DID THESE MEN TOUCH YOUR LIVES?

The museum committee of the Motley County Museum notes that at least three very civic-minded men have been left off the Memorial and Family Name Plaque: Dr. J.S. Stanley, Randall Whitworth, and Henry Pipkin.

Therefore, the museum issues a challenge to any person who has touched in some way by these individuals to send in a \$1 or more so that their names may be included on the final list and engraved on the metal name plates.

Dr. J.S. Stanley, a family doctor who delivered over 2,000 babies in the county, touched innumerable families through his thirty-one year practice, spanning the years between 1935 and 1966.

Randall Whitworth, as an employee of the First State Bank, served as a one man chamber of commerce. Remembering those away from home with a stick of gum, a church bulletin, the bank report, and a friendly word, Whitworth provided a link of home to ex-students and patriots of Motley County.

Henry Pipkin, a barber who served his community through the Lions Club, endeavored to be a friend to every serviceman from Motley County, and whenever possible saw each off and kept in touch with them throughout World War II, all over the world.

Commissioners Battle Over Loader

The Motley County Commissioners met Monday June 8, 1992 with Judge Boyce Hart; Commissioners, Sonny Russell, Franklin Jameson, J.N. Fletcher and Butch Hughes; and County Clerk Lucretia Campbell.

Judge Boyce Hart read a letter on variance of solid waste in dry areas and smaller counties from SPEC (Sparsely Populated Emergency Coalition). The Court discussed the possibility of a share cost with the City.

Commissioner Russell stated that he would be in favor of this if it would help alleviate some of the problems. In May he had found 2 refrigerators, dead animals, and a lot of trash under a bridge.

It seems that this problem is not going away and the Commissioners voted to join SPEC for a cost of \$300.

Commissioner Fletcher wanted to clear up ownership of a loader. Commissioner Russell remembered that in 1982 the loader contract was purchased when Precinct 2, 3 and 4 traded a 944 loader in on a new one. The loader was put in a common pit for all four precincts. Payments were made out of revenue sharing.

Milton Brooks had traded it in, but all four precincts had paid equally.

County Clerk Campbell read the minutes from the January, 1982 meeting, stating that Milton Brooks and Bill Jameson accepted bid to pay with trade-in with 1/4 intact. Brooks paid more per revenue sharing than the others. Each paid approximately \$13,000. Precinct 4 traded in approximately \$12,000.

Brooks says more was paid from work in Precinct 4.

Commissioner Franklin stated the loader had been to Northfield three times in 10 years. He feels if it belongs to all the precincts, all should be able to use it.

Commissioner Fletcher stated that Precinct 4 has maintained it all the time.

Commissioner Jameson stated that his precinct needs the loader more than they have it, and have used it less than 10% of the years it has been owned.

Commissioner Fletcher stated that Precinct 4 had spent \$201 in May on the loader and that it belongs to the County but operates out of Precinct 4.

Commissioner Jameson stated that he thinks each Precinct should have it a fair share. His Precinct has not had it in over a year. Precincts 1 and 3 had shared one until last year.

Commissioner Russell stated that an extra one had been bought when Bill Hand was in office, because it wasn't shared then. When Fraiser Watson was there he shared and each helped with maintenance. He believes the county really needs another loader, but cannot afford one at this time.

Commissioner Fletcher made a motion to leave it as is and he and Commissioner Jameson will try to work this matter out.

After more discussion, it was voted that the Loader will be used out of Precinct 4, equally, and major repairs will be made from the lateral road fund.

Commissioner Fletcher stated that he believes the loader belongs to Precinct 4.

Commissioner Russell suggested that a new agreement be set up stating that everything belongs to the County and should be used equally. It is all County.

In further county business discussion, dissatisfaction with the County Attorney was discussed. Commissioner Russell stated that the county has had no help except for to help the Judge. This matter was discussed further. No action was taken.

A Public Hearing was held to set the speed limit on the road to the Assembly of God Youth Camp. Bennie D. Dillard asked for the speed limit to be set on the

County road to the Camp, due to a few minor wrecks due to excessive speed and more traffic on the road during certain times of the year.

John Murdock, Camp Director, stated that the residents of the Camp, the Brooks children, had missed 35-40 days of school due to bad roads. They had missed school and games. There had been expenses on vehicles, due to excessive mud and travel. He does understand that the county doesn't have funds to fix these roads.

The deed from Edna and Ben Dillard gave the acres to the County for roads and land for camp. The roads aren't as wide as designated, and due to the rains, this has caused mud and travel problems.

