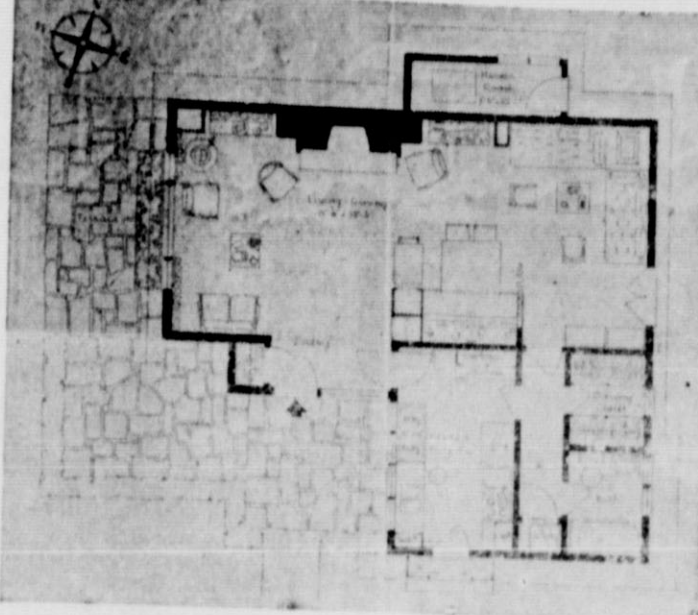

**Tribune To Print Proposed Changes In Constitution**

Three proposed constitutional amendments will be published in four issues of the Tribune, beginning with the August 1 number. ### Army's Pay Scale Boost Is Released

New pay scales for the Army have been released. In addition to the increase in salaries, the new setup provides for free clothing, food, lodging, medical aid and dental care. Also, a retirement plan has been instigated.

Master sergeants or first sergeants draw \$165 per month base pay; technical sergeants \$135; staff sergeants \$115; sergeants \$100; corporal \$90; private-first class \$80; and privates \$75.

In addition to the regular salary arrangements, enlisted personnel receive a 20 per cent increase for overseas service, a 50 per cent increase if a member of a flying or glider crew, and a five per cent increase for each three years of service.

The retirement plans are based upon 20 years of service or 30 years service.

### Superphosphate Received In County

Motley County will receive 20 tons or 400-100 pound bags of 48% superphosphate this week. This material is being shipped from the manufacturer in Houston to S. J. Braselton in Roaring Springs who will be the vendor for this material in Motley County.

This phosphate will cost \$58.60 per ton off the car in Roaring Springs or \$2.93 per bag of 100 pounds. Since this is double strength phosphate only 100 pounds per acre is required. If producers distribute this in accordance with AAA regulations, the AAA will pay \$36.00 per ton, or \$1.80 per sack, to Mr. Braselton at the time of delivery making an "out of pocket" cost to the producer of \$1.13 per sack or acre.

AAA specifications for the practice of making application of phosphate to land can be found in your 1946 Texas Handbook, page 14, under practice No. 35. To earn the AAA payment in this county for this practice, phosphate can be applied to permanent pastures, new seedings of grasses, that would include sudan grass for grazing, legumes seeded alone or with a nurse crop, winter cover crops (other than small grains alone), hay crops and summer legumes grown for cover crops, hay or seed for planting.

Much interest is being shown in this material. All producers in this county will admit that something is needed, whether or not phosphate is the answer we do not know. However, we do know that all soil tests that have been made of Motley County soils by the writer show a deficiency of phosphorus. Many soils deficient in phosphorus are over exposed to erosion because these lands are not able to grow crops which conserve and build up their fertility. The only practical way to return phosphorus to soils is to apply phosphatic fertilizers. A deficiency of this important mineral affects not only the growth and yield of crops but also the health and growth of animals which eat the grasses and grains coming from the phosphorus deficient soil.

What phosphorus does: It improves the quality of crops; it builds up plant resistance to disease; it promotes heavy growth of cover crops, which retards erosion; it aids in seed development, hastens maturity, stimulates blooming; it stiffens the straw of small grains and reduces the tendency to lodge; it enables legumes and grasses to crowd out weeds and other

rain could be had. September and October is the best time of year for planting the peas. A legume that will grow is badly needed in this county for winter control of wind and water erosion, for grazing, and for green manuring to improve soil productivity. At the present time we do not know which legume is best, if any; however, according to recent interest shown there are plenty of farmers in this county willing to spend their good money and time to experiment till the proper legume is found. Leadership is all that has been lacking, and the AAA is ready to help in anyway within their jurisdiction and regulations.

