### 4-H Clubs Get Quail Release

In cooperation with the Texas Game & Fish Commission, five Motley County 4-H clubs Tuesday received a shipment of 645 bobwhite quail. They were released Tuesday afternoon.

The quail are 7 to 8 weeks of age and were raised at the state hatchery at Tyler. W. L. Arnold from the hatchery delivered the quail to State Game Warden Jerry Niles.

The pickup load of quail left Tyler Monday night and arrived here shortly after noon where the crates were distributed among the five different clubs in the county under the supervision of County Agent Bill Palmeyer. Arnold said the hatchery produces from 50 to 60,000 quail per year.

The quail are released through 4-H clubs to encourage interest in game management, and quail protection, Palmeyer said.

## Old Settlers Bid Declined By Governor

An invitation to attend the annual reunion of Motley-Dickens County Old Settlers at Roaring Springs August 22, 23 and 24, was declined last week by Governor Connally in a personal letter to Old Settlers President Maurice Goodwin of Altton.

An invitation had been extended Governor Connally after his election but prior to his inauguration by officials of Old Settlers Association. Since the town of Roaring Springs is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year it was especially hoped that the state's top official might be on hand for this occasion.

In his reply Gov. Connally said a conflict of previous engagements made it impossible for him to attend and he expressed his regrets. He said his delay in answering the invitation was the result of his hope that it might be possible to schedule his visit here, but that earlier commitments made it impossible.

President Goodwin said efforts will now be made to confirm an invitation to another high state official.

How much more important is good health than creature comforts: Unless one has good health, and thus continuing employment, or even life itself, no amount spent for creature comforts will do him any good at all!

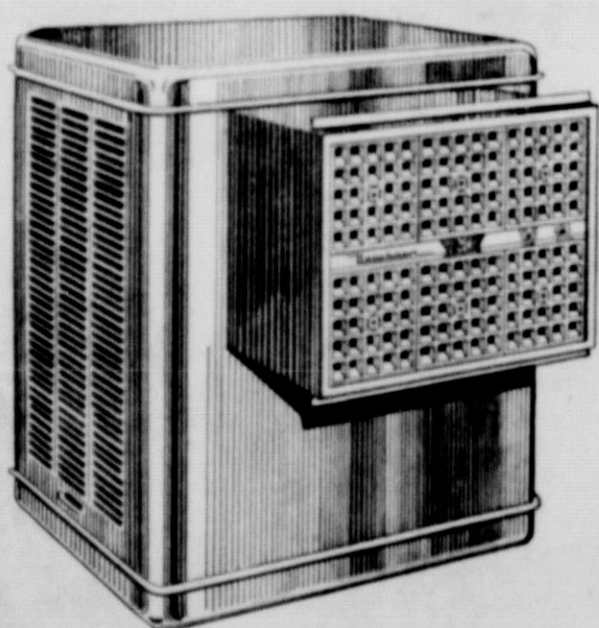

Midland bermuda grass, just this year recommended in the Panhandle as a cold tolerant hybrid that is producing high yields of forage under irrigation, has been grown quietly in Collingsworth as a dry-land grass since 1957.

Following reports last week of yields expected under irrigation in the county, Oran Starkey mentioned casually that he set out some on his farm near Salt Fork River 6 years ago. Temple Slay also has some.

More questions brought some interesting information.

Noting that sprigging is now done by machines, Starkey recalled that he sprigged his in by hand in the spring of 1957, it covered the ground that summer and he grazed 35 head on an acre that first fall.

"The next year, I took some to my place east of town and put it on a tank dam. It stayed there and spread, and every year when the native grass dries up, it stays green," Starkey said. He is getting ready to set out 10 more acres — also on dry land.

Starkey thinks his Midland Bermuda would furnish more grazing if he would fertilize it.

"With average rainfall, it will carry two to three head of yearlings per acre," he explained.

"When I put it in, sprigs were \$2.00 per bushel wholesale. I got mine from a fellow who came up to buy some sorghum alum seed from me," Starkey added.

He also sows biennial clover in his Midland Bermuda. That lengthens the grazing period, since it comes out before the grass does.

Starkey is happy to see the grass put out on a more extensive scale here. He is sold on it and his own experience is encouraging.

Midland Bermuda, according to information from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was developed at the Georgia Coastal Experiment Station and is a cross between coastal bermuda grass and the cold-hardy Indiana Common Bermuda.

As it is a hybrid, it does not make seed and has to be sprigged.

The Extension Service recommends fertilization and irrigation.

Starkey, who has grown it as a dry-land crop, has some practical pointers he can pass on to those who are interested.



### Plans for 1964 Livestock Show Made By Association Board of Directors

Plans for the 1964 livestock show to be held in Matador the Saturday before the Plainview Livestock Show were made by the board of directors of the Motley County Livestock Association at a meeting on May 28. All previous rules will be in effect for the 1964 show, except the changes listed below.

Steers will be divided into three classes, with light steers weighing 650 to 800 lbs.; medium steers weighing 801 to 950 lbs.; and heavy steers weighing 951 lbs. and over. Maximum age of steers at show time will not be over 18 months. The show will be the 3rd or 4th Saturday in March.

Barrows and fat gilts for market will be shown in the same classes, with weights as follows: Light market animals, 190 to 205 lbs.; medium weight animals, 206 to 225 lbs.; heavy animals, 226 to 245 lbs. All animals in these classes must weigh from 190 to 245 lbs. which is the weight limits of top hogs that bring top prices.

