Catching Coyotes In West Texas Is Interesting Sport

There and the pups were sucking." Another mistaken idea some people have, Mr. Slover mentioned, is that if the coyotes are catching chickens, their den would be easy to find because of the feathers scattered around near the den.

Locations Changed Mr. Slover also pointed out that he had observed that when the pups are large enough, the mother moves them to a new location, especially if there is a better feeding ground nearby.

Best Catching After Rain The best time to catch coyotes is soon after a rain, Mr. Slover explained. "I sit on my horse on a hill-top for a while, maybe thirty minutes—maybe a little longer, then I notice my horse prick up his ears, and I look in the direction he is looking, and nine times out of ten there is a coyote coming in to the den after a night's prowling hunting for food."

"Occasionally I find a den that is too deep to dig out. In that case I make some sign there and return in a day or so and get them. They won't be so deep then."

"One day I found a den in a bluff in Ralph Stapleton's pasture. I left the coyotes and went home. Three or four days later I went back and got them. I looked for them about an hour and had just about given up when Malcolm Jameson came along, looking for a calf. He found the den and helped me dig the coyotes out; and I helped him get his calf home. We got eight coyotes out of that den and they were part dog."
