Before the Japs attacked us at Pearl Harbor I introduced in this House a bill to eliminate strikes in war industries. Shortly thereafter the President by executive order adopted one provision of this bill, namely the creation of a board to settle disputes between management and labor, and pro vide that the findings of this board should be final.

Today while labor disputes shamefully threaten to stop the West Coast production of the bombing planes we must have, I re-introduce that bill and provide that if the findings of the National War Labor Board are not adhered to by either management or labor and that if such lack of adherence might cause a stoppage or interruption in production, then the government of the United States shall be empowered to take over the order in which they become the operation of such plant.
