


First phase of Bob's Oil Well restoration slated for Saturday

An agreement has been signed recently joining the forces of Princess Skaggs, owner of Bob's Oil Well, Market Matador, the City of Matador, and Motley County Chamber of Commerce to begin restoration of the prominent historic landmark, once known as beacon of the foothills. Truckers remembered the great steaks and carried advertising signs far down the road. Little children thrilled to see, and never forgot, the main attraction of the service station, a pit of rattlesnakes, rattling, writhing and wiggling. To see Bob's once-famous derrick alight once again has been the dream of many, but the goal has been elusive. In 2001 it was the focus of the Chamber's T-21 grant proposal for \$1,000,000. Those efforts, which created a great deal of interest, even to the Texas Historical Commission level, failed, but the Roaring Springs Depot renovation was approved.

According to Matador Mayor Rodney Williams, the operation at the site of a service station, restaurant, blacksmith shop, and roadside zoo will be carried out in three phases. The first includes a general over-all cleanup of the lots, demolition of a wooden structure and out-

house, disposing of tires and batteries, sorting of junk iron and disposal of what is determined to be trash. The second phase will include repair and maintenance work on the buildings and capping gas pipes. The final and most exciting (electrifying) stage, and possibly the most expensive, will restore the beacon to shine once again.

Already Ms. Skaggs and her family have started the tedious process of sorting an accumulation of over seventy years. In fact, so dedicated to the task was the young mother that she spent Mother's Day working around her grandfather's famous Cook Shack. For Sale signs have been placed on a mobile home and camper trailer to be moved.

The work at Bob's Oil Well will be performed by volunteers who will sign release of liability forms. There will be many jobs at different times. Those willing to lend a hand in this community beautification project should contact Shane Jones at Matador Variety (347-2820), Brian Marshall at Marshall Brothers Propane (347-2290) or Rodney Williams (347-2857) to tell how they can help. These people will then coordinate the plans and direct the beginning cleanup on Saturday, May 24. Everyone is reminded that this is personal property to be re-spected and holds many memories for the owner. Princess Skaggs requests that no one remove any item in her absence or without her permission.





Also in the Dallas area lives T.J Christopher. After graduating from school he and Trisha continued their courtship.


Meanwhile, TJ attended medical school and became a brain surgeon. During all of this he married Trisha and they had a child.


You wouldn't believe it, but Matador is over populated because his restaurant brought in so many people.

Brittany Moore - I plan on being married with 4 kids. And working as a nurse.



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Museum Board addresses water problems

Water damage to inside walls was on the agenda when the Motley County Museum board met on May 5 with President Wilburn Martin, presiding. The building, formerly the Traweek Hospital, was built in 1927, and once housed the Motley County Clinic. It is a flatroofed affair with the lower story sunken into the ground. It has had a long history of water damage through seepage or leakage.

The directors vowed to protect the building to the best of their abilities, thereby preserving the items of an historical nature that have been donated to share the history of Motley County. Donations toward the repair of the roof and foundation will be gratefully accepted.

Treasurer Joyce Archer voiced her concern about finances. Donations have been waning for several years and she suggested the museum directors make it a point to let people know that their contribu-

tions are needed and always appreciated. Mrs. Archer does an excellent job of notifying family members or friends when a memorial or honorarium is made to the museum.

The directors agreed to continue the arrangement with the Motley County Chamber of Commerce whereby the two entities share office space, equipment, and employee, Barbara Armstrong. Charlie Johnson expressed appreciation of the arrangement that allows the museum to be open three afternoons a week at a minimum of cost to each organization.


Mr. Martin, on behalf of his aunt, Dude Barton, presented a Ken Young photograph of the historic Wilburn Barton Barn, located at her home in the Flomot community. The photograph was framed with wood saved from the original Barton home and handcrafted by Dude, a retired cotton farmer with time on her hands.

The barn was built in 1906, three years after Wilburn and Ella Orr Barton took title to the

property owned by his father Al Barton. They had moved from a dugout a few miles east of the site to the north side of the North Pease River, west of Texas Highway 70. The Bartons and their nine children, Dude being the youngest, made a liv-ing farming and ranching. The large wooden barn was essen-tial to housing the hay and feed, as well as the harness and equipment necessary to farming with mules. Photographer Ken Young found the muted colors of the old barn fascinating and will feature prints in his studio in Roaring Springs, some framed with wood from the Barton homestead.

Other discussion included vacancies to be filled on the board of directors. Anyone interested in serving in this advisory position is urged to call the office and tell Mrs. Armstrong or leave a message. They will be invited to attend the next meeting that will take place in the near future.

The directors viewed the several areas affected by water damage and then adjourned.







The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) announced today that financial assistance will be available in Texas to conserve natural resources and address environmental concerns on private lands. These funds are part of conservation provisions con-tained in the 2002 Farm Bill authorized by the Enviromental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP). Eligible farmers and ranchers may apply for these funds as cost-share assistance.

In making the announce-ment Dr. Larry D. Butler, State Conservationist for NRCS in Texas, said, "Each county will be provided a base allocation. Local Work Groups (LWGs) have established resource concerns, eligible conservation treatment practices, and devel-oped the ranking criteria and screening processes. This is the government at its best where local landowners and operators establish local conservation priorities at the grassroots level." In Texas, NRCS works with

261 local Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCDs) to address local natural resource issues. James Timmons, Chairman of the Upper Press SWCD, said he was pleased with the input they have reached in developing the local conservation needs criteria for Motley County. "The process for the 2003 EQIP Program gave local people the opportunity to have input in identifying conservation practices most beneficial to pro-ducers and the community. The process did and excellent job of involving local people in identi-fying the most crucial natural resource concerns in this county."

Time is still on the growers side, but another week or two without significant rainfall and the situation will take on a considerably darker complexion.
