





The 10 year-1935-44-planted area to cotton am nounted to 25,608,000 acres. Pri vate estimates had placed prospective plantings at about 19, 500,000 acres.

Some traders estimated that on the basis of last year's yields the 1946 cotton crop could be as low as 9,400,000 bales or only about 400,000 bales over last year's short crop. Smallest Since 1885

Weather conditions in the cotton belt will be of paramount interest to traders, With the exception of last year's very low production, the 1946 crop will be the smallest since 1885.




