Despite increases in licensed drivers, vehicles, and miles driven, 4,558 fewer Americans were killed in alcohol-re-lated motor vehicle crashes during 1993 than just three years earlier in 1990 (ac-cording to the NHTSA) Fatal Accident Reporting System). Nonetheless, thou-sands of Americans continue to be killed and injured because of impaired during and injured because of impaired drivers. We need to keep in mind that even one

death or one injury is not nual cvch way. December has been designated Na-tional Drunk and Drugged Driving Pre-vention Month (3D Month) spearheaded by a 3D Coalition. This Coalition is comprised of government agencies, pri-vate and public sector organizations and grassroots groups. The ultimate goal of grassroots groups. The ultimate goal of this effort is to save lives that would otherwise be lost due to impaired driving.

A Presidential Proclamation signed in A Presidential Proclamation signed in 1982 designated the second week of December as National Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Week in response to a joint resolution issued by the Congress of the United States. The week was observed each year through 1991. In 1992, 3D Week evolved into 3D Month due to increased interest and involvement of many groups in 3D activi-ties, and to accommodate scheduling of events by the growing number of particievents by the growing number of partici-pants. Again on November 18, 1993, Congress showed its commitment to reducing impaired driving by passing a joint resolution in support of National 3D Prevention Month. And, on December 3rd, President Clinton signed a Procla-mation designating December 1993 as National 3D Month.

National 3D Month. Now is the time to start thinking about National Drunk and Drugged Driving Prevention Month. A key element in at-tracting national attention is the Program Planner which will be distributed in late August. It contains a background and resource guide, state and local initiatives, editorials and proclamations and camera-ready artwork to assist communities and ready artwork to assist communities and