Mr. Murdock explained his concern if the Court is trying to get rid of the Youth Camp. He wants to work with the County. The Camp would like to pave the road if they could, so as to stop these problems.

Mr. Dillard stated the young people are mistreating the road and they have seen it, because they work out there and see them.

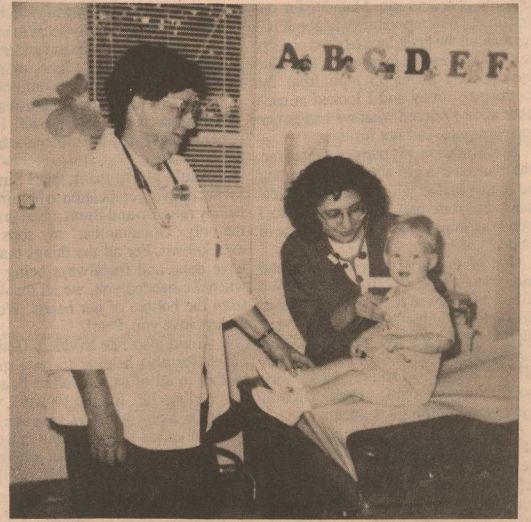
Commissioner Fletcher stated that he needs gravel on the roads. They are used most three months a year, and he is out there 5 months.

Commissioner Russell explained that the County feels no animosity to the fact of Religion, and asked Murdock to help pay to regravell the road. Mr. Murdock stated that he will work with Mr. Fletcher.

Commissioner Fletcher stated that he would like to keep the 30 mph signs for 3.2 miles.

The Court passed to issue the order to set 30 mile per hour on the 3.2 miles from cattle guard to gate to the Assembly of God Youth Camp. They believe the camp is an asset for the County and the young people.

Court adjourned.

June 18 (FHTNC) -- Marine Lance Cpl. Jack A. Carlson, son of Charles T. and Magdalena Carlson of Matador, Texas, recently deployed for six months to the Western Pacific region with Marine Light Attack Helicopter Squadron-367, Marine Corps Air Station, Camp Pendleton, CA.

Carlson will be tasked with operations in the Philippines, Korea and Okinawa,

which will test the readiness of the squadron.

The squadron flies the UH-1N Huey which is used primarily in troop assault and general cargo transport and the AH-1 Cobra which supports military units as a combat gunship. Its primary mission is antiarmor, but can be used in close air support and air-to-air roles.

Letter to the Editor

As most of the people of Motley County have heard by now, I have left Matador and moved to Midland, TX to accept a promotion with the DPS. However, I could not leave without sharing with you all some of my many thoughts and ideas about this place called Matador that has been the home of me and my family for the past 17 years. I feel that I owe a great debt of gratitude to so many people here that I could not mention them all without you printing a second edition, so I'll mention a few.

When Bunny and I first moved to Matador on June 14, 1975, I was fresh out of patrol school in Austin and neither of us had ever been to Matador. As we drove into town traveling north on TX 70 from Roaring Springs, we topped the hill at the roadside park and saw Matador for our first time. The temperature was about 103 degrees, all the grass looked dead and dry as if it hadn't rained in months. The wind was blowing about 35 mph from the southwest. Bunny and I looked at each other and wondered what we had gotten ourselves into. But not for long.

Neal Haralson, my partner at that time, was married to a girl who was kin to half the county and as you might recall, Neal knew everyone and liked to visit, so I soon was introduced to a large host of residents of Motley County.

One of the first persons I met and made friends with was Bill Jameson. We still own the house that we bought from Bill and his wife. Bill was also very helpful in making Bunny and myself feel very welcome and at home at Matador. Bill was always and still remains a very good friend of our family. I appreciate all of his support through the years.

Another person whom I met and dealt with professionally was Jinks Wilson. Everyone knew Jinks and what a wonderful person he was. It's so ironic that a man whom everyone held in such high esteem, including myself, should leave us in such a tragic manner. I feel that as a result of Jink's death, I became a better person and better peace officer.

About a year after I arrived at Matador, I joined the Matador/Motley County Fire Department. I have been a member ever since. I am very grateful to have served with this department over the many years. The fellowship and brotherhood I shared with all of our many members will always be cherished. Motley County is very fortunate to have such a fine and

often times badly needed fire department to serve you. It is very evident to me that the citizens are proud of this department by the strong support it has always received. I would like to say a very heartfelt thanks to all of its members, but especially to Rodney Williams and James Gillespie. These two men's relentless dedication and leadership skills have certainly been greatly responsible for the fire department being as outstanding as it is today.

