Texas Highway Commission January 18, 1944, passed an order prescribing for the 1944 registration year, which begins April 1 1944, two metal tabs 2" x 2" bear-

ing the designation of the State, year and an identification serial number. The tabs must be used in connection with the 1942 plates which must be retained throughout the 1944 registration year. The same procedure applies to vehicles which are required to have but one license plate except that one tab is prescribed and the one 1942 license plate must be retained.
