by the federal government is the chief cause of current inflation, Texas Farm Bureau respectfully requests your opposition to pending bill HR 12290 to extend the income tax surcharge and excise taxes and terminate the seven percent investment credit," Dean told the Congressman. "Logical way to slow inflation is meaningful reduction in federal expenditures."

The House subsequently voted passage of the measure by a vote of 210 to 205, and the Senate is expected to act on it soon. Some modifications of the bill are expected in the Senate.

ON TRADE WITH RED BLOC After a recent meeting of the National Security Council, the Nixon Administration has disclosed its decision not to encourage further trade with Communist countries "in present circumstances."
