COLLEGE STATION 'County Government: A Responsible Partner in Our Nation's Progress' was theme of the 16th Annual County Judges and Commissioners Conference February 6-7 at Texas A&M Univer-

Motley County Judge Forrest Campbell was one of the more than 600 county judges and commissioners from across Texas attending the sessions, which were held at the Ramada Inn.

Constitutional revision and its effect upon county government was a topic of major interest. State representative Bill Clayton of Springlake spoke on the importance of maintaining the integrity of county government under any revised system.

Federal highway policy was considered in a symposium chaired by Lubbock County Commissioner Arch Lamb. Special participants in this presentation included Marcus L. Yancey, Jr. of the Texas Highway Department, John Staha in the Governor's Division of Planning Coordination, and Charles Simons, a member of the Texas Highway Commission.

Dallas County Judge W. L. "Lew" Sterrett, president of the Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association, presided at the conference, which also featured topics on job classification plans, ad valorem tax exemptions and workmen's compensation

laws for local government. The conference, planned by a committee of county officials, was sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with the Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association. 



- 1. Let Nature help you to save on operating costs.

- 5. For savings on energy, set the thermostat on the temperature setting that provides adequate comfort (the President suggests 68°). Don't continually switch it up and down. Remember, the lower you set the thermostat in the winter the more money you save
- 6. Adequate lighting is essential for creating a safe and pleasing environment in every room of your home. Dust and dirt alone cause substantial losses in the amount of light produced. Systematic cleaning is important. Clean lamp bulbs (when they are cool) with a damp cloth. Conserve and save energy by turning lights off in rooms that are not needed.
