

This little news story intrigued

me for several reasons, one being the fish angle and another be-

Making the story more interesting however, is the fact that the very same fish I had the pleasure of catching, was hooked out on the banks of a bayou (we pronounced it bi-o) just about four or five miles down a railroad track from the same little

rillage of Deering. Then, the town was comprised of several blocks of unpainted dwellings occupied by employees and their families, of a great industrial agency of the east, operating two separate divisions, a railroad and a sawmill, with a huge lumber yard. On Sundays the principal diversion of the citizens was to gather at the depot at train-time, and then stroll down the broad planked avenues of the lumber yard, through aisles of great stacks of lumber awaiting shipment, while the children played hide-and-seek, with the

company office as home base. Very little of the old industry remains now. Timber which once grew almost to the doorsteps, has been cleared away to make place for great fields of cotton and other crops. The sawmill with its mammoth machinery, has vanished and in its stead stand several modern cotton gins. Only a small amount of lumber is kept on hand, and this is sawed and made ready at small mills located thru the outlying fringe of forest.

The narrow plank sidewalks through the little town still remain, but the rows of dreary houses, all of the same pattern are gradually being torn down and replaced with neat, new cottages painted a shining white. The old building housing the commissary where we used to call for the mail before purchasing supplies-market in the back, groceries on the left and drygoods on the right, is still in use, but the two-story hotel is gone, and a modern home for the superinten-

dent stands on that corner. How I remember that hotelthe first one I was ever in; and the people thought my sister and I were twins because we were dressed alike-even to our new Billikin shoes in which we marched so proudly down the wide, carpeted stairway! The few days we stayed there until our furniture arrived, were neverto-be-forgotten ones.



Also, cotton is washable, and the fibers, stronger and toughe than steel, can be subjected to countless launderings. Most gar ments can be washed without fear of shrinkage or running and fading dyes.

Increasing popularity of cotton playsuits and slack suits in the south is largely due to the fabric's ability to withstand hard wear and strain.

"The fact that cottons are suitable to the south is all the more reason why we should buy cotton garments," the committee chairman stated. "Certainly it is to our economic advantage to wear cottons, for some 11,000,000 of us are directly dependent on cotton for a livelihood and the remainder indirectly derive at least a substantial portion of their incomes from the cotton industry."
