Fred Fulfer, 50, pioneer boot maker of Motley county, was buried in East Mound Cemetery afternoon. Mr. Fulfer Monday died at his home in Ft. Stockton, Saturday, February 27 and the body was brought here Sunday for burial.

Funeral services were conducted at the Matador Baptist church at 3:30, Monday, by Rev. M. B. Carroll. Mr. Fulfer has been in poor health for approximately 30 days before his sudden death, Saturday. Fred Fulfer was born in Erath county, Texas, December 31, 1892. the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Fulfer. He moved with his family to Motley county during 1901 and proximately two years ago when he moved to Ft. Stockton.
