during the June 15th meeting. Names of the new officers selected by the nomination committee are being guarded with "military secrecy," and will not be disclosed until the hour for elec-



# More Than Flood Waters Needs **Curbing In Texas**

Thanks to the diligence of Texas House investigating subcommittee headed by Representative Jo Ed Winfree (Houston), and the untiring work done by Representative Marshall Bell of San Antonio-serving his first term-Texas now has a law, awaiting only the signature of Governor Stevenson, which will check some of the activities of river authorities in this State.

Two such authorities-the Guadalupe-Blanco and the Lower Cold rado River-were created in 1935 for the primary purpose of curbing the flood waters in the stream named in their titles. The house

flood waters-namely, a disregard for the responsibilities that should be assumed by every member of a State-created agency, whatever its

size or purpose Therefore, the Bell Bill prohibits any agency heretofore or hereafter created by the Legislature to carry out the purposes of the Conservation Amendment to the Texas Constitution:

From paying or contracting to pay, directly or indirectly, any fiscal year on Aug. 31 of a minicommission or fee to any person whomsoever in connection with maximum of \$9,000,000. This is in the purchase, lease, sale or acqcisition in any manner whatsoever of any property, real, personal or

mixed, then existing and being used for the purpose of generating. transmitting and distributing electric power. From fixing, by contract or

commodity as service sold by such agency to any municipality or electric corporation. From making any loan of money

to another agency for any purpose whatsoever; from employing an attorney to perform any legal service in acquiring for the agency

existing facilities for generating, transmitting or distributing electric power or energy except for a sum of money to be agreed upon at the time of such employment.

From making any contract or agreement under the terms of which its electric facilities may be operated-with either a private corporation, unless such private corporation be doing business in Texas in such a manner as to be subject to the jurisdiction of the State Courts; or a public corporation or public agency (whose principal business is the generation, transmission, distribution or sale

of electric power or energy) unless such public corporation or public agency is created under Texas laws.

The legislation by no means covers all the devious activities of river authorities brought to light by the Winfree Committee. It is

not so comprehensive as the original draft by Representative Bell. but it is a start, and a good start when a Texas Legislature finds