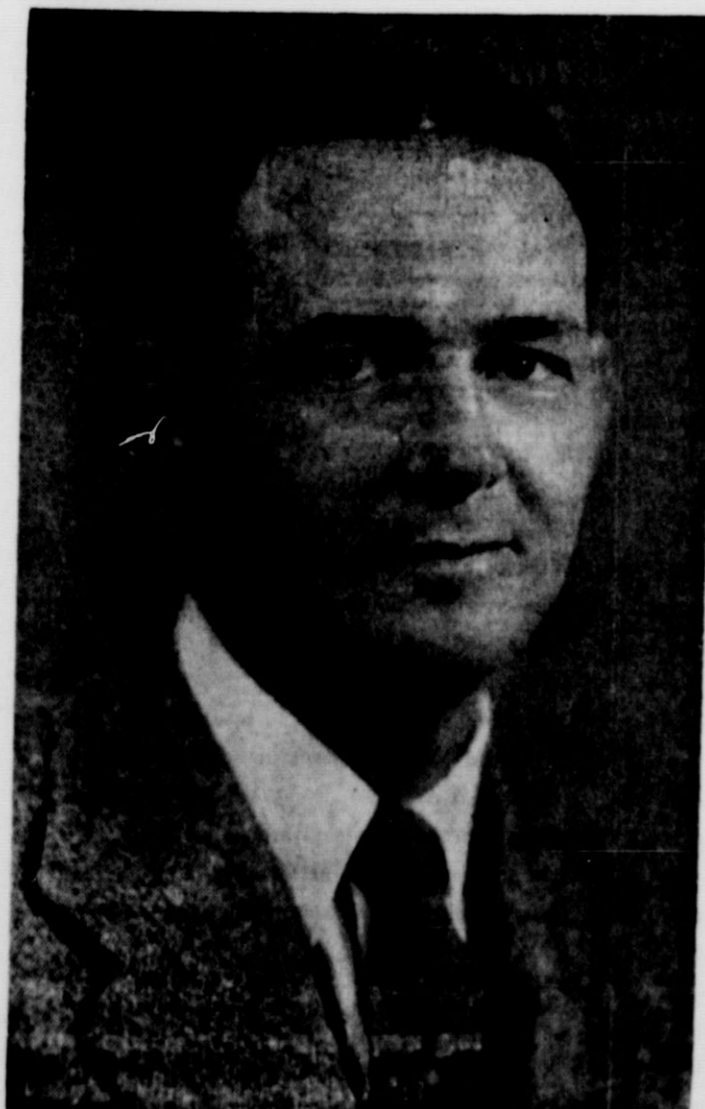

### Floydada Man Held On Charge Of Manslaughter

Vernon King, 35, veteran truck driver of Floydada, is being held for \$2,500 bond at Albuquerque this week on a charge of manslaughter set in justice of the peace court there Tuesday.

The charge is in connection with the death of Captain Robert F. Bradley, Army Air Force officer, 24, who died of injuries sustained on July 8. New Mexico state police charge that the truck sideswiped the officer's car. Captain Bradley, who drove with his arm partly extended, had the member badly crushed. He died, a dispatch last week said, of gangrene which set in in the wound. Captain Bradley, an Amarillo man was buried Tuesday of this week at Amarillo.

D. W. Fyfe, for whom King was driving went to Albuquerque last week and spent four days there. Both the truck and the car were driven from the scene of the accident, he said, and King was arrested on an Albuquerque street. The accident occurred in Tijeras canyon 13 miles distant. King was headed with a load of seed for Albuquerque.

The Associated Press report said that King was charged with drunken driving and leaving the scene of an accident, but the charge was changed to manslaughter when the army officer died.

#### Has Been Here 10 Years

King is a veteran truck driver and once operated a school bus here. He has driven trucks for several of the operators who haul in and out of Floydada. Inquiry yesterday for the Hesperian elicited the information that he was reared in Motley and Floyd counties and married a Whiteflat girl, a member of the Norton family there. He has the name of being a quite man and a reliable driver. The family took up residence here in 1936 and except for a time spent in Lubbock where he was mechanic for a trucking line and part-time driver, has resided here since. He was employed with Lee Wilkinson when he first came here, later working for Geo. M. Finker and J. M. Daniel.

King's wife was prostrated by the news of her husband's trouble. The family live on East Mississippi street where they own their home. They have a son, 13, and a baby daughter, seven months old.

D. W. Fyffe who went to New Mexico on receipt of the news of King's trouble, returned with his truck after four days spent at Albuquerque. He is not too optimistic, he said, over King's chance for proving innocence of wrongdoing. Fyffe said it could well be that the fault for the accident was that of the other car. The truck is a low-gear vehicle for mountain climbing. It is one which Fyffe himself has driven many trips into the mountain states.

### Ranch Pays 40% Of Tax In County

Rumors that the Matador Land and Cattle Company has been shown favor in the matter of tax valuation, as compared with similar property, is denounced by Judge Wm. R. Cammack, in a signed statement to the Tribune.

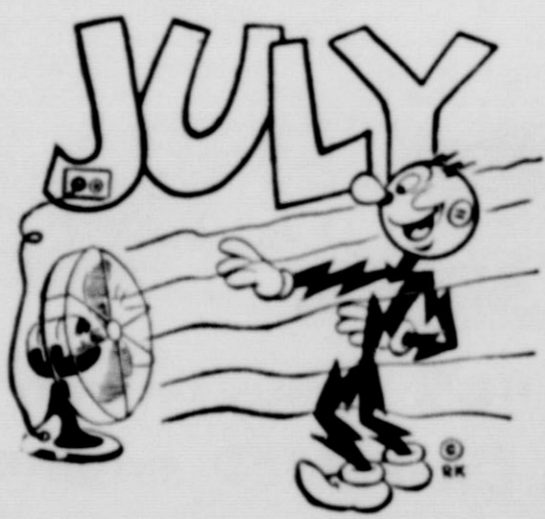
"Matador Land & Cattle Company owns and renders for taxation, about 41% of all lands in Motley county. The records will indicate that THE COMPANY WILL PAY ABOUT 40% OF THE TAXES ON REAL ESTATE THIS YEAR. The one per cent difference between the amount of taxes to be paid by the company this year, is caused by the difference in the amount of improvements on the company's lands as compared with the lands of local citizens. The company has also rendered for taxation this year, 23 head of cattle per section, which compare favorably with other ranchers within the county. The records are open for inspection by the public."

The above article, appearing in last week's issue of the Tribune, is hereby reproduced word for word. However, your attention is directed to the one sentence which has been capitalized, thereby giving an interpretation inconsistent with the context of the article.
