had been a member of the Meth-

Alibates Quarries Inspection Friday

Congressman Walter Rogers,
accompanied by Congressman
Tom Morris of Tucumcari, N. M.
and Congressman J. Edgar Che-
noweth of Trinidad, Colorado,
will be on the banks of the
Canadian River, Friday.

Purpose of their visit will be
the proposed "Alibates Flint
Quarries and Texas Panhandle
Pueblo Culture National Monu-
ment."
They will discuss the monu-
ment with members of the Potter
County Historical Survey Com-
mittee and Panhandle Geologi-
cal Society, which have strongly
advocated preserving the histori-
cal site as a National Monument.

Congressman Rogers said the
three Congressmen plan to make
the trip to the quarries and
pueblo ruins located not far
from the Canadian River dam
now under construction.
For thousands of years the
quarries were a source of flint
for weapons and tools used by
North American Indian tribes.
Flint mined in the quarries has
been found by archeologists in
Indian burial sites thousands of
miles from the Texas Panhandle
indicating the extent to which
this primitive commodity was
traded.

Congressman Rogers has
urged Congress to enact his bill
(H. R. 8609) to designate the
area as a national monument.

County Judge Elbert Reeves
will make the memorial address
in tribute to Motley-Dickens
County pioneers on the begin-
ning day of the 41st annual Old
Settlers Reunion at Roaring
Springs, August 27, 28 and 29th.
Announcement of the princi-
pal speaker was made yester-
day by Maurice Goodwin, vice-
president of the organization.
Judge Reeves is a native of Mot-
ley County. Previous to his elec-
tion as county judge, he served
two terms as a member of the
State legislature.

The memorial services will be
conducted at 11 o'clock Thursday
morning, Aug. 27, immediately
following the parade through
the streets of Roaring Springs.
It will follow the same pattern
as past years, with the reading
of a list of the deceased from
each county during the past year.
It will be held at the pavilion in
Pioneer Park. Other features of
the program will be published in
next week's issue of the
Tribune.

pounds to the bushel with 13.93
moisture content. It was sold
for \$1.75 per bushel.
Braselton said the dry land
milo was producing 3,500 pounds
per acre "on a limited amount
of land."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

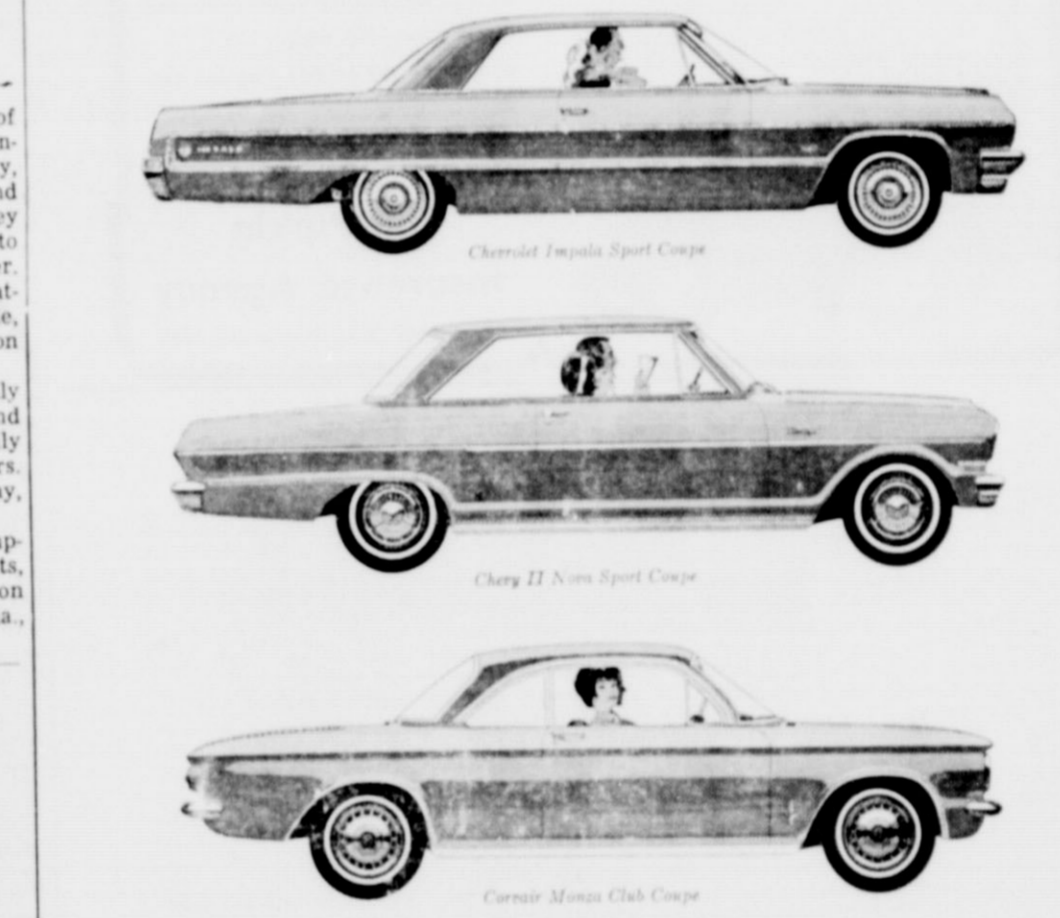
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVII of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

