Alfred Merrell, 45, a farmer of the Flomot community, died at the Traweek Hospital here at 5 o'clock this morning, of burns sustained when he became a living torch after a kerosene can exploded in his hands while kindling a fire about dawn Wednesday morning. Covered with the blazing liquid, he ran 40 yards to a watering trough and jumped in. His family awakened by the blast, witnessed the tragedy as they rushed from the house, which was destroyed.

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

Renovated Kitchen Provides **Light-Conditioning**

I TALKED, not long ago, with a little elderly lady who had just visited . . . for the first time . . . one of the modern new kitchens. She was all a-sparkle.

"This kitchen," she exclaimed, "had a refrigerator big enough to hold a steer, cupboards everywhere . . and the most marvelous lighting!"

She had visited a light-condi-tioned kitchen. Light-conditioning is one of the newest conveniences to be added to the room that is so im-portant a part of the homemaker's


Non-technically, the term means having the right amount and the right kind of lighting available . . . regardless of whether or not the sky outside is black with night or grey with threatening clouds.



In addition to the ceiling fixture, this renovated kitchen provides ample light at each work-center to ease labor and prevent eyestrain.

Even so, the natural light in the center of many kitchens is only 1/100th of the light at the window sill. This is not enough for quick seeing and nimble fingers at work, and the addition of scientific lighting is the answer.







Four Corner Lake Waters To Be Saved

Fertile Land To Be Saved By Terrace Of Watershed

Crops valued at four to five housand dollars growing in the rich alluvial soil of three intermittent lake beds totaling 150 acres in area were destroyed when flooded by summer rains, while crops on higher land suffered from drouth in the same season. An extensive plan has been worked out in cooperation with County Agent Frank A. Buckley whereby the surplus water will be soaked into the upland to benefit crops and the lake beds will also be insured against the menace of summer floods

Construction is nearly complete on the two hundred acres of the watershed of the historic Four Corners lake. Flood waters from a shallow draw which normally empties into the lake the drainage from several hundred acres of land lying to the north and west, will be diverted and distributed over a regular field by means of the "syrup-pan" system of level terraces as planned by Mr. Buckley. While the terraces are between two and three feet in height, they are fifty feet wide, and Mr. Whitten expects to work them with his grain machinery without diffculty.

Terracing of the remainder of the watershed of this lake awaits only the removal of summer crops from the land. The watershed of a large lake on Mr. Whitten's place three miles east of Matador will be the site of another extensive demonstration in the utilization of surplus water when harvest of the present crop clears the way for construction.




