Dec. 27, 1943

Dear Ben,
I guess you have been thinking that I didn't think much of the paper by not writing for so long, but since I landed in Africa, I have been waiting for my paper and I got two this week and they were sure welcome.

Ben you know this is a very pretty country, but it can't compare with Texas and Motley county especially. I guess it would look a little like the states if it was a little more civilized, but these Arabs are way behind us and will never catch up.

Boy this is a wet country. It has rained for the past couple of weeks and is really raining now. Ben we had a good Christmas under the conditions. The main thing was the dinner and boy! what I mean we had a dinner. I thought that I would have to add side boards to my mess kit before I got through the chow line but they stopped before it ran over. You can't say the Army doesn't feed.

Well Ben I guess you and all the Motley county folks are doing as much if not more than a lot of people I know of, for the war effort. I will close and hope by the time this gets there, that this war has turned for the good.

RED CROSS SEEKS COSTUME JEWELRY FOR MEN OVERSEAS

Appeal is made through the Motley County Chapter of the American Red Cross for costume jewelry to be used by men in the armed forces located in areas where the jewelry may be traded for articles of food, according to a statement made by Mrs. B. F. Tunnell, production chairman.

"Our soldiers are calling on the home-folks for costume jewelry to trade to natives for fresh food and even for labor," Mrs. Tunnell, declared. You may think they have plenty of food but the civilians over here would not like a steady diet of "C" rations and that is what our men take in the jungles with them. If you have some bright beads, rings or pins which you would like to contribute, bring them with you the next time you come to help sew or knit."

Need Hospital Slippers

The National Red Cross office is calling for all available hospital slippers or cuffs, for immediate shipment overseas. Mrs. Tunnell, declared. 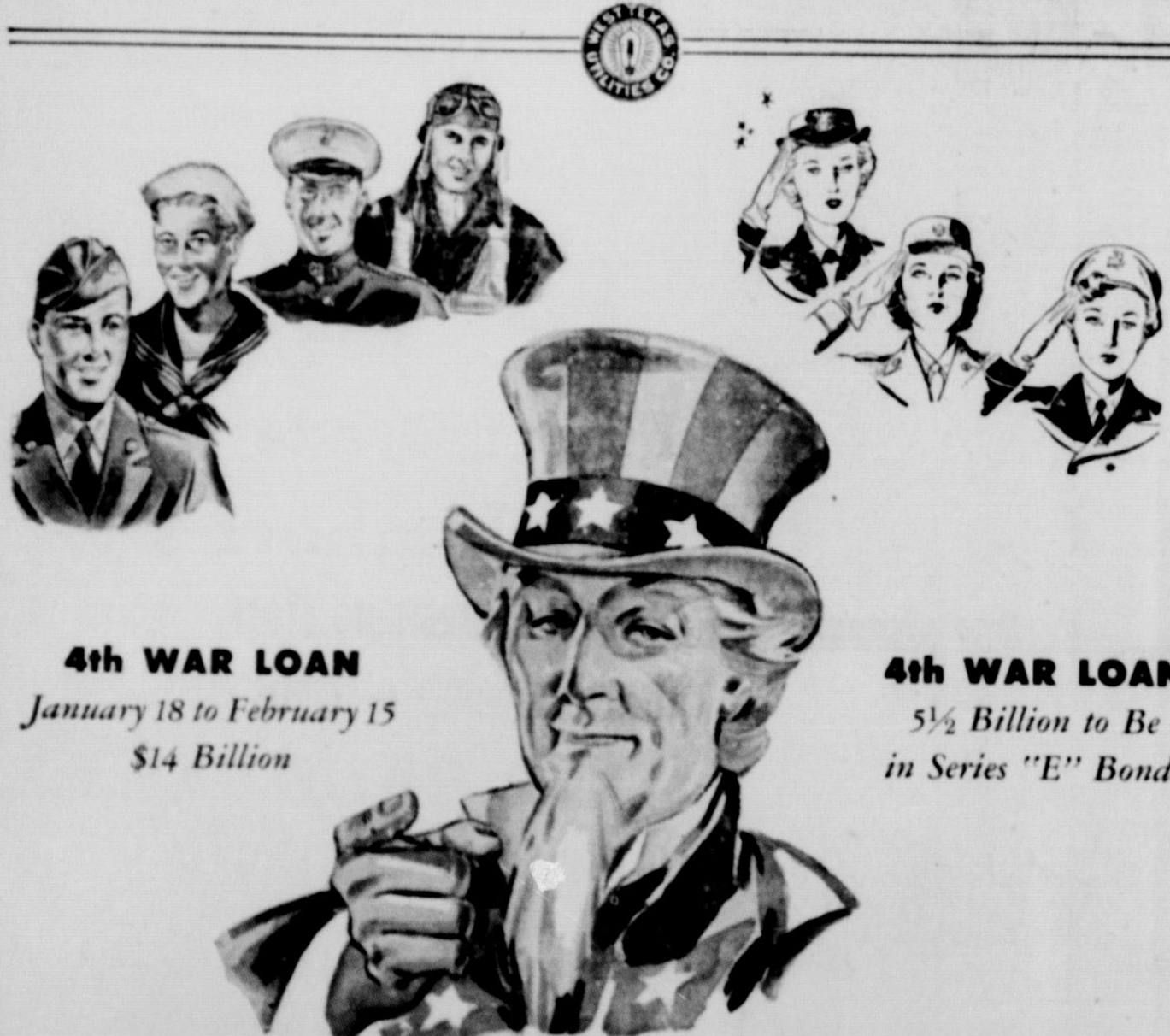