Breeding classes of hogs will be open gilts; bred gilts; and sows. No breeding animals will

be sold through the auction. (Applies to swine and beef classes). \*Minimum weight for these classes remains at 150 lbs.

There will be no classes for sheep in 1964.

The 1964 show will be held at the Matador Ag Bldg., as facilities are better for holding the show.

Animals will be weighed only once to determine class and eligibility for the show. At this time, the owner must indicate if the animal is for sale or not. This is necessary so that floor bidders can place their bids on animals. The market price will be available to owners at this time to assist them in their decision.

The top four animals in each class (total of 12 steers and 12 market hogs) will be sold at auction if the owner wishes to sell. Any sale of animals placing below 4th, will be between the owner and the prospective buyer, as these animals will not be auctioned. If buyers of these animals will report the purchase price to the show secretary, credit will be given these buyers in the publicity of the sale results.

The auction will be held immediately following the placing of the steers.

Election of new directors will be after the placing of hogs, and before placing of beef animals.

The membership drive will be conducted after the 1st of the year to secure prize money and obtain funds for the show operation. Lions clubs will contact prospective buyers 30 days prior to show time to secure buyers for the animals to be auctioned.

Malcolm Turner, Flomot was elected President of the Association for the coming show; with F. E. (Banty) Brandon, Roaring Springs, elected Vice-president; and Bob Thompson, Matador, Secretary-Treasurer. Other directors are Herb Martin, Flomot; Manly Thompson, Matador; and Bill Hand, Roaring Springs. Other show committee members are Joe Degan and Horace Hunter, Flomot; Lewis Blevins and Kenneth Thompson, Matador; Clyde Clifton and Corky Marshall, Roaring Springs.

The committee wishes to thank the public for support in the past and welcome suggestions for improvement.

Show advisors are Bill Peacock, Bill Moss and Bill Pallmeyer.

### COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

A fertilizer short course was held at Childress for fertilizer dealers and agricultural workers on June 18 and 25 and July 1, with Bill Peacock, J. T. Swim Jr., and Corky Marshall, Roaring Springs; and Bill Moss and I. from Matador attending. One bit of information that we picked up at these meetings may change the fertilizer picture in Motley County. FERTILIZER IS GOOD DROUTH INSURANCE. Tests from Experiment Stations and farmers over nearly all of Texas show that soils which are properly fertilized, LESS MOISTURE IS REQUIRED TO MAKE A CROP.

Only 10" of moisture was required to produce a bale of cotton on properly fertilized land, while 20" was required on unfertilized land. A ton of grain sorghum required 6" of moisture where fertilized, and 16" where no fertilizer was used; 3" of moisture produced a ton of coastal bermuda, while unfertilized land required 13" of moisture. For wheat, the figures were 1/2" per bushel where fertilized, and 1" unfertilized. (Copies of these results are on file in my office.)

Stockmen may be interested in the 13th annual Beef Cattle Short Course to be held at Texas A&M on July 29-31. Items to be covered include nutrition, disease prevention, parasite control, feed efficiency, additives, breeding and management. Results of the Experimental Ranch at Throckmorton will also be given. Programs may be obtained at my office.

Careless worms or garden webworms are damaging cotton in parts of the county. Normally they do not damage plants for a long period of time, but on young cotton, stands can be ruined. If materials are applied when the worms are young, good controls can be obtained.

It is not generally necessary to treat the entire field, but only spots that are infested, making these areas large enough to cover some cotton around the trouble spots that have not been attacked. Materials that will give good control are Toxaphene-DDT (2:1), Seven and Endrin.

Farmers should be on the lookout for over-wintered boll weevils. These weevils have been found in the Flomot and Roaring Springs areas, and when they are found in fields prior to the appearance of 1/2 grown squares, treatment of the areas where weevils are found can result in a great reduction of control that would be required later in the year, and confine infestations to small areas of the field.

1963 Cotton Insect Control guides are available at my office.

### Farm Sale Taxable Says IRS Officer

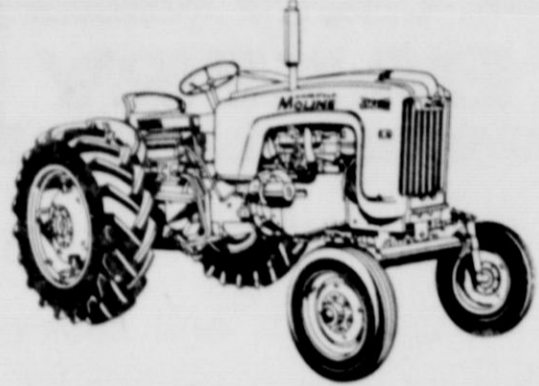
The sale of a farm is taxable, says Elton W. Davidson Administrative Officer at the Plainview office of Internal Revenue. Mr. Davidson points out that farmers must pay tax on any gain on the sale of their farm or other capital items, even though they may turn around and use the money to buy another farm or similar item.

In a letter to County Agricultural Agents, the District Director of Internal Revenue in Dallas asked the County Agents to help IRS correct the erroneous thinking. The tax man advised farmers to check the tax consequences before they sell, trade, or swap.

Bill Pallmeyer, the local County Agent, has pointed out that farmers can get a good general idea of taxes owed by reading the farmers tax guide furnished free by the Internal Revenue Service and available at his office.