RE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

The annual Horse Short Course will be held at Texas A&M Aug. 21-22. Items included on the program are Demonstrations of Training and Judging Performance Events: Western Pleasure, Reining, Grooming and Showing, Roping, Cutting, Horse Nutrition and Feeding, Quality Hay for Horses, Colic, Infectious Anemia, the 4-H Horse Program, Diseases, Deformities, Parasites, and current problems. I have a program for those who are interested in attending.

Four mares, four two year old fillies, one two year old gelding, and four yearling geldings will be offered for sale by Texas A&M by sealed bid which will be accepted until 5:00 P.M. Aug. 22. These are in excess of the needs of the University, and animals may be seen at any time at the University Horse Center. I have information on all of these animals if anyone is interested in making a bid. Bids will be opened at the end of the Horse Short Course.

Have you ever wondered how cotton compares with other materials? A recent study of the buying preferences of housewives in six geographical areas revealed some startling facts. As to which fiber was the most comfortable, 69% said cotton; blends 12%; polyester 4%; nylon 3%; other synthetics 2%; other fibers 4%; and don't know 6%. Blends 18%; polyester 5%; nylon 4%; other synthetics 2%; other fibers 17%; and don't know 8%. As far as easy care, 52% picked cotton. Blends 23%; polyester 8%; nylon 8%; other synthetics 3%; other fibers 3%; and don't know 3%.

This information was provided by the National Cotton Council, with the reminder, "are cotton producers doing all they can to promote the sale of cotton?" From a baby's dress to rugged work clothes, there's nothing as comfortable as cotton; when the label says 100% cotton, customers know that from a delicate blouse to grimy jeans, cotton can take the washing; from a crisp tailored suit to a gala evening gown, customers know nothing looks as good as cotton; and it's the one easy care fabric that lives up to it's name.

How long has it been since you doctored a case of screw worms? To date, no cases have been reported in this area, even though several cases of maggots

were found. Livestock owners, don't let up now. Be sure to keep a close watch on your animals, and if a case of worms is noted, collect some, and submit them for examination. I still have some mailing kits on hand if you need them.

This may be bad news to some people, but there is no miraculous way to get rid of tree stumps. There is no magic chemical for dissolving tree stumps overnight. If a bulldozer can be used, it is the quickest and easiest way, and in some towns, stump-clipping machines are available.

In general, the simplest stump-riding method is to cut the tree trunk off at or near the ground line, cover it with soil and sod, and keep the area moist. Keeping the area moist helps wood-destroying organisms to decompose the stump and keeps the grass alive during dry periods.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 18 proposing an Amendment to Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Subsection to be known as 51a-2; giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such medical payments; providing that the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing that certain means relating to the correction or remedying of abnormalities of vision shall be included within such medical care service or assistance; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-2, which shall read as follows:

"Subsection 51a-2. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services. The payments for such medical assistance on behalf of such needy individuals shall be in such amounts as provided by the Legislature; provided, however, that the amount paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes, provided further, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States, such financial aid in the form of medical assistance on behalf of the needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and providing that the amount paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and providing that the amount paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.
