Social Security Number Essential To All Employees

Every employee connected with a county or regional fair, a community festival, rodeo, football game, or concessionaire was cautioned today by Palmer, manager of the Lubbock office of the Social Security Board to make certain that each employer for whom he works is given a record of the worker's social security account number.

This account number should be given to the employer before the employee goes to work. If an individual having no account number will call at the Social Security Board office located at Lubbock, he will be issued one. "It requires only a few minutes to secure the account number that will save the worker and each of his employers a lot of time and trouble in the years to come.

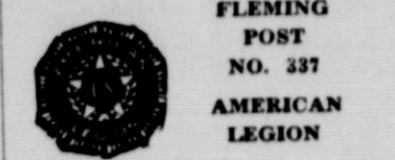

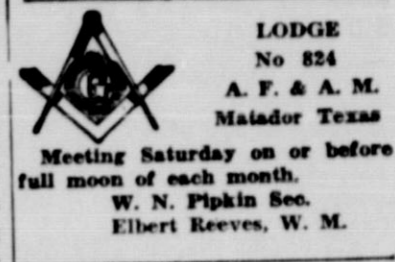

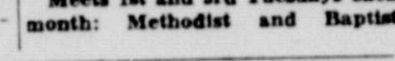

Elburn—I need protection! (The girls just won't leave him alone!)

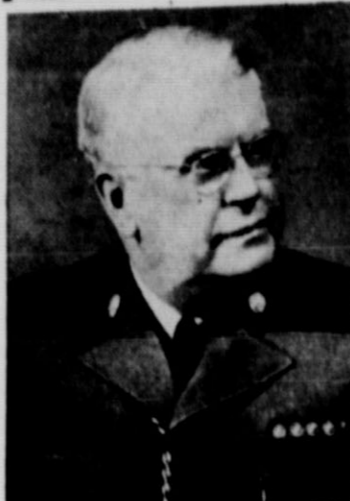

PLANS BEING MADE TO START WORK ON COTTON INSURANCE

Determining an average lint yield and premium rate per acre for every cotton farm in Motley County is the first task to be accomplished under the cotton crop insurance program.

Until these figures have been approved by the State AAA, Committee and Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, applications cannot be accepted.

We hope to start writing insurance applications in the county later in the fall, however, detail work will not begin until 1942 farm allotments have been determined.

Mr. Rushing explained that the food-for-defense program could get underway.

The 1934-1940 cotton history for a farm will be the basis of determining the average lint yield for a farm.

Premium rates, which will reflect as nearly as possible crop insurance risks on the farm, will be taken from losses shown in the base period.

The crop insurance program, under which 50 per cent or 75 per cent of the average yield may be insured, protects farmers against hail, rain, flood, drought and other factors over which they have no control.