Over the years I have had occasions to deal with a great many of the fine citizens of Motley County in a professional manner. Almost without exception, everyone has treated me very courteously even though I may have given them a ticket. For this I am very appreciative. We all make mistakes, including myself, but the people of Motley county seem to me that they are a very forgiving and understanding people. The people here, to a great extent, are very pro-law enforcement minded. This has made my job as a State Trooper much easier, however, I have never found it easy to enforce the law on my friends.

I would like to thank Pearl Simpson for her undying dedication to help me and Bunny raise Bo and Brent. Pearl is really the only "Grandmother" my sons have ever known. For all the things that you have done and for always being there when we needed you, we all thank you from the bottom of our hearts. We will always love you, Pearl.

I would also like to thank Gertrude Smith for also helping to be a grandmother to all of us, as well as being an outstanding J.P. for me to work with. Gertrude, along with Roy, gave a tremendous amount of support to me as well as all other DPS Troopers that worked in Motley County and for this I will be forever grateful.

Throughout the years, I have had occasions to work with the Texas Highway Departments of the several counties that work. I have never seen a more dedicated group of men than those that we have working for us at our Highway Department here at Matador. During the course of my duties I have called on these men many times, usually late at night after they were off work, to assist me at accidents, fires, flooded roadways and various other times. Their willingness to help and abilities to get the job done never ceased to amaze me. I never once heard

any of them complain. Thank you all very much.

To all of the current county commissioners and those who have served in the past, I am very proud to have been associated with such fine county leaders, that always gave me their 100% support. A special thanks to Boyce Hart, current County Judge and a dear friend of mine. Boyce is an extremely dedicated and very capable leader for our county. I feel certain that in years to come, Motley County will be an even better place to live because of his leadership.

I could write a book about how the Coy Franks family has changed and influenced my life in such a positive manner. The many experiences and personal friendships that have been cultivated between our families will never be forgotten. Home Economically Speaking

MILDEW PREVENTION

Mildew flourishes in warm, humid weather -- just the kind we have been having in Texas. Mildew grows best wherever it is damp, warm, poorly aired and poorly lighted, such as in closets, bathrooms and laundry rooms.

Several things help prevent mildew growth. Provide adequate ventilation throughout the house, especially in enclosed spaces. For example, run an electric fan in places that cannot be exposed to outside air easily such as linen and storage closets.

Leave closets and dresser drawers open occasionally to allow moisture to escape. Burning a small electric light bulb in a closed closet will help dry it out. So will heating it with a small, electric heater placed on the floor of the closet. When heating the closet, be sure to follow the directions for safe operation of the heater.

Hang clothes loosely so air can circulate around them. Keep shoes and other articles on shelves, preferably perforated ones, to maintain better air circulation. Be sure things are clean and dry before putting them away.

Dry shower curtains and walls after each shower to reduce moisture in bathrooms. Leave shower curtains open to allow air to circulate in the shower or tub area. Hang wet towels to dry immediately after use or place them in the dryer on air dry to speed drying time and to vent

moisture out of the house through the dryer vent.

Commercial products are available that remove moisture from the air in enclosed places. Silica gel, activated alumina and calcium chloride absorb moisture from the air. Silica gel and alumina can be dried and reused once they have absorbed as much as they can hold. Calcium chloride is converted to a liquid as it absorbs moisture and must be discarded when it is completely liquified. These products may be available from building supply centers, variety stores, or through catalog stores.

Keeping all surfaces clean and dry will help prevent mildew, too. Washing walls, floors, tile, and other hard surfaces with a chlorine bleach solution will get rid of musty odors and prevent mold spores from growing. Use one-half cup to one cup of liquid chlorine bleach to a gallon of water. Use only on surfaces that are safe to bleach. Rinse with clean water and wipe as dry as possible. Fungicidal products also control mildew effectively.

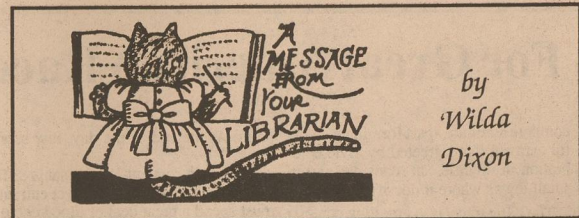

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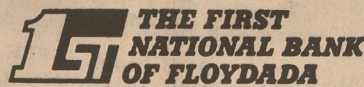

REPORT SPRING SEEDED CROPS BY JULY 15TH

Wednesday, July 15, 1992 is the final day to report or certify all spring seeded crops and any ACR and CU for Pay acres not previously certified. Accuracy is a must to protect benefits and history. Certification is the most important process taken by farmers and ranchers at their local ASCS offices. Nationally, figures are gathered for each crop and assist statisticians as well as marketing groups analyze projected crop production. On a regional note, recent weather conditions have caused our major cash crop (cotton) to be roughly 60% below normal plantings.

