

REMEMBER the picnic when the late Jeff Morriss operated a mule-drawn merry-go-round, and there was political speaking? Remember the buggies and wagons and how the automobiles scared the horses in 1916. Perhaps you have forgotten but the nation's food administrator, Marvin Jones, has not forgotten. It was in that far-a-way day that he launched his political campaign, as candidate for Congress, under the shade of the long pavilion in the above picture.

Speakers ahead of the 31-year-old candidate were having trouble making themselves heard above the noise of Jeff Morriss' merry go-round. Marvin Jones paid Mr. Morriss \$2 to rest his mules while he talked to an attentive audience. Then he sat down, Mr. Morriss' mules were rested; the merry-go-round started again. The Jeff Morriss family has kept the merry-go-round. The people of the Texas Panhandle kept Marvin Jones in Congress for over 20 years until he retired to accept Judgeship in the U. S.