Motley County producers are still vigorously attempting to plant all acres they had previously prepared in the early spring. Presently, I estimate that 70% or 22,400 acres have been planted, and most of those acres were planted in a 5 to 7 day period last week. Conditions across the county are mixed, but overall soil saturation has caused fields to dry slowly and progress has been slowed as well. Under normal conditions, most of the cotton would be up and growing in the second to fourth leaf stages across the county. Producers are urged to come by this office if they are forced due to natural disasters to do something other than their original intentions.

Clarendon Will Be Pit Stop For Great American Race

Celebrating its 10th Anniversary, The Interstate Batteries Great American Race, world's greatest old car race, will make a pit stop Monday, June 29 at 4:25 p.m. at the Donley County Courthouse in Clarendon, Texas. The Clarendon event is part of an internationally recognized 4,475 mile, 2 week, 9 state, and 48 city coast to coast dash paying a \$250,000 purse, antique car racing's largest.

The race starts Sunday afternoon, June 21st on King street in Historic Charleston and finishes Saturday, July 4th at Costa Mesa, CA (in the LA basin) according to Tom McRae, Executive Director of race organizer Greatrace, Ltd., of Dallas, TX.

The Clarendon Merchants Association in Clarendon is organizing the event. Up to 100 beautiful antique autos will spend 15 minutes each there before hitting the road again bound for an overnight stop in Amarillo. The greatest show on wheels will be enroute from Irving, Decatur and Wichita Falls as it reaches Clarendon.

There is no charge to the public nor are any passes of any kind required to see

this colossal congress of classic cars. This History of the Highway collection is valued at more than \$7 million and encourages the public to view it up close and personal.

Up to 100 antique cars - dating from 1910 to 1941 - bailing from 29 states and 6 countries, will each make a 15 minute stop for refreshments. The field has an estimated \$7 million value with one car more outstanding than the next.

Since competitors race one minute apart it will take them at least an hour and 40 minutes to arrive in Clarendon once the first car reaches town. A definite time for the stop will be published in the near future. When it reaches Clarendon, the colorful old car caravan will be in the ninth day of its 4,475 mile transcontinental journey.

Each day's race stage covers 170 to 480 miles. For example, the stage from Irving to Amarillo is 420 racing miles. The race normally runs on back roads and two lane highways to avoid Interstates. As the first racer enters Clarendon the last will still be 71 miles distant. The cars

compete a minute apart forming a colorful caravan that's greeted by civic celebration in 48 cities, at roadsides and in small towns where it doesn't stop.

The Greatrace is a gruelling contest of precision driving, controlled speed and endurance. Teams try to match detailed driving instructions timed to within 1/100th of a second. Each second off schedule at secret daily checkpoints is a penalty

point. At the end of the day, low score wins.

Simple in concept, the format is difficult enough to master alone, yet entrants must spend a great deal of time keeping the ancient anachronisms in good repair. The onerous nature of the endurance phase of the Greatrace inspired a motto sooner or later spoken by all - "To Finish Is To Win."

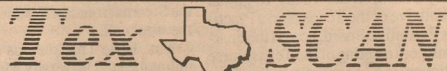

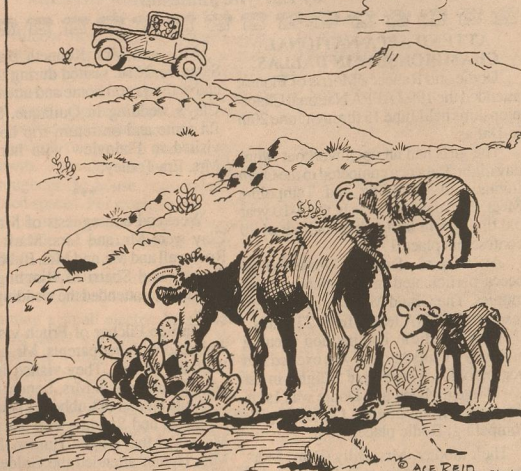
